Welcome to the sixth week (can you believe it?) of the second quarter! Time marches on; all we can do is make the most of it.

On November 17, the entire Lasallian World began a yearlong jubilee celebration observing the 300th anniversary of the death of our Founder, Saint John Baptist De La Salle that occurred on April 7, 1619. From the Christian Brothers' International website:

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The Year 2019 marks the tricentenary of the death of Saint John Baptist De La Salle. The Superior General and his Council asked for and received permission from the Pope to establish a jubilee year dedicated to Saint John Baptist de La Salle, Founder of the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools and patron of teachers.

The date that this Lasallian Jubilee Year is set to begin is November 17, 2018. The Lasallian Jubilee Year will end on December 31, 2019.

Still today, after three hundred years and following the footsteps of John Baptist De La Salle, the great De La Salle family is made up of about 4,000 Brothers, who, together with 92,000 teachers, educators and numerous lay collaborators, assist – in about 1,200 educational centers in 80 countries around the world – 1,380,000 pupils, children, young people and adults. To this today, after three hundred years and in the footsteps of John Baptist De La Salle, the Brothers, present in eighty countries, are committed to spreading the Gospel and culture among young people.

SPS will observe this jubilee year as we honor the 300th anniversary of the death of SJBDLS. Stay tuned! *Live Jesus in our hearts. Forever!*

- As time was running out, I
 - Introduced senior **Stephen Millet** who gave a brief history of Veterans Day;
 - Encouraged all to visit the special plaque in La Salle Hall dedicated to our SPS alumni veterans.
 - Recognized veterans on our faculty/staff: Mr. John Carambat, Mr. Mark Richards, Sgt Don Pressley, and retired Brother Duane Gregory. We also had a special veteran guest at assembly, Mr. Ron Hebert, who was speaking to some classes that day
 - reminded the students about Pvt. George Cox, SPS Class of 1951, who enlisted in the army following graduation to fight in the Korean Conflict and was killed less than a year later. Upon her passing, George's mother bequeathed a donation to SPS to memorialize her son, which he did so by remodeling all of the math classrooms

- Since we were observing Veterans Day, I told the students that we were going to sing "The National Anthem." I gave them a brief history of the anthem: Francis Scott Key, The War of 1812, The Battle of McHenry guarding the Baltimore Harbor from the British Fleet and the ultimate adoption of the anthem by the Congress. I instructed them on anthem etiquette: singing the anthem instead of talking to friends, standing at attention, not wearing hats, placing hands over hearts (or saluting by military or veterans) -- and then we started the music and I held my breath. The boys sang great! It was a moving moment!
- I ended the assembly by projecting the following Facebook Post on the screen, from a neighbor whose aunt (also a neighbor) was dying: What an incredible gift for a very sick woman. Thank you to St. Paul's Marching Wolves in Covington, LA for such an immediate thoughtful and respectful action. One of my aunt's most favorite things about living in downtown Covington was listening to the Marching Wolves as they marched around the neighborhood. It was something she was going to be sorry to miss in the coming months as her condition deteriorated. To our great surprise, the band came around the corner just this afternoon. We threw open the doors to her house so she could hear. I flagged down the Band Director, Andrew Moran, and told him that my aunt was inside the house and how she loved hearing the band each year. I asked if they could play a song as they marched by. He and the young men did even more. They stopped and turned to face her house, bowed respectfully, and began to play a fun rendition of "I Want You Back." My cousins, Adam Earhart and Gretchen Earhart Fischer, said that Aunt Ann perked up and smiled with she heard the band. The Marching Wolves completed their serenade with a thoughtful and touching prayer about "spreading love" and "sharing joy." Which is exactly what those young men did today. With great love they gave a gift to my family and we are grateful. I hope those young men know how they touched our family today. Thank you to the St. Paul's Marching Wolves. Go Wolves
- As junior Corbin Chitwood extinguished the prayer candle, I ended by urging urged the students to be "the love of God, the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit" to each and every person they would meet that day and always.
- It was a great assembly -- at least I thought so!

Athletics: Two more Fall Sports seasons ended over the holidays. Special recognition and thanks to:

- Aqua Wolves: I can't say enough great things about his incredible group of young men and their coaching staff. Day after day throughout the fall, these guys collectively swam many miles in practice and they receive very little acclaim. A small (only 9 qualified for state) but determined group of swimmers represented us in an exemplary manner and finished 4th in state! They deserve kudos for their 4th place in state. Development Office: Our Development team of Danielle, Shellie, Mimi, Karen and Al continue to work hard. I meet with them regularly. Appreciate and support their work. Recent events include:

• Launch of the Annual Fund on Nov 10. This appeal is critical to us moving forward. We published an Advancement Review. I have posted one in the Faculty Lounge. Pray for the success of the drive.

