Welcome to the final full week of October and the second week of the second quarter! Time marches on; all we can do is make the most of it.



As we begin the second quarter, now is a good time to remind ourselves of and recommit ourselves to the fundamentals of what we do and why we do it. Ten weeks ago, we committed ourselves to being Lasallian and to doing God's will. At the start of the second quarter, we must renew our Lasallian commitment to students and each other. As we begin the second quarter, we again commit ourselves to the five Lasallian Core Principles: *Provide a quality education, Build an inclusive community, Respect all persons, Show concern for the poor and social justice, and Have Faith in the presence of God.*

As we pray daily to our Holy Founding Brothers to help us continue our Lasallian Mission, I offered the following words of St. John Baptist de La Salle to our faculty and staff and encouraged them to use these words of St. La Salle to inspire their work – just as, I'm sure, our Founding Brothers did. I respectfully submit that the words

apply to you, too, in your role as parent just as much as they apply to us in our work as teachers:

- It is God who has called you to this form of service; [parenting or teaching]
- Every day God calls you anew to the needs these children have; [as parent or teacher]
- It is God's own work that he entrusts to you; [as parent or teacher]
- Your presence among young people brings salvation to them; [as parent or teacher]
- Be satisfied with what you can do, since God is satisfied with it, but do not spare yourself in what you can do with grace; and believe that, if you want it, you can do more with the grace of God than you think.
- In you, and through your ministry, these children encounter God, who knows each of them by name, who loves them, and who goes out searching endlessly for those who have gone astray.

Please pray this week that we live up the Lasallian Mission of education.

By the way, the image of St. La Salle above is from an original oil painting that hangs in the Counseling Center. It was painted by famous Louisiana folk artist Eddie Mormon, known for his distinctive style of vivid colors, lots of paint, and use of a knife, not a brush for bold strokes. Today, the Lasallian world celebrates the memorial feast of Blessed Brother Arnold, a Christian Brother (1838-1890) who was beatified by Pope John Paul II. From the Brothers' web site: Arnold was born into a poor family and left school early to work as a stable boy, coachman, and for local construction. He met the Brothers while attending evening classes at their school and joined. He taught for 14 years at a boarding school in *Reims.* Despite a full teaching schedule, he privately studied math, theology, science & agriculture. During Franco-Prussian War of 1870, he cared for medical & spiritual needs of the wounded on both sides; he was awarded the Bronze Cross. His work won the hearts of his students by his care for their spiritual and professional development. He died at 52 with a reputation for sanctity. 

• Seven years ago today, Oct 28, 2011, Brother Alvaro Rodriguez Echeverria, then-Superior General of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, visited SPS. In his honor, we celebrated a memorable all-school liturgy and formed a Lasallian star. It was a magical moment in our school's history and the picture remains an iconic one. In his address to the students during Mass that day, **Brother Alvaro made the following points which are worthy of review:**



- Lasallians must be concerned with the rights of the child
- Lasallians must serve others, especially the poor
- Lasallians must engage in interreligious dialogue
- Lasallians must form quality relationships
- Lasallians must be people of faith



• Lasallians must have hearts without borders, allowing us to be concerned with all, both here and throughout the entire global community

And even though he's no longer Superior General, let's renew our commitment today to Brother Alvaro's vision of what a Lasallian school should be. Let's re-kindle the excitement of our centennial seven years ago so (and we are doing that this year by celebrating 100 years of Lasallian presence at SPS!) that when SPS celebrates its bi-centennial in 2111, they will look back at our time and say "this was our finest hour" (apologies to Winston Churchill!) – even though I want SPS to greater in 2111 than today!

- **TDIH:** In 1922, hundreds gather around radios to hear the first-ever cross-country broadcast of a college football game. The Princeton Tigers beat Coach Amos Alonso Stagg's formidable Chicago Maroons.
- **TDIH:** In 1886, President Grover Cleveland dedicated the Statue of Liberty on Bedloe's Island in New York harbor. The statue was a gift from the people of France commemorating the French-American

alliance during the American Revolution. Designed by Frederic Auguste Bartholdi, the entire structure stands 300 feet tall. The pedestal contains the words: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, the wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me; I lift my lamp beside the golden door."



