Happy 107th Birthday, Saint Paul's!

Friday, Sep 14, is the 107th anniversary of the opening of Saint Paul's College in 1911 by the Benedictines of St. Joseph Abbey. On that day, forty-eight students, five Benedictine priests (Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, Aemillion, Martin, & Placid) and four lay teachers (Messrs. Edgar Barre, Oliver Lyons, Bernard Mutter, & Leopoldo Teller) walked through the arch for the first time and opened the school. By year's end, 70 boarders & 30 day students had enrolled.

Seven years later, those same Benedictines transferred ownership to the Christian Brothers. And the rest, as they say, is history. And so this week will be a week of remembrance:

- We will remember the commitment and faithfulness of the Benedictines in founding Saint Paul's school, making it as a place of learning, growth, and the Spirit of God.
- We will remember the courageous Christian Brothers who assumed ownership of Saint Paul's in the summer of 1918 against incredible odds, after being exiled from France and barely escaping with their lives from Mexico. We will thank them for bringing the 330+ year Lasallian dream here.
- We will remember all the Christian Brothers and their Partners who have worked to make the Lasallian dream alive here in Covington -- a dream incarnate in this year's student body. It is a dream that says that at Saint Paul's, we are all brothers and sisters, no one is insignificant, everyone is important, we are ministers of God's grace to one another, and we must announce the message of the gospels, thus bringing salvation to all.
- We will remember alumni and former students and the contribution that each made -- those who no longer walk on this earth, but remain important to our lives.

As we enter into the 8th year of our second century, we again remember and paraphrase Nobel Laureate William Faulkner, that we will "not merely endure, we will prevail" because we have "souls capable of compassion and sacrifice and endurance." Indeed, Saint Paul's will prevail as long as we remember, in the words of William Faulkner, the "courage and honor and hope and pride and compassion and pity and sacrifice which have been the glory of the past" and which we are now called upon to replicate.

And as I tell the students all the time: We are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, living stones building the edifice of the Mystical God and fulfilling the Lasallian Mission of Saint Paul's School in our age. As we thank God for our past, we pause and remember that we are still walking on holy ground -- for God is here, and where God is -- is holy. Happy Birthday Saint Paul's School! *Ad multos annos!*

- **Did You Know** (**SPS Centennial Trivia**): Graduation exercises in May of 1941 saw the end of the long standing practice. For the first time, no "Commercial Diplomas" were awarded. From that time on, all of the high school diplomas given would be standard academic diplomas, whereas before a student could opt for the commercial or the academic track. The commercial track prepared him for immediate employment. The academic track prepared students for college entrance.

Mr. Young endeavored to impress on all the boys the importance of sports in the world. In 1923, Scrap Iron Young had entered Notre Dame, went out for football, and quickly broke his leg. He was encouraged by this coach, the immortal Knute Rockne, to take up track. Taking the advice, Scrap Iron made quite a name for himself, breaking the school's mile and two mile records. He was encouraged by Coach Rockne to take a course in physiotherapy. He graduated and became licensed. In his later years, he showed interest in caring for varsity athletes. He helped train many famous All Americans such as Marty Brill, half back in 1930 and the brilliant Creighton Miller, sensational quarterback of the unbeaten 1943 Notre Dame Team.

- TDIH: In 1814, Francis Scott Key pens words, later set to music, that in 1931 becomes USA's national anthem, "The Star-Spangled Banner." The poem, titled "The Defence of Fort McHenry," was written when Key saw Fort McHenry in Maryland bombarded by British in the War of 1812 & was inspired by a lone U.S. flag flying at daybreak.
- **DYK:** In 1919, only 10 members comprised the senior class. In 1920, there were only seven. Today, we have 152 seniors.

- All School Mass celebrating the Centennial of the Coming of the Christian Brothers (9:30) Abbot Justin Brown of Saint Joseph Abbey will celebrate mass in honor the transfer of ownership of Saint Paul's from the Benedictines of Saint Joseph Abbey to the Christian Brothers in 1918. Parents are welcome to attend this special mass. Boys must wear their dress uniforms.

Fri, Sep 14 (Exaltation of the Holy Cross & SPS BD; Half Day Centennial schedule; C D)

- **TDIH:** In 1911, 48 students, 5 Benedictine priests, and 4 lay teachers opened Saint Paul's College and began classes, beginning an educational tradition of excellence that continues today. Happy B-Day, SPS!
- **TDIH:** In 1741, George Frederick Handel finished *Messiah* (not "The Messiah") after working on it nonstop for 23 days. It's one of my favorite pieces of music – absolutely incredible!
- **TDIH:** In 1975, Pope Paul VI canonizes Elizabeth Ann Seton, making her the first American saint.
- **DYK:** On this day in 1911, 48 students, 3 Benedictine priests opened Saint Paul's College and began classes. They began an educational tradition of excellence that continues today. Happy birthday, SPS!
- **Exaltation of the Holy Cross:** This feast was begun in 629 AD by Emperor Heracles who brought the cross discovered by Saint Helena in 320 AD (and purported to be the True Cross) to Jerusalem, placing it on the believed spot of Jesus' crucifixion. I do not know whether the Benedictines opened SP on this feast by coincidence or plan, but establishing Saint Paul's was a triumph by them and, later, by the Christian Brothers. Today, it remains a triumph. With your help, it will triumph far into the future, a triumph of the Lasallian dream and God's work in Covington.
- National Hug Your Hound Day: Give Fideaux a great big hug.
- Eat A Hoagie Day: Go ahead and indulge today!
- **Football:** Varsity at Christian Brothers High School in Memphis (7). This is a second time these two Lasallian powerhouse schools will meet on the gridiron, the first having been last year with CBHS traveled to SPS. CBHS is a wonderful, all boy high school in Memphis, dating back to 1871. Just like the persecution in France and Mexico led the Brothers to Covington, the great Chicago fire of 1871 destroyed

several of the Brothers' schools in that city, leading four Brothers to re-locate to Memphis and open a school. Today, CBHS is a modern, school of first choice for 880 students in grades 9-12. We welcome this opportunity to interact with our Lasallian brothers. May our common heritage provide great competition and sportsmanship.

