

Education: 1941 Graduate, awarded the Bachelor of Science Degree in Economics, from Loyola University of the South, New Orleans, LA.

Occupation: Former Vice President and Controller of Orleans Manufacturing Company in New Orleans, Louisiana. What do you value most about your Saint Paul's education and experience? As a young man of 12, the brothers of Saint Paul's instilled in me the principles of discipline, courage, obedience and hard work. As a full-time boarder at such a young age, Saint Paul's became my immediate family.

What is your favorite memory at Saint Paul's? My favorite memory at Saint Paul's was when I received the Best All-Around Student Athlete trophy at my high school graduation ceremony in 1937. Also, going back in October 2015 with my family to be honored as the oldest living alumnus during Founders Week was very memorable.

Who was your favorite or most impactful teacher? Brother Ernest Cocagne was my most impactful teacher. He was not only a great teacher and principal of the school, but he also interviewed me to study for the De La Salle Christian Brotherhood.

Alumni Give Presentations to Juniors on Career Day

In an increasingly competitive job market, knowing is half the battle: what career you want to pursue, that is. An estimated 20-50% of students enter college undecided, and approximately 75% change their major at least once before graduation. This indecision around career choices can be directly harmful to the educations and employment opportunities of college students scrambling to complete their majors and enter the work force. High schools recognize this, and many are starting to take steps beyond a standardized career aptitude test to get their students thinking about job options.

Saint Paul's is one of those schools. Mr. Al Nastasi, Alumni Director, invited eight alumni in various careers and Brother Michael Livaudais, FSC to talk to juniors about possible career choices.

Speakers included CPA Michael Sciortino, engineer Phil Nuss, attorney Chad Danenhower, veterinarian Dr. Jason Farrell, architect Justin Greenleaf, dentist Joel Burvant, construction manager Adam Martin, and physical therapist Craig Kingrea. This variety of career speakers provides students a direct connection between Saint Paul's and their prospective job options. Speakers instructed students about educational requirements and the day-to-day challenges of the job. Students also learned about starting wages for each career. The purpose of this activity, to get students thinking about careers, was achieved.

Career day at Saint Paul's is also very effective because, as the speakers are alumni, they have a very close connection to the school. Students were able to collect the contact information of the speakers, giving them an opportunity to further the dialogue surrounding the career and make connections locally in the field. This in itself is more effective than basic career testing, as the personal connection to the field is an invaluable tool for students.

One of Saint Paul's School's explicit goals is to provide a healthy environment for college readiness, a goal that is clearly being pursued through providing elective choices and interactive events.

In this competitive world, these programs are the leg up that students so desperately need to succeed. No doubt career day will continue for years to come, and it will only become more essential with time. The annual Career Day for members of the junior class is sponsored by the Alumni Department.

Rise Up 'O Men of God



Brother Jeffrey Calligan, FSC, of the District of San Francisco New Orleans, passed away on February 15, 2019, at the age of 79.

Brother Jeffrey was known both internationally and throughout the Lasallian Region of North America for his many contributions to the mission. Brother Jeffrey taught for nearly 30 years at the Buttimer Institute of Lasallian Studies (1988-2017). He also served for four years (2000-2004) at Christian Brothers Conference as Director of Formation and Religious Life Services, a role that focused on formation and catechetics.

On the local level, Brother Jeffrey was a religion teacher at both De La Salle High School in New Orleans as well as Saint Paul's in the 60's and 70's. See tour of duty. In addition, he was a prefect and was named the Dean of Students in 1972. In 1978, Brother Jeffrey became the 16th Christian Brother Principal of Saint Paul's School and remained principal until 1987, when President Brother Ray Bulliard, FSC took over. During Brother Jeffrey's tenure, several traditions were introduced: the "spirit stick" for homecoming pep rallies, the on-campus homecoming parade and dress-down day for homecoming day. Additionally, the senior retreat of today has roots in Brother Jeffrey's administration.

Other noteworthy events during Brother Jeffrey's tenure are: our current seven period, rotating, block

schedule is instituted; seniors sing "Rise Up O Men of God" during Commencement Mass for the first time; the Sacred Heart statue is designed and is placed in Founders Circle After Dixon Hall burns; and the Wolf Dome is added to the center of campus. Brother Jeffrey left Saint Paul's School in 1987 to continue advancing our Lasallian mission for the SFNO District and RELAN. He returned To Saint Paul's campus in 2014, where he resumed his role as a Guidance Counselor and continued in that capacity until right before his death.