Biomedical Science Program Good News:

Eight years ago, Saint Paul's inaugurated a biomedical sciences program via Project Lead the Way's nationally recognized curriculum. This was made possible by a sponsorship from the Harry T. Howard Foundation. The five-year agreement with the Foundation ended three years ago and while we will always be grateful to the Foundation for launching our program, we needed to find a new sponsor. Two years ago, Dr. David and Mrs. Kathy Oubre of Ponchartrain Cancer Center generously offered to sponsor the program for the four years. Last week, SPS received the third installment on their sponsorship. The Cancer Center and their personnel have been resources for the students involved in the program. The PLTW Biomedical Sciences Program is aligned with national learning standards, following a proven hands-on, real world problem solving approach to learning. The students explore the concepts of human

medicine, and are introduced to a variety of topics including: physiology, genetics, microbiology, and public health. Kathy Oubre, Pontchartrain Cancer Center's Chief Operating Officer stated, "David and I are blessed and honored to be able to give back to Saint Paul's School, a community that has meant so much to our family over the years. Moreover, this sponsorship allows us the opportunity to be a part of further educating those Saint Paul's students who have an interest in biomedical science." Cell Phones:

- State Law prohibits motorists from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- SPS Law allows students to use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed.


- 3 out of 5 teens say prescription pain relievers are easy to get from a parent's medicine cabinet.
- In 2015, 18.9 million people aged 12 and older used prescription drugs non-medically.
- 15,000 people die from opioid-related overdoses every year.

Drug Testing: We have begun drug testing, choosing students both randomly and "for cause." Just because a student is tested does not mean we suspect him. Naturally, you may confidentially request that we add your son to the test list. We have committed more resources this year to increase the number of students tested. Know our policy by reviewing the handbook. A second positive result jeopardizes a student's place at SPS. Legal Trivia: Does a public school student have a free speech right to make highly offensive and threatening posts on social media in an off-campus setting, not using school equipment? No, ruled both a lower court and the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in Wyner v. Douglas County School District which upheld the school district's expulsion of the student, who claimed he was "only joking" and had free speech rights. According to an article in *High School Today*, "in recent years, courts have consistently ruled that even if a student claims he was only joking, threats to commit school violence are tantamount to the "substantial disruption" standard that courts want schools to use in such matters." Of course, private schools are not subject to constitutional law but by contract law – hence, our handbook is the contract with the parents.

National Teen Driver Safety Week occurs this week. This week and every week, parents should have conversations with their teens about the important rules they need to follow to stay safe behind the wheel of a passenger car, truck, or SUV. These rules address the greatest dangers for teen drivers: alcohol, inconsistent or no seat belt use, distracted and drowsy driving, speeding, and number of passengers. The Problem: Too many teens are dying on our roads

- Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens (15 to 18 years old) in the United States ahead of all other types of injury, disease, or violence.

News We Can Use: The 2017 Children's Mental Health Report from Child Mind Institute examines the role of smartphones and social media in adolescent mental health care. Concerning Smart Phones: If this generation is going to be named after anything, the iPhone just might be it: according to a fall 2015 marketing survey, two out of three US teens owned an iPhone, about as complete a market saturation as possible for a product. The complete dominance of the smartphone among teens has had ripple effects across every area of their lives, from social interactions to mental health. Teenagers and young adults — ages 16 to 24 — are the most intense users

of social media. Benefits of social media use include enhancing friendships and decreasing loneliness. But there is also evidence that overuse has a negative impact on self-esteem and satisfaction with their lives. And this social media use is also linked to an increase in mental health problems, including anxiety, depression and suicidality. Social media's popularity among adolescents isn't surprising, since it has been shown to affect the reward centers that are so active in teen brains. An imaging study has shown that these regions are activated when participants viewed images with a lot of "Likes". The response is strongest when Likes are on images posted by participant. When viewing photographs of risky behaviors ostensibly taken and posted by peers, activation in the cognitive control network decreased. Increased social media time has had dramatic effects on teen behavior, including fewer risky social activities and more mental health symptoms. "Displacement" may account for these effects. If social media replaces negative activities or isolation, it can be positive. If it replaces face-to-face interaction or exercise, it can be negative





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
