Welcome to the final week of the 3rd quarter & the 1st week of Lent! To begin Lent, here are some quick facts:

- Lent is the 40 days before Easter, not counting Sundays. The word comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten" meaning spring. The symbolism of 40 days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for his ministry and being tempted by Satan.
- Purple is typically associated with Lent, suggesting repentance and solemnity. Purple is full of symbolism. Its deep dark richness invites us to slow down and consider the sacrifices Jesus did for us.
- In most Christian denominations, Lent starts on Ash Wed, derived from the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of the faithful as a sign of repentance to God. The ashes are made from blessed palms from previous Palm Sunday.
- The practices of Lent involve prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.
- Lent originated in the first three centuries A.D. and, over the centuries, developed from a one- or two-day observance to forty days.



- In Eastern traditions, there is no Ash Wednesday. Rather, the Orthodox Church observes Clean Monday, a time to purify the soul of sinful, selfish attitudes. Indeed, the entire first week of Lent is often dubbed "Clean Week," a time of confession, abstinence and springcleaning.
- McDonald's Filet-O-Fish sandwich was inspired by Good Friday. Lou Groen, a McDonald's franchise owner in a Catholic section of Cincinnati, noticed that his burger sales were dropping off on Fridays. His solution, in 1962, was to come up with the now-famous fish sandwich.

Here's a prayer appropriate for Lent:

Behold, Lord, an empty vessel that needs filling. Fill it, Lord. I am weak in faith; strengthen me. I am cold in love; warm me and make me fervent, that my love may go out to my neighbor. I do not have a strong and firm faith; at times, I doubt and am unable to trust you altogether. O Lord, help me. Strengthen my faith and trust in you. In you, I have sealed the treasure of all I have. I am poor; you are rich and came to be merciful to the poor. I am a sinner; you are upright. With me, there is an abundance of sin; in you is the fullness of righteousness. Therefore, I will remain with you, of whom I can receive, but to whom I may not give. Amen.

Mon, Mar 11 (Regular; F G A B) Daylight Saving (not Savings) Time began at 2:00 am yesterday. Hope you sprang forward!



CPR & Stop the Bleed Program: Continuing our efforts to promote student health and safety, we will be providing Stop-the -Bleed and CPR workshops to all of our students and faculty. These 90-minute workshops will begin this week. Lakeview Regional Medical Center, Pontchartrain Cancer Center, Mandeville Fire and Acadian Ambulance Service have generously donated time and expertise to bring these lifesaving skills to our students and staff.

Uncontrolled bleeding is the most preventable cause of death. The greater the number of people who know how to control bleeding in an injured person, the greater the chance of survival of an injury. Help given by an immediate responder can often make the difference between life and death, even before a professional rescuer arrives. With the right training, we all can help save lives!

Below is a brief description of the skills we will learn during the workshop.

Stop the Bleed

The focus of the Program is to:

- Teach immediate response to bleeding
- Recognize life-threatening bleeding
- Learn appropriate ways to stop the bleeding
- · Hands on & return demonstration of wound packing & tourniquet application

<u>CPR- Hands only CPR</u> Students will learn:

- the basics of hands only CPR to save a life.
- how to activate the EMS calling 911
- the steps of Friends and Family CPR
- · hands on and return demonstration of CPR and AED use

We are grateful to LRMC and PCC for sponsoring these programs. We will also offer a more extensive class leading to CPR Certification to students/faculty who would like further training.

Cold Weather: ONLY SPS cold weather wear is accepted. On VERY cold days, a non-SPS coat (but notcamo) can be worn OVER an SPS sweatshirt. If you cannot afford one, contact me and I will take care of it confidentially.

Driving: I call the following to your attention:

- **Driver's License Requirement:** You need TWO of these: one when your son applies for his learner's permit and ANOTHER when he goes for his permanent license. Several parents have been turned away, not knowing they needed another form. Don't blame me! This is a legislative action.
- **SAFE DRIVING:** Parents –let's start 2018 with a resolution for safe driving! Set an example for the students! Students the neighbors are watching (and filming!) and we will take action! This applies at all times: after school, after practice, on weekends, at games, etc. Please obey the traffic laws: speed limit, no tailgating, no texting while driving, no cell phone use during school zone hours, buckle up, etc. Thank you!
- School Zone Cell Phone Ban: It is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone while driving. I see some students and parents driving in the morning and using a cell phone. This sets a bad example and is illegal. Please do not drive on campus during school zone hours while using a cell phone.



Drug Testing: We have begun drug testing, choosing students both randomly and "for cause." Just because a student is tested does not mean he is suspected. Naturally, you may confidentially request that we add your son to the test list. We have committed more resources this year to increase the number of students tested. Know our policy by reviewing the handbook. A second positive result jeopardizes a student's place at SPS. Pray that students resist the allure of temporary pleasure over finding true meaning in life.

Heartiest congratulations, NM Finalist Wolves! **Greater Lasallian World:** On March 16, The San Francisco New Orleans (SFNO) District will celebrate the Sesquicentennial Anniversary of the arrival of the Christian Brothers in CA.

