

the New Orleans Museum of Art. The main drive was painted blue to simulate the Nile River. Spend some time today with Egyptian history.


- Use Your Common Sense Day: While CS should be used EVERY day, make a special effort today!

They refused to renounce their religious identity or to abandon the school or the community to save their lives. All died heroically as they pardoned their executioners and proclaimed Christ as the only King and Lord of their lives. These men are examples of faith and inspiration.


I offer the following in alphabetical order, not necessarily order of importance.

- Recognized and congratulated the students who attended Grandparent Day.



- Recognized and congratulated the football quarterback Jack Mashburn for being named The New Orleans Advocate's Player of the Week for Week Seven. We've come a long way since 1916!
- Then, as if by magic, Gioachino Antonio Rossini's "William Tell Overture" started playing which means that the **Cross Country Wolves** are off and running. In their latest accomplishment, the CC Wolves won their 11th consecutive District Championship! Pretty phenomenal! With a very low score of 23, the Wolves placed all seven runners in the top ten, making the All-district team. Junior Patrick Elliott, finishing 2nd, led the Wolves on the three mile course with a blazing 15:54 time, followed by sophomore Evan Pardo, close behind in 16:03, placing 3rd. Senior Evan Hendry took 5th place in 16:25, Alex Schlottman was 6th in 16:26, and Harrison Elliott finished 7 in 16:30, giving the team the 23 point score. District runner-up was Fontainebleau with 60 points, followed by Mandeville in 3rd place with 67 points. The running wolves have placed in top four in all races this season as they prepare for their Regional Meet, November 3, and the State Meet on November 13. Other results this year:

And the future of SPS CC looks good, too, as the JV finished the District Race in 1st place with a perfect score of 15! Wow!

• I then reminded the seniors that they were experiencing the "last time" for many events. The District CC race is an example, as only the top seven runners advance to regional competition. To visually show this, I projected a wonderful black and while photo of senior Austin Harris preparing for his final race as a Wolf.

- At this point I was out of time, so my many other recognitions will roll over to the next assembly. I closed by remindind the students of 7:15 am mass on Wed mornings, the one decade rosary recitation at 7:40 in the mornings, and that the new library is staying open until 4:30 as long as students are using it.
- Since we are still in Octobere, a month dedication to our Blessed Mother, we closed with the boys singing Hail Holy Queen Enthroned Above it was wonderful.
- As junior **Jason Hipps** extinguished the prayer candle, I reminded the students that they must leave the gym and be the Light of God to all whom they meet. The students exited to the strains of "Autumn" by Vivaldi.



- **PLEASE patronize the MC's Bookstore.** Proceeds not help fund wonderful activities throughout the year and campus needs. For example, the MC funded over \$40,000 worth of school projects this past year.

Cell Phones:

- State Law prohibits motorists from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a handsfree manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- SPS Law allows students to use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed.

Driving: Please drive carefully and, if your son drives to school, stress traffic



safety with him. Saint Paul's is located in a residential neighborhood, so be VERY careful when approaching campus. Covington Police will ticket violators – and we will take disciplinary action against students as well. And remember: **cell phone use in a school zone is against the law and can be ticketed by police!**

Drug Testing: We have begun drug testing, choosing students both randomly and "for cause." Just because a student is tested does not mean he is suspected. Naturally, you may confidentially request that we add your son to the test list. We have committed more resources this year to increase the number of students tested. Know our policy by reviewing the handbook. A second positive result jeopardizes a student's place at SPS. Pray that students resist the allure of temporary pleasure over finding true meaning in life.

The participation of students on Sunday may only be voluntary. Never is an event to be mandatory on Sunday. The voluntary status of each event must be formally communicated to students and their families. Under no circumstance may punitive action take place, including any type of sarcasm, shame, or disgrace, as a result of the decision of the family for a student not to participate in a Sunday event. Anytime our school groups participate in a Sunday activity, it is up the moderator of the group to see that the Sunday obligation of Mass is fulfilled. Naturally, we will comply with this policy of Archbishop Aymond and the Office of Catholic Schools.


