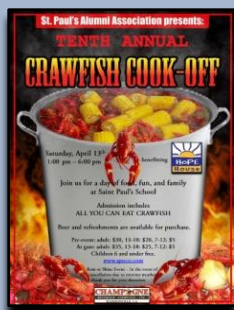

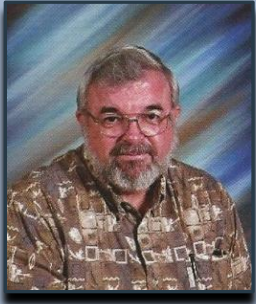

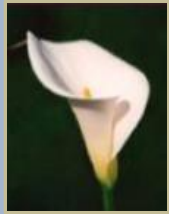

A new, exciting curriculum was introduced to Saint Paul's campus in February. Students in the business program now have the unique opportunity to work in a PJ's located in the newly renovated Benilde Hall. The cafe provides hands-on experience to students in several different sectors of the business program. For example, students in Coach Drivon's class keep the books. Students in Mr. Logarbo's entrepreneurship class were the ones who got the cafe up and running, and they manage the business. They also create equations to improve margins and maximize profits. Mr. Pellegrini's law classes look over contracts and other legal aspects of the business. PJ's was chosen because of the school's connection to the company (Paul and Scott Ballard, who own PJ's through Ballard Brands, LLC, and both have sons at Saint Paul's), as well as the fact that the coffee shop model provides a perfect business lab for students hoping to gain real working experience.

While many Saint Paul's students are excited to have a coffee shop on campus, those interested in pursuing business and entrepreneurship are ecstatic to have an opportunity to apply the things that they have learned in class in a real-world setting. In the same way students in Chemistry apply concepts they learn in class in a laboratory setting, the PJ's in Benilde Hall is the new business lab. Mr. Logarbo likened the new curriculum to a capstone course in college or grad school. A capstone course is a group project in which students demonstrate that they have mastered the skills that will be necessary for their degree or field. "The work students do in the coffee shop is really the culmination of the business path at Saint Paul's," Logarbo explained. "A lot of stuff that these kids are experiencing in this lab are things that you won't see until your MBA program."

The curriculum has absolutely exceeded expectations in its first few weeks. The PJ's has quickly become one of the most crowded places on campus. It is only a matter of time before the lab outgrows the space it currently operates in. It is clear to staff and students alike that eventually the PJ's will be forced to expand elsewhere on campus to keep up with growing demand. This rapidly increasing demand is driven in part by the creativity of business students. "The guys who work in that shop are constantly innovating and coming up with new drinks, which is really encouraging them to be creative and solve problems in real time," said Mr. Logarbo. All the buzz has made younger students more eager to follow a business path. Eighth-grader Max Biggs remarked, "I definitely want to take business all four years so I can get the experience of working in the PJ's."

The new curriculum would not have been possible without the support of the Ballard family. Ballard Brands has allowed the shop in Benilde Hall to function as a franchise and has made all of the Brand's resources available to Mr. Logarbo and his students. The Ballard family has clearly made a huge investment in the business program at Saint Paul's and has been key in providing students with an opportunity very few high schools can offer.

Perhaps the most important and impressive facet of the business lab is the involvement of SPS CORE pack students. Students in the school's special education program will receive valuable experience working in a functional coffee shop. "The involvement of the CORE pack was always a very key part of our plan for the curriculum," Logarbo said. CORE pack students will help sell and make drinks, as well as learn how to operate some of the equipment.

Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra at Saint Paul's



The award-winning Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra took Saint Paul's by storm with a stroke of the cello and plucking of the bass. The LPO performs several concerts throughout the year across Louisiana, featuring classical pieces by composers such as Beethoven and Stravinsky as well as some popular movie scores from the likes of *Pirates of the Caribbean* and other works of pop culture.

Saint Paul's was honored to accept the LPO, and the entire school as well as many Junior High Schools in the area enjoyed the show. The performance included a comical educational act that taught the students and staff the different elements in an orchestra and how composers put these elements together. Although the act targeted younger children, it still taught the students of Saint Paul's that an orchestra can sing as well as play. They taught the students and staff the importance of having rhythm and a melody. As the LPO explained the bits and pieces, the pieces gradually advanced and became more compelling.