- **TDIH:** In 1620, *The Mayflower* ship departed from England bound for America with 102 passengers and a small crew. Trivia Question: what is the site where the pilgrims disembarked on Dec 26? Answer at end.
- Mexican Independence Day: The Grito de Dolores ("Cry of Dolores") was uttered from the small town of Dolores, near Guanajuato in Mexico, on September 16, 1810. It is the event that marks the beginning of the Mexican War of Independence. The "grito" was the *pronunciamiento* of the Mexican War of Independence by Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla, a Roman Catholic priest. Since October 1825, the anniversary of the event is celebrated as Mexican Independence Day, not Cinco de Mayo, of Mexico's Independence from Spain. Viva la independencia!
- The Trail of Tears Commemoration Day: this day, also called the Cherokee Removal Day, refers to the forced relocation of the Cherokee Nation from their lands in GA, TN, AL, and NC to the Indian Territory (present day Oklahoma) in the Western United States from 1836 to 1839. More than 4,000 Cherokee died along the trail during this relocation. This is a sad blot on our nation's history.

- American Legion Day: Congress granted the AL its federal charter on this day in 1919 to support and assist veterans returning from WW I. Since then, it has grown and supported all veterans.

- **PLEASE patronize the MC's Bookstore.** Proceeds not help fund wonderful activities throughout the year and campus needs. For example, the MC funded over \$40,000 worth of school projects this past year.

Cell Phones:

- State Law: Motorists are prohibited from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- SPS Law: students may use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed. And, yes, our security firewalls are in effect

Centennial Celebration This Week: Our celebration of the coming of the CBs peaks this week with activities each day:

Driving: Please drive carefully and, if your son drives to school, stress traffic safety with him. Saint Paul's is located in a residential neighborhood, so be VERY careful when approaching campus. Covington Police will ticket violators – and we will take disciplinary action against students as well. And remember: **cell phone use in a school zone is against the law and can be ticketed by police!**

Emergency Closing: As we reach the height of the tropical season (Sep 10), and with safety foremost in our minds, I remind all of the directives from the Office of Catholic Schools of the Archdiocese of New Orleans – which we followed last week with Tropical Storm Gordon:

• Catholic schools will follow the closure and reopening schedules of their civil parish. Therefore, monitor the St. Tammany Public School system announcements. Naturally, we reserve the right to close earlier if we feel it necessary and to reopen earlier if we are able and civil parish authorities give permission. For example, we opened weeks before the public school system following Hurricane Katrina.

- Listen & Watch for a robo-text message or phone call or email before calling school since it is difficult to handle a large volume of calls. Also, our phone system goes dark in a power failure. We used our notification system last week. Le me know if you did not receive text and email messages abour our closings.

Letters from the Past: Another excerpt from the letters of the first Christian Brothers who purchased Saint Paul's in 1918. In this excerpt, dated Jun 8, 1918 and translated by our Madame Francoise Butchart, Brother Alton Pierre is in Covington has gone to the Archbishop of New Orleans to tell him of the lease/purchase agreement with the Benedictines. As written last week, the Archbishop rebuffs Brother Alton's news and demands a meeting with the Christian Brother Superior. Brother Alton felt that "everything was over in Covington." Here's what happens:

When I came out of the meeting with the Archbishop, I was not proud and I thought that everything was over for Covington. The Archbishop told me to come back the next day with the Abbott. So I returned to Covington to attend the academic awards and right after the ceremony we took the first train for the city. The Archbishop received us at 6 in the evening. He first had a long conference with the Abbott and then he made me enter. He asked me several questions on my negotiations with the Abbott, about our congregation, and then he added: you now have to make a formal request for admission to the archdiocese. The archbishop implied he had concerns about admitting a new congregation which was a foreign one. As it was time for supper, we were invited to stay. The next day, the Abbott visited his clerical friends to ask for their help in admitting the Christian Brothers. The Archbishop ultimately gave his permission.

Traffic Flow on Campus: If you drop off or pick up your son, you will meet congestion on the roadways in the morning and afternoon around our campus. We ask your help in improving the traffic flow and safety:

- Consider an alternate pick up location for your son other than Founder's Circle. These include the drop off area by the Gene Bennett Sports Complex, the parking lot on the corner of 13th and Jefferson St. or the parking lot at LaSalle Hall on 11th Avenue. You can drive through these parking lots or wait in a parking space there without holding up traffic elsewhere.
- DO NOT pick up your son using the shoulder of 11th Avenue. This is a dangerous area with poor visibility and further backs up traffic when you stop to load or unload.
- If you use the LaSalle Drive (main entrance) car line, please wait to the left so that thru traffic can still move through our campus using the right lane.
- Coordinate with your son about where and when you will meet him in the afternoon. If he is not present when you drive through, please proceed to a parking lot and wait for him there. If you stop in the car line to wait, you are holding up all cars behind you.
- Remind your son to be on the lookout for your car as you drive up.
- Our primary concern is safety, so please adhere to all speed limit and traffic rules in the school area. We are working closely with the Covington Police Department to find solutions to traffic around school. Working together, we can improve both safety and circulation around our campus.