- Along with other Catholic organizations in the Archdiocese, we will participate in the I Give Catholic Campaign on Tue, Nov 27. This is an initiative by Archbishop Aymond to get the entire Community to support Catholic works. Videos were produced and emailed to constituents and posted on social media. We pray for the success of this day.
- And Mimi's social media posts deserve special mention! They are great and I hope you reference them.

Drug Testing: We have begun drug testing, choosing students both randomly and "for cause." Just because a student is tested does not mean he is suspected. Naturally, you may confidentially request that we add your son to the test list. We have committed more resources this year to increase the number of students tested. Know our policy by reviewing the handbook. A second positive result jeopardizes a student's place at SPS. Pray that students resist the allure of temporary pleasure over finding true meaning in life.

Exams: Semester exams begin on Dec 12. Remember that exams are SEMESTER exams that will cover the entire semester. The **semester grade** (the only grade that counts in GPA and the only grade on the transcript) will be averaged in the following manner: 40% for Quarter 1; 40% for Quarter 2; 20 % for the semester exam. Learning how to study for semester exams will aid your son considerably in college. The whole exam schedule is printed at the end of this newsletter and is posted on PP.

News We Can Use Dept:

- Smartphones & Surgeons: A professor of surgery says students have spent so much time in front of screens and so little time using their hands that they have lost the dexterity for stitching or sewing up patients. Ouch! Read the article at https://www.bbc.com/news/education-46019429
- Smartphones are linked to unprecedented sleep deprivation in teens. An analysis of two large national surveys finds the number of U.S. teens who reported sleeping less than seven hours a night jumped 22 percent between 2012 and 2015, by which time 43 percent of teens reported sleeping less than seven hours most nights, though sleep experts agree adolescents need at least nine hours. Contributing factors in the smartphone effect are the portable nature of these electronics and the sleep disruption their blue light causes. See the abstract and more on this story.
- Alcohol use disorder in parents correlates with dating violence risk for teens. New research finds that children exposed to a parent's alcohol use and its effects on the family are more likely to become involved in abusive dating relationships as adolescents. See more on this story.

Report Cards and Semester Grades: We emailed first quarter report cards four weeks ago. Check your spam folder if you didn't receive it. If it's not there, let me know and I'll send you another copy. Remember that the first quarter accounts for 40% of the semester grade, with the second quarter accounting for 40% and the semester exam accounting for 20%. Remember that the only grade that really counts is the SEMESTER grade – that's the one that goes on transcripts and is used to calculate grade point average.

Study Hall after School: the library is open every afternoon (Monday-Thursday) until 4:30. Students are free to come and go by signing in and out. You are encouraged to mention this service to your sons who are on campus after school with nothing to do or who may be waiting for a late ride or a practice to begin. All we ask is that they treat the facility with respect and that they are quiet. The space will be supervised by faculty. We will offer this service as long as there is a demand.

Sunday Activities: I remind you of the policy of Archbishop Gregory Aymond that Catholic schools are not to schedule any activity on a Sunday. Recently, Superintendent of Catholic Schools Dr. RaeNell Houston sent out the following clarification on participation of Catholic school students in events hosted or sponsored by an outside agency: *Schools* may participate in activities on Sundays that are hosted or sponsored by an outside entity only if certain conditions are met. The participation of students on Sunday may only be voluntary. Never is an event to be mandatory on Sunday. The voluntary status of each event must be formally communicated to students and their families. Under no circumstance may punitive action take place, including any type of sarcasm, shame, or disgrace, as a result of the decision of the family for a student not to participate in a Sunday event. Anytime our school groups participate in a Sunday activity, it is up the moderator of the group to see that the Sunday obligation of Mass is fulfilled. Naturally, we will comply with this policy of Archbishop Aymond and the Office of Catholic Schools.

Thanksgiving to Christmas: This period of the school year can be a real challenge. While it should be a time of good will and cheer, often we find ourselves handling a crisis. The best way to prevent any difficulty is through the Lasallian virtues of caring and vigilance – which will be in full force. Teachers will teach until the very end. **Parents, please remind your students to adhere to ALL procedures & policies and to think before they act.** We will show care to the students, but we will be vigilant.