The LPO opened with Klaus Badelt's *Pirates of the Caribbean*. After which they began *Form the New World*. The LPO explained to the students that you can use the same tune over and over again and it will not sound the same by changing the pitch, melody, and volume. They exhibited this by playing *Simple Gifts*. The LPO included the students by having them sing with the orchestra playing *Ode to Joy*. Right after a wonderful performance of *Ode to Joy*, they went into Johann Sebastian Bach's *Little Fugue* in G minor. Next, they wanted to show how composers used the instruments to mimic the sounds of a storm by performing Ludwig Van Beethoven Allegro's *Storm*. The orchestra went on to perform Igor Stravinsky's *The Firebird*. They then concluded with Jim Papoulis's *Oye* that consisted of singing and dancing from the actors and some students.

Students and faculty left the Briggs Assembly Center wanting more and with a curiosity of the music and the elements that make up a music piece. St. Joseph's Altar

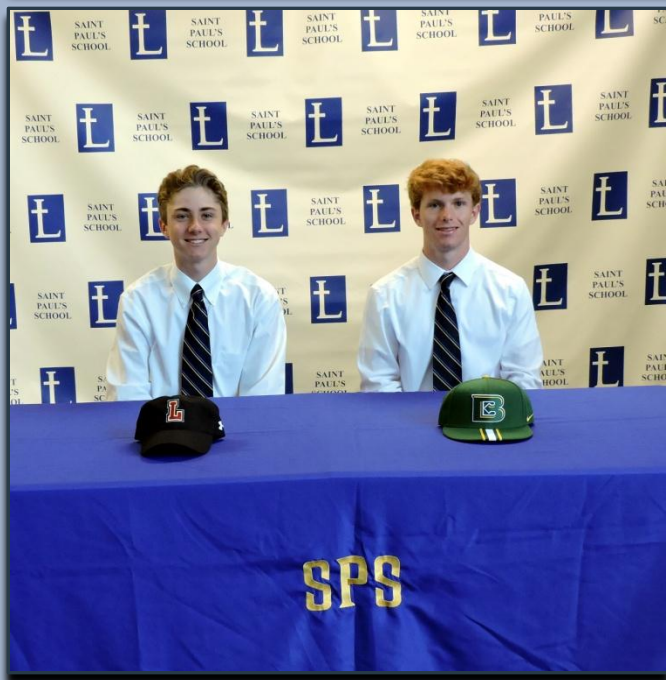

Saint Paul's Iron Wolves have had a very exciting end to the state season. In the regional competition the Wolves finished second to Holy Cross in a deliberation that took over an hour. Wolves placing in the regional meet included: Zach Montz, third place; Joshua Kellum, first place; Connor Oviedo, fifth place; Mason Impastato, first place; Philip Nicuad, first place; Logan Shilatz, third place; Jack Anzalone, third place, Jacob Frolich, fourth place; and Jason Toups, first place. Jason Toups set a regional squat record of 690 pounds, and a total record of 1710 pounds.

On March 14th and 15th, the Wolves traveled to Alexandria for the state competition. Alexandria won the state title for Division I; however the runner up trophy was hotly contested. Covington High, Holy Cross, Slidell and Saint Paul's were separated by just four points for most of the event. The Wolves diligence and hard work paid off, defeating Holy Cross by just one point, and bringing home a trophy.

Four lifters finished in the top places in the state competition including: Joshua Kellum, Philip Nicaud, and Jason Toups all earning state champion titles and Jack Anzalone finished in fourth place. Although competition in the state of Louisiana is complete, five Iron Wolves will travel to the national competition in two weeks, including: Connor Oviedo, Mason Impastato, Philip Nicaud, Jack Anzalone, and Jason Toups. Jesse Kellum and Josh Gast coach the Iron Wolves.

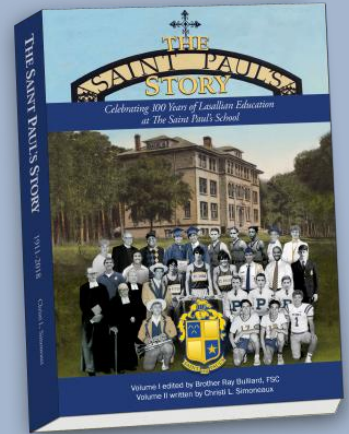