A celebration of life funeral Mass will be held at Saint Paul's School on Friday, March 22 at 1:30pm in the New Gymnasium.

Academic achievement, an essential factor in the quality of any school, is a regularly celebrated occurrence at Saint Paul's sponsored by the Renaissance Board. One morning each of the first three quarters of the school year, students and their parents gather in the cafeteria by grade level to be commended for in-class accomplishments. These honor roll breakfasts are celebrations of the student's academic achievement and proof of his hard work in his studies.

In order to qualify for honor roll breakfast, students must have straight A's, or A's and B's, by the end of the respective quarter. The Gold Honor Roll is made up of students who have achieved straight A's, while the Blue Honor Roll is A's

Once entered into the cafeteria, parents and students find seats and wait for a Rick Gonzales's Chick-Fil-A catered breakfast and a card for a free sandwich at his establishment on Highway 190. Coffee is also provided. Once students and parents have gotten breakfast, served by the members of the administration and development departments, they open the meal with prayer. Then, President Brother Ray Bulliard, FSC, President of Saint Paul's, presents the crowd with four different vocabulary words. This quarter students and parents are learning: alacrity, eagerness; torpid, apathetic; gongoozler, an idle spectator; paragon, a model of excellence. He then delivers a rousing speech on the importance of academics to the school and the studiousness of those participating in the honor roll breakfast. Each student then stands when his name is called for recognition in either gold or blue honor roll. After some closing words, the breakfast disassembles and the students go to class.

Honor roll breakfasts for the second quarter were held on January 22, 23, 24, 30 and 31. The breakfast is an excellent opportunity to see a student's academic achievement manifested and a positive interactive experience for parents and students alike to get to know the school better.

Quality education is a Lasallian Core Principle and Saint Paul's is dedicated to sponsoring these academic assemblies and promoting diligence among the student body, and the honor roll breakfast is the perfect example of how our school stresses the importance of quality education, in conjunction with spiritual, athletic and social development for those young men entrusted to its care. by Hal Fox '20

National Merit Finalist!

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT)—which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.6 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry and participation requirements. Of the 1.6 million entrants, some 50,000 with the highest PSAT/NMSQT Selection Index scores (calculated by doubling the sum of the Reading, Writing and Language, and Math Test scores) qualify for recognition in the National Merit Scholarship Program. In September, these high scorers are notified through their schools that they have qualified as either a Commended Student or Semifinalist.

In early September, about 16,000 students, or approximately one-third of the 50,000 high scorers, are notified that they have qualified as Semifinalists. Eight of our students were recognized as Semifinalists. Several weeks ago, Saint Paul's School was notified that ALL of our Semifinalists had advanced to be Finalists. Beginning in March and continuing to mid-June, NMSC notifies approximately 7,500 Finalists that they have been selected to receive a Merit Scholarship award. Merit Scholarship awards are of three types: National Merit \$2500 Scholarships, Corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards or College-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards.

Saint Paul's Fighting Math Wolves have made an impressive start to the 2019 math competition season. The Wolves traveled to Catholic High in Baton Rouge to compete in mid January. Thirty-five Saint Paul's students competed in three divisions with over 600 students from thirty-three schools statewide. Individual winners from that tournament included: Zach Nicholas, fourth place, Geometry; Trey Paine, Algebra II, third place, Walker Dubreuil, Algebra II, honorable mention, and Adam Smith, Advanced Math, honorable mention. Winners in the team competitions included: Connor Dodson, Carter Murphy, and Zach Nicholas, first place, Comprehensive I; and Adam Smith, Graydon Hall, and Cameron Dougherty, first place, Comprehensive II. The Algebra II Team of Wesley Coles, Alexi Sotiropoulos, Walker Dubreuil and Trey Paine, earned third place. Andrew Norlin, Jackson Gold, Ross Hightower, and Hyde Healy won second place in Calculus B, and in Lower

Interschool, consisting of Algebra I and Geometry, Nicholas Reardon, Max Salvant, Brian Lea, Andrew Hightower, Zach Nichols, Carter Murphy and William Ditta earned a second place finish. The school finished in third place in the Sweepstakes.

