


The President's Hebdomadal Blue Ribbon Newsletter Celebrating 100 Years of Christian Brothers at SPS October 08 - 14, 2018



On Thursday of this week, October 11, we observe the memorial of Saint Pope John XXIII (1881 - 1963) -- one of the most influential popes in recent history, who changed the Church forever.

As Pope John XXIII, he immediately began to change the culture in the Vatican. He visited the sick, the poor, and prisoners. He apologized for episodes of anti-Semitism within the Church.

Most expected Pope John XXIII to only serve a short time and that he would make no significant changes to Church practice. However, Pope John XXIII did many things that created sensation in the streets and pews. Perhaps his most influential decision was the call for an ecumenical council, known as Vatican II. This council altered many practices of the classic Church with new emphasis on ecumenism and a new liturgy.



At his death in June of 1963, the world mourned John XXIII and President Lyndon Johnson posthumously awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom. Saint Pope John XXIII's feast day is October 11. This special feast day commemorates the opening of the Second Vatican Council on October 11, 1962. Here are some of his more memorable quotations:

- Consult not your fears but your hopes and dreams. Think not about your frustrations, but about your unfulfilled potential. Concern yourself not with what you tried and failed in, but with what is still possible for you to do
- The family is the first essential cell of human society.
- Peace on Earth can never be established, never guaranteed, except by the diligent observance of the divinely established order.
- Do not walk through time without leaving worthy evidence of your passage.
- Whoever has a heart full of love always has something to give.
- See everything, overlook a great deal, correct a little.
- Prayer is the raising of the mind to God. We must always remember this. The actual words matter less

Saint John XXIII! Pray for us!

Mon, Oct 8 – (PSAT Bubble Schedule; DEFG)

- Alvin C. York Day: Sgt. York is the most decorated American soldier in World War I. From the Sgt. York website: On Oct 8, 1918, after being pinned down, York took his fateful walk into history. He and 16 other soldiers... were given the unenviable task of silencing the machine guns that halted the advance. It was a cold, wet morning. Rain mixed with sleet added to the gloom of the fog that draped the landscape. As the soldiers worked their way around the hill, the men on the left flank stood exposed in the creek bottom. German machine gunners opened fire, wounding or killing nine Americans, including York's best friend. York was on the right flank beneath the crest of the hill in a natural depression, which he used to kill nine of the men who operated the guns. In the meantime, his comrades opened fire on the Germans, and in a few minutes 25 were dead. The Germans surrendered to what they thought was a superior force, and York and the American survivors escorted 132 prisoners to American forces some 10 miles away. Sergeant York was awarded his nation's highest decoration, the Medal of Honor, for his actions [that day.]

TDIH: On this day in 1934 in Turon, Spain, the following Brothers, canonized by Pope John Paul II, were martyred: Saint Brothers Cirilo Bertrán, Marciano José, Julián Alfredo, Victoriano Pío, Benito de Jesus, Benjamin Julián, Augusto Andrés, Aniceto Adolfo and Saint Father Inocencio. From the Brothers' website: In 1934, Turón was the center of anticlerical hostility. The Brothers' school was an irritant to radicals in charge because of the religious influence it exerted. The Brothers defied the ban on teaching religion & openly escorted students to Mass. On the First Fri of Oct, authorities broke into the Brothers' house on the pretext that arms were hidden there. They and their chaplain were arrested and marched to the cemetery where they were shot. Brother Cirilo, the Director, was 46 and Brother Marciano was 39.



Brother Julián was 32 and all the rest were in their twenties. They were arrested, detained, and executed as a community. Victims of the hatred and violence against the Church, they witnessed by their death to the faith they so courageously professed and so effectively communicated to their students. Saintly Brothers! Pray for us!



 3, with mass at 11, at the provincial house at 18080 St. Joseph Way. Games, food, and fun are the order of the day.




I call the following to your attention in alphabetical order, not necessarily order of importance.

Biomedical Science Program Good News: Eight years ago, Saint Paul's inaugurated a biomedical sciences program via Project Lead the Way's nationally recognized curriculum. This was made possible by a sponsorship from the Harry T. Howard Foundation. The five-year agreement with the Foundation ended three years ago and while we will always be grateful to the Foundation for launching our program, we needed to find a new sponsor. Two years ago, Dr. David and Mrs. Kathy Oubre of Ponchartrain Cancer Center generously offered to sponsor the program for the four years. Last week, SPS received the third installment on their sponsorship. The Cancer Center and their personnel have been resources for the students involved in the program. The PLTW Biomedical Sciences Program is aligned with national learning standards, following a proven hands-on, real world problem solving approach to learning. The students explore the concepts of human medicine, and are introduced to a variety of topics including: physiology, genetics, microbiology, and public health. Kathy Oubre, Pontchartrain Cancer Center's Chief Operating Officer stated, "David and I are blessed and honored to be able to give back to Saint Paul's School, a community that has meant so much to our family over the years. Moreover, this sponsorship allows us the opportunity to be a part of further educating those Saint Paul's students who have an interest in biomedical science." Breast Cancer Awareness Month: I have been remiss in mentioning this and it's certainly more important that National Dessert Day or Frustration Day. As an all-boys school, we must not overlook the teachable moments concerning issues pertaining primarily to women, and our boys need to know about this insidious disease, which can strike their grandmothers, mothers, sisters, and future wives and daughters. And we have current parents and friends battling this medical scourge. I encourage enlightened, appropriate discussion of this important health issue with students when possible. Cell Phones:

- State Law prohibits motorists from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- SPS Law allows students to use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed.



Driver's License Proof of Attendance: Well, it happened again! A wonderful SPS family spent several hours at DMV, only to be turned away when they didn't have the enrollment form. Remember: you need one form for the permit and another for the permanent license. The forms are in the counseling department or the administration

building. I feel terrible when a parent waits two hours at the DMV only to be turned away b/c the son doesn't have his proof of attendance.

Driving: Please drive carefully and, if your son drives to school, stress traffic safety with him. Saint Paul's is located in a residential neighborhood, so be VERY careful when approaching campus. Covington Police will ticket violators – and we will take disciplinary action against students as well. And remember: **cell phone use in a school zone is against the law and can be ticketed by police!**

Drug Testing: We have begun drug testing, choosing students both randomly and "for cause." Just because a student is tested does not mean he is suspected. Naturally, you may confidentially request that we add your son to the test list. We have committed more resources this year to increase the number of students tested. Know our policy by reviewing the handbook. A second positive result jeopardizes a student's place at SPS. Pray that students resist the allure of temporary pleasure over finding true meaning in life.

Emergency Closing: Although we have passed the statistical peak of Hurricane Season, we remain vigilant. And with safety foremost in our minds, I remind all of the directives from the Office of Catholic Schools:

- Catholic schools will follow the closure and reopening schedules of their civil parish.

 Therefore, monitor the St. Tammany Public School system announcements. Naturally, we reserve the right to close earlier if we feel it necessary and to reopen earlier if we are able and civil parish authorities give permission. For example, we opened weeks before the public school system following Hurricane Katrina.
- **Listen & Watch** for a robo-text message or phone call or email before calling school since it is difficult to handle a large volume of calls. Also, our phone system goes dark in a power failure. We have a new notification system and will send texts and emails.
- Consult PlusPortals and our web site.
- Pray to Our Lady of Prompt Succor, Patroness of Louisiana.




