

Rise Up 'O Men of God



CMSGT "Sarge" Harold Jenner passed away on Monday, October 29, 2018. Sarge is the father of Mark Jenner '79 and the husband of the late Dorothy "Dot" Jenner.

After 25 years of active service in the United States Air Force, "Sarge" continued the next seventeen years of his life teaching AFJROTC at Saint Paul's School.

During his years of service to our country, he was part of "The Greatest Generation", a veteran of World War II, as a B-17 Gunnery Sergeant. He was active in the Korean War in the B-29s and eventually became a CMSGT in the Strategic Air Command (SAC).

As an instructor at Saint Paul's, he introduced hundreds of young men to the discipline of the US Military. One of his proudest moments

was when two of his students joined the USAF and became fighter pilots flying the F-117 Stealth Fighter...two of only 556 pilots to fly this jet. Funeral services were held in Gulfport, MS. See obituary.



School News



How often do grandparents have the opportunity to experience the daily lives of their grandchildren?

On October 12th, the grandparents of over half of Saint Paul's students took advantage of such an opportunity. These lucky grandparents immersed themselves in the unique lives of their grandsons beginning with a ceremony celebrating this relationship... The ceremony, held in the Briggs Assembly Center, included a unique prayer service, a speech from the school's president, Brother Ray Bulliard, and a special performance by the liturgical band. The event began at 11:30 and lasted for an hour. It started with prayer: a call to worship from the campus minister Jeff Ramon, Class of '08, followed by the students in attendance proudly singing "Rise Up, O Men of God" to show their grandparents their commitment to serving God's people. Next, the entire congregation joined in the opening prayer, a call on God and Saints Joachim and Anne, who were the grandparents of Jesus, to guide grandparents in their example. Following this was a reading from 1 Corinthians 13:1-7, 11-13 about love read by Jacob Eilers '19. After the scripture reading was the responsorial psalm lead by the liturgical band. Christopher Wallace '19 then gave a memorable reflection describing how impactful his grandparents have been in his life. This lead to the Prayers of Intercession, which were read by brothers Daniel '22 and Thomas Bitterwolf '21. Concluding the ceremony were the closing prayer and closing song This Little Light of Mine.

After the prayer service, Brother Ray gave a speech based off the Saint Paul's mission statement, which calls the school to offer strong academic, athletic, and extracurricular activities in a safe and disciplined environment and to live by the Gospel values of Jesus. Brother Ray asked the students in the audience to explain to their grandparents how each of these points in the mission statement are lived out at Saint Paul's. The ceremony concluded and the students led their grandparents to their classrooms where teachers shared more about the rich Lasallian education they provide the boys. Some students and grandparents also went out to eat to extend the special day. Saint Paul's Open House

Saint Paul's School hosted the annual Open House on the 27th of October to give prospective students and their families a chance to tour the school and understand what makes Saint Paul's unique. The open house started at 1:00 pm with dozens and dozens of 6th and 7th graders gathering in the Brigg's Assembly Center, welcomed in by the extraordinarily talented brass band under the direction of Andrew Moran. There, after being greeted by Brother Raymond Bulliard, FSC, seniors Andrew Moore, President of Lasallian Youth Leaders, and Chris Wilson, Co-President of LYL and Vice President of Student Council, lead the prayer and the pledge.

Next, students Andrew Moore, Chris Wilson(Student Body Vice President), Josh Rovira (Student Body President), Luke Vargas, Hal Fox (Speech and Debate Captain), and Blake Bollinger (Junior Class President) each gave a speech to the crowd, explaining what makes Saint Paul's School a unique and wonderful educational experience based on the Mission Statement. The speeches ranged from experiences with teachers to the school's goal to improve diversity, running the gamut on topics for prospective students and their parents. Brother Ray discussed the application process students must go through in order to attend the school.

Student hosts lead groups of prospective students on a tour of the campus. Stops on this tour included the newly renovated Benilde Hall, where students will viewed the modern facilities, and brand new media center for the student newspaper, yearbook, and school news TV program. They also saw the chapel with religion teacher Jeff Ramon, checked out the beautiful stained glass and shined pews where prayer and meditation take place. Afterward, students toured the shop and the Eco Cars Club with science teacher John Carambat, learning about the processes of designing, building and racing these cars. Students also stopped at the Alumni Theater, the oldest building on campus, and learned about the theater program and caught a glimpse of the school production of *To Kill a Mockingbird*, the directorial debut of the new program head Gordon Carmadelle.