At the end of January the Wolves traveled to Baton Rouge Magnet School to compete. Fifty Wolves joined 280 students from twenty-six schools in a day of math competitions. Individual winners included: Grisham Hall, second place and Ben Salvant third place in Algebra I; Carter Murphy, second place in Geometry; Wesley Coles, third place and Scott Woodard Honorable Mention in Algebra II, and Adam Smith, Honorable Mention in Advanced Math. In the team events: Comprehensive I, Preston Orgeron, Alex Dusang, Trent Caime, and Jonathan Hammer took fourth place; in Comprehensive II, Adam Smith, Patrick Reilly, and Alex Klocek won fourth place. In the Math Bowl, Advanced Math section, Brenden Dauterive, Josh Bonnet, Darrin Lea, and Marshall Unkauf finished in fourth place, while in Algebra II, Scott Woodward, Wesley Coles, Alexi Sotiropoulos, and Adam Cazayoux won second place. The Wolves finished second in the Sweepstakes competition. Saint Paul's Mu Alpha Theta, the national math honor society, sponsors the competitions and Susan Jordan and Pam Cullen serve as moderators for

State Soccer Champions!


Saint Paul's and Jesuit competed in the 2019 Allstate Sugar Bowl LHSAA Division I Boys' State Soccer Title match on Saturday, February 23 at the Ragin' Cajun Soccer/Track Complex, a rematch of the past two state titles. But the Wolves did not take long to demonstrate their prowess this evening. Fifty-three seconds into the game, the Wolves scored the first goal when Michael Dufour's head sent a left –footed free kick from Conner Walmsley into the back of the net. This was the first of Michael's three goals to set the tone of the game, giving the Wolves their fifth state championship in six years.

Dufour, the MVP of the game, scored again in the 47th minute and the 54th minute of the second half, making the final score Saint Paul's 3, Jesuit 0. Dufour's second goal came early in the second half on another header, this time off the right foot of junior Jimmy Till in the 47th minute. He completed the hat trick in the 54th minute with a successful conversion of a penalty kick. Goal keeper Trace Roberts stopped Jesuit's best shot of the night.

The nationally ranked Wolves completed the season undefeated against in-state opponents. The Wolve's only defeat this season came in the North Texas Elite Showcase against Cathedral High School of Los Angeles 2-1 in overtime. The Wolves advanced to the title game with wins over Mandeville, Baton Rouge-Catholic, and St. Amant in the semifinals.

The seniors were presented with two large group sessions. Brother Bill Parsons Quiz Bowl Tournament

On February 2nd, fourteen teams of participants from eight schools in Louisiana came together at Saint Paul's to compete in the Brother Bill Parsons Quiz Bowl Tournament. The schools consisted of Mt. Carmel, Lusher Academy, Catholic High School, Episcopal School of Acadiana, Fountainebleau, Haynes Academy, Woodlawn High School, and Saint Paul's School. Quiz bowl is a game in which two teams compete head-to-head to answer questions from all areas of knowledge, including history, literature, science, fine arts, current events, popular culture, sports, and more. A game consists of twenty toss-up questions, in which either team can answer by using a buzzer. The toss-up questions are worth ten points normally, but if a player buzzes in before a certain word in the question, they get fifteen points, or "power." If a player answers a toss-up question correctly, that team receives three bonus questions, which are all ten points each. The team can converse during the bonus questions, and the set of three questions is just as random as a toss-up question. For example, one toss-up question could be asking about a French poet in the 18th century, while the next asks about 2004 Super Bowl.

At the Brother Bill Parsons Tournament, each team played six matches to determine their seeding for the playoff rounds. These matchups sometimes pitted teams from the same school against one another, making it even more competitive. These six matches were played throughout the morning and into the afternoon until the playoff bracket had been formed. There was a consolation bracket for those teams that did not have many wins, and the playoff bracket for those competing for the trophy. The playoff bracket came down to Saint Paul's Team A and Haynes Academy Team A. The Saint Paul's team whose members included: Ross Hightower, Stephen Millet, Sam Avenel, Blake Ramsey, Noah Savoie, and Gabe Gros, lost in a hard-fought match and was named runner-up in the tournament. Haynes Academy Team A won the tournament and took home the trophy. Some individual players were also recognized for answering the most questions correctly: Joey Rosengrant from Lusher, Amanda Waelde from Haynes, and Lorraine Steigner from Mt. Carmel Academy. The tournament was a great success because it brought people together to test their knowledge in the intense game of quiz bowl.

Saint Paul's Tournament is named in honor of Brother Bill Parsons, FSC, a long time member of the English faculty and English Department Chair. In his many years at Saint Paul's he was an exemplary Lasallian educator, and the excellence of the quiz bowl team was a matter of pride. He is fondly remembered by his former students and colleagues, and the tournament is a testimony to his spirit. Mrs. Kelly Hightower is the current moderator for the quiz bowl team. 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
