The tradition of the Luminaries came to Saint Paul's School from Santa Fe. The Christian Brothers ran Saint Michael's High School in Santa Fe and for many years owned and ran the College of Santa Fe. As Brothers moved from Santa Fe to Covington, they brought the tradition of the Luminaries with them. In Santa Fe, the Luminaries were used to light the way to Midnight Mass and, in a more symbolic way, to light the way for the coming of Jesus. For many years at Saint Paul's, this celebration was held for the resident students on the last night of their fall semester before returning home for the Christmas holidays. The Luminaries carried the symbolic meaning of lighting the way to Jesus, but also signaled a break from school work. The event which included Christmas Carols in Founder's Circle and a prayer service in the chapel was a wonderful send off for those students traveling miles home, and those who lived in town.

The Student Council, National Honor Society members, and other student volunteers manned the sand stations, the paper bags, and the trucks to distribute thousands of bags containing candles and prayerful thoughts around the campus for the annual lighting. The students worked diligently to make the campus a wonderland of light.

Founder's Circle was the gathering spot for the Christmas carols, and then everyone was invited to Our Lady of Peace Chapel for a prayer service. Paxton Ballard provided the explanation for the word displayed in Hunter Stadium.

"The word this year is the French word Frère, meaning 'Brother'. Traditionally, a Latin word has been chosen as the theme for Luminaries. However, this year, in commemoration of our French roots and Lasallian culture, a French word was chosen. 300 years ago, the patron saint of teachers and the founder of the Brothers of Christian schools, St. John Baptist de La Salle, entered into eternal life. 100 years ago, the Christian brothers found their way to St. Paul's and helped craft it into what it is today. Saint John Baptist de La Salle started his religious order in a way that was marked by a special comradery. This is why he chose the word "Frere," or brother, to refer to the members of his order. Brother is a word that envisions students as equals and allows for more of a mentor-like way of teaching. He understood that students spend almost as much time at school as they do at home, so he wanted to create a community of family within his schools." Following the prayer service, the guests were invited to a reception held in the cafeteria sponsored by the Mother's Club, with more Christmas treats, hot chocolate, and coffee. The Saint Paul's band added the final touches to this wonderful celebration with a concert of Christmas songs. Everyone enjoyed the evening and the candles and prayers on the bottom of each white bag burned long into the night.




