108th Graduating Class of Saint Paul's School

Saint Paul's School honored the class of 2019, the 108th graduating class, with the traditional commencement ceremony on Saturday, May 18th, 2019 at 4:00 pm. in the Briggs Assembly Center on Saint Paul's Campus. One hundred fifty-one students received diplomas from Brother Raymond Bulliard, FSC, President of Saint Paul's School, at the graduation mass celebrated by Reverend Matthew Clark, OSB, Chaplain of Saint Paul's, The Most Reverend Robert Muench, Bishop Emeritus of Baton Rouge, Reverend Glenn LeCompte, and Deacon Jeffrey Stein. Mr. Trevor Watkins, Principal, served as Master of Ceremonies, while Assistant Principal, Mr. Joe Dickens, Senior Counselor, Mrs. Renee Miller, and Dean of Students, Mr. Ken Sears assisted with awards and diploma presentations. Brother Ken Boesch, FSC served as the musician for the graduation ceremony. The Mothers' Club of Saint Paul's sponsored an outdoor reception on campus following the ceremony for the Class of 2019 and their guests.

The class of 2019 boasts a number of major academic and athletic accomplishments. They have been accepted to 120 colleges and universities and have earned over eighteen million dollars in scholarships. Fourteen students were recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Program: Beau Franklin, Rafael Guzman Arvelo, David Needles, and Christopher Wilson were recognized as National Merit Hispanic Scholars. John Paul Bourgeois, Nicholas Briggs, Beau Franklin, Jacob Lauterbach, and Blake Ramsey were Commended Scholars. Jackson Gold, Hyde Healy, Ross Hightower, Cullen Irwin, Stephen Millet, David Needles, Andrew Norlin and Christopher Wilson were National Merit Scholarship Finalists. Jackson Gold was awarded a scholarship from the National Merit Corporation. Forty-two seniors were named to All State Academic Sports Teams by the state of Louisiana.

Eighteen members of the 2019 class of Saint Paul's participated in the Louisiana State University Spring Testing Program and earned over 180 hours of college credit valued at over \$132,000.

Twelve seniors will attend colleges and universities on scholarships that will allow them to continue their athletic careers in Baseball, Football, Lacrosse, Soccer, and Track: William Duncan will play baseball at Chattanooga State; Jacob Yancey will play baseball at Rhodes College and Kyle Mc Laughlin will play at Belhaven College. Trace Roberts will continue his soccer career at Bridgewater College, while Conner Walmsley will play soccer at College of Charleston. Christopher Flood will play Lacrosse at Seton Hill and his teammate Austin Holincheck will play Lacrosse at Lander University. Owen Hnatyshyn will go to Indiana Wesleyan University for football. Southeastern Louisiana University will have two members of the class of 2019, Robert Buquoi in football and Frankie Durio on the track team.

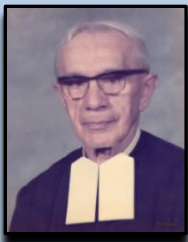

Brother Charles Crouzet, FSC Award

Brother Charles Crouzet was a founding Christian Brother at Saint Paul's School in 1918. He was a consummate educator: gentle, kind, totally committed to his students, innovative in approach and methodology, deeply spiritual and very humble. He was not one to draw attention to himself, but quietly went about his work, always striving to improve things, always working for the good of his students, always reliable and professional.



Mark Richards emulates the best qualities of Brother Charles. He actually knew Brother Charles as he was a student at Saint Paul's when Brother Charles was still alive and teaching in the 1970s. Over the past almost twenty-five years of teaching at Saint Paul's, Mark has become a stalwart figure among our teachers. He has been the introduction to Saint Paul's science for literally thousands of prefreshmen students as he led them through the mysteries and challenge of earth science and, more recently, the exciting world of circuitry and engineering. He is more than a science teacher and adds so many other talents to our school. He is a living

example of the Lasallian core principle of concern for the poor and social justice, as he spends hours in the on-campus vegetable garden, growing fresh food for the Northshore food bank. His concern for the environment, one of the United States Catholic Bishops social justice concerns, is legendary. He has cleaned rivers and towns, planted hundreds of trees both on land and in swamps, recycled loads of waste items, and promoted environmentally sustainable living whenever he could. Saint Paul's Science Department, and, indeed, our entire school, have benefitted from his talents. Mark Richards does not lead by words, but by example.

Craig Ketelsen, Athletic Director of Saint Paul's, welcomed the students and guests and Josh Rovira, President of the Student Council, led the group in the traditional Lasallian Morning Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance. The video "Champion" grabbed everyone's attention and the theme of the event recalled the quotation, "Heroes are made by the path they choose, not by the powers they have." Saint Paul's student athletes have made heroic decisions spending hours practicing, training, and traveling.

Coach Ketelsen provided some of the amazing athletic statistics for the 2018-19 school year: over 500 members of the student body participated in at least one sport, many played two, and some participated in each of the three seasons.
