Welcome to the eighth week of the fourth quarter of the 2018-19 school year! Only two weeks to go!
This is National Etiquette Week (NEW), designed to raise awareness of the importance of courtesy, civility, and good manners in everyday life. - Faults committed when you speak against the charity due your neighbor

Almost any human action you can imagine (especially in the life of
 boys!) is covered in this book - which was used to teach reading as well as manners. While parts are humorous by today's standards, the overarching message is that civility and decorum are not optional traits. And our job as educators and parents is to help students adapt to the civil and decorous demands of modern day life. Please encourage your sons to practice civility, especially manners, this week - and always -- and let's all commit to setting the example for the young people entrusted to our care.

Annual Fund: You can't say I'm not persistent! For clarity, I offer the following:

- If you are contributing to the Capital Campaign or financially supporting SPS in some other way, I understand! Thank you for your generosity. Can you send $\$ 10$ so I can show an increase in AF participation?
- Please consider helping if you have not already done so and are in a position to do so. Many thanks!

Driving: I call the following to your attention:

- Driver's License Requirement: You need TWO of these: one when your son applies for his learner's permit and ANOTHER when he goes for his permanent license. Several parents have been turned away, not knowing they needed another form. Don't blame me! This is a legislative action.
- SAFE DRIVING: Parents -let's start 2018 with a resolution for safe driving! Set an example for the students! Students - the neighbors are watching (and filming!) and we will take action! - In the past, this ceremony has been a very positive and impressive one, and we'll do our best to make it so again on May 17. It takes place within a Catholic Liturgy of the Word, with the boys singing a number of songs.

- Ignorance and a lack of peace/love. Teach peace (internal and external) to all children and people
- Hate, discrimination, and persecution are all done from a place of ignorance and low self-esteem. When education is limited, hate grows. The only way to stop it is education and direct action.
- Hate is caused by jealousy...Discrimination is caused by social influences that are formed in a community. These can be slowed by speaking out against them and welcoming everyone in the community.
- Selfishness, greed, and pride are the roots of these problems. People are raised to draw attention to themselves and then those characteristics come out.
- It, in part, is ignorance and possibly fear of the unknown. It can also be fueled by pride. It can be prevented by remembering that everyone is a child of God.
- People teaching their children to hate.
- I think it comes from people not understanding other people's point of views an experiences.
- I think the main cause is simply misunderstanding coupled with tradition. If the generation before you mistakenly views other cultures as inferior or evil, that can lead them to raising your generation to automatically believe false ideas.
- Hate is taught and not just something you have.
- People should be taught tolerance and ways to prevent such tragedies.
- Acts of bias - Acts of discrimination - Acts of violence - genocide
- Fear causes us to do the irrational and to view things in a different manner.