On Aug 10, 1868, the first Brothers sailed into San Francisco Bay and made the five-mile trip to Saint Mary's College. At the time, Brothers had been teaching in the United States for only eleven years and numbered about 200. Their arrival led to the establishment of the District of San Francisco, which by 1901 boasted 94 Brothers teaching in 13 schools with a total enrollment of 2,306. Current Lasallian schools in California include: Cathedral HS, Los Angeles; Christian Brothers High School, Sacramento; Cristo Rey De La Salle East Bay High School, Oakland; De La Salle Academy, Concord; De La Salle HS, Concord; De Marillac Academy, San Fran; Justin-Siena High School, Napa; La Salle High School, Pasadena; Sacred Heart Cathedral Preparatory, San Francisco; Saint Mary's College of California, Moraga; & Saint Mary's College High School, Berkeley.

The SF event is one of three 2018-2019 Lasallian anniversary observances by the SFNO District. In July 2018, a District marked the 100th anniversary of Christian Brothers' continuous presence in LA. Throughout 2019, the we commemorate the 300th year since the death of Saint John Baptist de La Salle, Founder of Brothers of the Christian Schools and Patron Saint of Teachers of Youth.

Greater Lasallian World II: San Miguel High School, the Lasallian School in Tucson, announced that Principal Armando Valenzuela has resigned, effectively immediately. The school and the San Francisco New Orleans District of Christian Brothers thank Armando for his contributions to the school over the past two years and wish him well. Let us keep President Dave Mason and the entire San Miguel community in our thoughts and prayers throughout this time of transition. San Miguel is a Christo Rey model school, where low-income students attend class four days a week and work at an internship one day a week that pays their tuition.

Greater Lasallian World III: A Message from Brother Donald Johanson, Provincial: Superior General, Brother Robert Schieler, FSC, informed the Institute that a medical check-up revealed cancer on part of his liver. According to Brother Robert, the cancer is in a confined area and, given the early diagnosis and his general good health, the prognosis for his recovery is good. He is moving forward with treatment and is in excellent spirits. I ask that we join the members of the worldwide Lasallian family in offering our prayers for Brother Robert's healing, and that God will continue to strengthen him in his *journey back to full health.*

My Houston Vacat...uh, Conference: Trevor and I spent three productive days in Houston with over 150 Lasallian colleagues, mostly from the 52 US Lasallian schools. A brief recap:

- Sun night: checked into JW Marriott Galleria Hotel (nice!) We opened with a brief business meeting (yawn) but were energized by a Wine and Wisdom Session -- small groups "break the ice" and discuss some common issues. We then closed the evening with a very nice social (great chardonnay!) to reacquaint ourselves with our colleagues and relax from our day's travel. And like Las Vegas, what goes on at the social, stays at the social!
- Mon AM: We heard a keynote address by Dr. Karen Eifler, Education Professor at the University of Portland and national speaker/author. Her talk was titled "Oui, Whee, & We" which sounds hokey but was actually very good! Simply put: Oui we must say "yes" to our Mission of Lasallian education; Whee we must exude and spread joy in our work; and We we must do so together and by association.
- After table discussion and a break, we met by Districts: The District of Eastern North America (DENA), the Midwest District, and the San Francisco New Orleans District (SFNO). Our District leadership team led us through a number of issues specific to our schools.
- After lunch, I met with the Presidents of Lasallian schools while Trevor met with principals. We discussed many common problems such as finances, faculty formation, safety, and marketing.
- On Mon night, the San Francisco New Orleans contingent met for dinner at Café Annie very nice! We "passed a good time" I'll leave it at that! After an exhausting day, we retired for the night!
- On Tue, Mr. Mark Freund, Executive Director, Office of Lasallian Education of the Christian Brothers Conference, gave regional stats. Overall, Catholic school enrollment is down including Lasallian schools (although not as severe.) The number of Brothers continues to decline, too. The future challenges are great.
- Mr. Tom Gartland, former CEO of Avis and now a noted author and speaker, then addressed us on *Lead with Heart*. Again, interesting and challenging! His main message? Reduce the "professional distance" that leaders too often have between themselves and those who report to them. I picked up some tips.
- In late morning, we had a sobering session: *Detecting and Disrupting Insider and Outsider Perpetrated Threats by* Dr. John Nicoletti, Police Psychologist and CEO of Nicoletti-Flater Associates. He presented best practices for schools to use to prevent an attack. The key? Detection before the person becomes so disaffected that they feel the need to disrupt. I took comfort in knowing that we have implemented at SPS most of what he recommended. We pray for the safety of all in schools!
- In the afternoon, I attended a session on "Ramping Up the Annual Fund" and another one on "Online Faculty Lasallian Formation". Both were excellent. Trevor attended ones on

"Threat Detection" and "Social and Emotional Learning in Schools". He said they were very informative.

- The day ended with a Mardi Gras-themed social (our northern/western colleagues had no idea what to do with the beads) that ended about 7. Some younger, more robust attendees kept the fun going, but yours truly retired for the night! Again, what went on at social, stays at social!
- On Wed morn, Bro. Robert Schaefer, Secretary for Formation, addressed us on the new Lasallian formation handbook for Mission. He stressed the need to form our faculties in the one Mission of the Church (the message of Jesus) in a Lasallian way. He was excellent but challenging. We then headed for the airport.
- Well, that's more than you wanted to know, but know that I was not on vacation! Kudos to Southwest Airlines for flights that didn't tax my nervous system too much except for a few minutes each way when it was WAY TOO bumpy and my rosary was put to good use! As always, I said a prayer of thanks as SW Flight 19 touched ground only fifteen minutes late at Louis Armstrong Airport at 2:50 PM Wed and an hour and fifteen minutes later as I reentered the holy ground of Saint Paul's School.


