

They refused to renounce their religious identity or to abandon the school or the community to save their lives. All died heroically as they pardoned their executioners and proclaimed Christ as the only King and Lord of their lives. These men are examples of faith and inspiration.

Cell Phones:


- State Law prohibits motorists from using any type of hand held wireless communications device while traveling through schools zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- SPS Law allows students to use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed.

Driving: Please drive carefully and, if your son drives to school, stress traffic safety with him. Saint Paul's is located in a residential neighborhood, so be VERY careful when approaching campus. Covington Police will ticket violators – and we will take disciplinary action against students as well. And remember: cell phone use in a school zone is against the law and can be ticketed by police!

Alumni Outreach: Starting with Southeastern Louisiana University, members of the Alumni Office, Counseling Department and Faculty are going to campus to learn more about how our alums there are doing, update you them on the happenings here at Saint Paul's, and treat them to lunch. Our venture is Wed, Nov 7, from 10:30 – 1:30 in Room 2202 of SLU's student union. I am grateful to alumni and development offices for initiating the outreach to our alums.

Eternal Rest Dept: CMSgt. Harold Jenner -- an SPS AFJROTC instructor from 1971-1988 -- died last week. His wife, Dorothy, was the school nurse during that time. They and their son, Mark '79, lived in the infirmary building, which is now the development office. Sarge and Dot devoted themselves to the school and especially to the Brothers. His military career is remarkable. He was a "waist gunner" on B-17s in WW II, flying in 23 missions. And he saw active duty in The Korean Conflict. One of his proudest moments was when two of his students joined the USAF and became fighter pilots flying the F-117 Stealth Fighter...two of only 556 pilots to fly this



jet. We give thanks for Sarge's life of service and pray for the consolation of his family.



Lasallian World: Our Superior General recently spoke at the Bishop's Synod (a major meeting) in Rome for a larger role for women. The two Rome-based umbrella groups representing nearly a million members of male and female Catholic religious orders around the world will present Pope Francis with a proposal to give women a larger role in the Synod of Bishops. Lasallian Br. Robert Schieler, one of two non-ordained religious brothers serving as members in the ongoing Oct. 3-28 synod on young people, said the proposal is "to consider how, in future synods going forward, we can get more voice from the sisters." Schieler, who leads the global De La Salle Brothers said in an Oct. 15 interview that the umbrella groups are planning to ask the pope about both participation of more women religious and the possibility of giving those who take part the power to vote in the discussions.

An estimated 99,000 teen passenger vehicle drivers were injured in motor vehicle traffic crashes.

Sunday Activities: I remind you of the policy of Archbishop Gregory Aymond that Catholic schools are not to schedule any activity on a Sunday. Recently, Superintendent of Catholic Schools Dr. RaeNell Houston sent out the following clarification on participation of Catholic school students in events hosted or sponsored by an outside agency: *Schools may participate in activities on Sundays that are hosted or sponsored by an outside entity only if certain conditions are met. The participation of students on Sunday may only be voluntary. Never is an event to be mandatory on Sunday. The voluntary status of each event must be formally communicated to students and their families. Under no circumstance may punitive action take place, including any type of sarcasm, shame, or disgrace, as a result of the decision of the family for a student not to participate in a Sunday event. Anytime our school groups participate in a Sunday activity, it is up the moderator of the group to see that the Sunday obligation of Mass is fulfilled. Naturally, we will comply with this policy of Archbishop Aymond and the Office of Catholic Schools.*

Vocation Awareness Week, Nov 4 – 11, is an annual celebration to promote vocations to priesthood, diaconate & consecrated life and to renew our support for those who are considering these particular vocations. *The Lasallian family is especially invited to participate in NVAW. As the Rule of the Brothers states, "The entire People of God is responsible for awakening vocations in the Church." For those seeking their path in life, Brother Superior General Robert Schieler, FSC, wrote in a 2017 letter on Founder's Day, as Lasallians, we need to invite young people to, "come and tell us where they find community, what gives the deepest meaning to their lives, what causes and concerns move them to action, and where they meet God in their lives?"