Prospective students visited the Gene Bennett Sports Complex, and observed the cutting edge weight room, football locker room, and got a glimpse of wrestling practice in the old gym. Then, students toured the recently constructed new gym. Once this athletic preview was concluded, students went into the Main School Building, and learned about the extensive science and biology programs from science teacher Marie Childs-Glover.

The open house concluded in the Briggs Assembly Center with cookies and water and a chance to ask questions to faculty and administrators. Prospective students left with knowledge of the extensive athletic and academic programs of Saint Paul's.

Feeding St. Tammany Parish One Can At a Time



Over the past fifteen years, Saint Paul's has been collecting thousands of pounds' worth of food for the hungry of Covington and St. Tammany Parish and Washington Parishes. At the beginning of November, posters are put up around campus, teachers announce the drive to their students, and Coach Sears, the dean of students, tells the student body and the faculty the details over the intercom. Students then bring in cans of green beans and corn, boxes of cereal, bags of rice, and jars of peanut butter. These are collected in bags in the classrooms



for two weeks during the drive. The Thursday before class lets out for Thanksgiving break; the student body brings the bags of food to seniors' trucks and loads them. These seniors then drive to the Covington Food Bank and deposit the food there. The drive is a huge help for the needy of area and it helps get them through Thanksgiving with plenty of food. This year, the drive was a great success; Saint Paul's collected over 10,600 pounds of food, stocking the shelves of the Northshore Food Bank just in time for the holiday season. According to Yvette Roussel, of the food bank, the donation provided: food boxes

for 300 families for the week of Thanksgiving, stocked the shelves for the upcoming holiday season, and provided peace of mind for those local families struggling with food issues. Ms. Roussel sent a thank you note to the school commenting, "We appreciate your continued support through these drives and volunteerism. The outpouring of generosity for the Food Bank from the Saint Paul's Family is second to none."

Saint Paul's School has been the largest single contributor the local food bank for a number of years, with their fall food drive. The students also help the food band with the "Stuff the Bus" campaign in the spring. This year members of the sophomore class used their service days before the Thanksgiving vacation to work at the food bank, sorting food, stocking shelves and packing boxes. The service to the food bank fulfills the Lasallian Core Principle, "concern for the poor and promotion of social justice."


Core Pack

Saint Paul's School introduced the CORE Pack special education program into its curriculum during the 2017-2018 school year. The program, directed by Mrs. Lauren Oggs Gee and taught by Mrs. Carla Barwick and Mr. Jean Nadau du Triel, serves to teach basic educational, social, and life skills to students with disabilities. CORE stands for Catholic Opportunity for Responsible Education and represents the Lasallian core principle of maintaining an inclusive community.

About four years ago, several schools in the New Orleans archdiocese were approached by Archbishop Gregory Aymond and asked to look into creating special needs programs. Saint Paul's initially decided not to because the school had no experience in this field. However, the following year, Archbishop Aymond specifically asked President Brother Ray Bulliard to create this program. According to the archdiocese, St. Tammany Parish had the highest need for a special needs program within a school. "The Northshore had many public schools with respectable special needs programs, but what the Northshore didn't have was a Catholic school with a special needs program," said Principal Trevor Watkins.

The new program was being considered as the provincial of the school district called upon all Lasallian schools to be more inclusive. St. Paul's recognized the opportunity the program offered and decided to start working on implementation. To start, the school began studying other programs similar to CORE. In the end, the SPS CORE Pack was based on St. Thomas More's special needs program in Lafayette, La.

Dia de los Muertos

Capping off the series of three holidays recognized by many Americans and Christians was the Day of the Dead ceremony at Saint Paul's on November 2. From Halloween to All Saints Day to All Souls Day, life at Saint Paul's was extremely busy that week. The day following the All Saints Day school mass on Thursday was the special Day of the Dead ceremony celebrating the souls of all those that have passed away. Students taking upper level Spanish courses assisted in celebrating the ceremony through special readings and other small tasks like lighting candles and holding baskets for the student body's prayer intentions. The slips of paper that students and faculty placed in the baskets contained the name of a loved one that they wished to pray for. These were then collectively prayed for during the ceremony.

The Spanish students read a special script about the traditions and facts of the Day of the Dead (Dia de los Muertos). This script describes the importance of the holiday: "The first day of the holiday is called dia del los inocentes, when the lives of deceased children are celebrated. Kids dress up as skeletons with makeup and costumes and do an activity similar to trick or treating, except children must sing in order to receive candy. On the second day, the deceased adults are celebrated. It is believed that the gates of heaven are opened on this day so people can reunite with their families. They make altars with memorabilia from their specific family's deceased members. One important aspect of the altar is that all four elements are recognized. Fire is present through the candles on the altar to light the way for souls to get into heaven.

Key Club


