## **MARANATHA!**



We begin December celebrating the season of Advent – which is the beginning of the new Catholic Church year -- a time of waiting. Advent commemorates the centuries of our awaiting the Messiah. Catholic families put out Advent wreaths, the priest wears purple vestments, and Jessie trees spring up – all to remind us of the season of waiting for the "fullness of time."

I like Advent. I know I'm in the minority here, but I find it a very human season. I know, too, that our students don't like Advent because they don't like the concept of waiting. They routinely grumble about waiting in the cafeteria line, about how far away a particular event is that they are looking forward to, etc. Somehow, in our instant gratification society that emphasizes getting what you want as quickly as possible, patience is no longer promoted as a virtue. In a world where we upgrade to faster computers, buy faster Internet access, text and tweet instead of talk, deliver overnight, buy faster cars, patronize establishments that offer

"lunch in ten minutes or it's free" and emphasize that time is money, our students no longer know how to wait. And yet think about how much time we do spend waiting: in store lines, in traffic jams, for the check that's in the mail, for a happy time to occur or a difficult time to end.

Think about your son and how much time you have spent and continue to spend waiting for him: to be born, to learn to talk, to take his first step, to develop his talents, in the car pool line, to come home from a date, to see the importance of grades, to learn to appreciate family and life, to mature.

Advent teaches us to turn times of waiting into times of grace. At my next assembly, I will remind the students of one of the oldest prayers in the Church. It consists of just one word: *Maranatha*, which is Aramaic for "Come, Lord." If we can fill our time of waiting with God's presence, then the whole concept of patience will take on a new and more fulfilling meaning. What a wonderful way to fill periods of waiting! Use it as a greeting, too. Your spirits will be renewed and your time of waiting will be filled with blessing.

Maranatha! Come, Lord!



- Traditional Feast of St. Nicholas: From American Catholic.org: Eastern and Western Churches honor Nicholas; it is claimed that, after the Blessed Virgin, he is the saint most pictured by Christian artists. - TDIH II: 11660, a female actress appeared as Desdemona in Shakespeare's *Othello*, probably the first appearance by a woman actress in England. For years, female roles were played by boys or men. The British saw women on stage much earlier when a traveling troupe from France included women as well as men. But they were not received well according *to* one audience member, the women were "hissed, hooted, and pippin-pelted off the stage." In 1632, William Prynne published a 1,100-page document condemning the theater, particularly actresses. But by 1660, actors were confident enough to feature a woman as Desdemona in *Othello*. There is no record of who the actress was, but scholars guess that it was Margaret Hughes, whom Samuel Pepys described as "a mighty pretty woman."

**ADMISSIONS FOR 2020-21: THANK YOU!** Yes, I am shouting – for joy! I was VERY pleased with the number of applicants for next year and offer my thanks to YOU – for promoting SPS Lasallian education to so many of your friends and neighbors. We routinely heard about the positive recommendations given prospective families by our current or former families. I am grateful beyond measure. **The next step in the process is Application Day testing on Jan 11. Please stress with people that this is a placement test, not an admissions test**. We base admissions on the total elementary school record.

At this point, Catholic high schools may not recruit any current students in Catholic elementary schools – as those students have already made their choice of high school. The only families I can still speak to are those in public and private schools. If you know of a family interested, I will be happy to meet and tour with them. Priority in admissions is given to students who take the placement test on Jan 11. As it stands now, we will have to put applicants after that date on a waiting list. Again, THANK YOU (yes, I'm still shouting for joy!)

**COLD WEATHER OUTERWEAR:** Only Saint Paul's outwear is permissible in cool/cold weather. **If your son needs an SPS sweatshirt and money is tight right now, just have him come see me. I will handle this confidentially and appropriately.** Remember that we allow ONLY SPS cool weather clothing.

**DECEMBER:** Welcome to the twelfth (even though deca means ten – I hope you know why this discrepancy exists) and last month of the calendar year. December is Bingo's Birthday Month, Buckwheat Month, National Drunk & Drugged Driving (3D) Prevention Month, National Impaired Driving Prevention Month, National Tie Month, National Write A Business Plan Month, Safe Toys and Gifts Month, Spiritual Literacy Month, Make a New Year's Resolution to Stop Smoking Month, Universal Human Rights Month, Worldwide Food Service Safety Month, and Youngsters on The Air Month. **DRIVER'S LICENSE REQUIREMENT:** Remember that all minor applicants must produce proof the applicant has either received a diploma or is currently enrolled in a high school program. This is done through a school attendance form from his or her high school prior to applying for a driver's license. Any SPS student needing this form should come to Counseling Office or Administration Building Office to request the form. You won't be able to get a license without one!



**DRUG TESTING:** We have begun drug testing, choosing students both randomly and "for cause." Just because a student is tested does not mean he is suspected. Naturally, you may confidentially request that we add your son to the test list. We have committed more resources this year to increase the number of students tested. Know our policy by reviewing the handbook. A second positive result jeopardizes a student's place at SPS. Pray that students resist the allure of temporary pleasure over finding true meaning in life.

**EMERGENCY CLOSINGS:** As we pass the height of the tropical season (Sep 10) and with safety foremost in our minds, I remind all of the directives from the Office of Catholic Schools of the Archdiocese of NO:

- Catholic schools will follow the closure and reopening schedules of their civil parish. Therefore, monitor the St. Tammany Public School system announcements. Naturally, we reserve the right to close earlier if we feel it necessary and to reopen earlier if we are able and civil parish authorities give permission. For example, we opened weeks before the public school system following Hurricane Katrina.
- **Listen & Watch** for a robo-text message or phone call or email before calling school since it is difficult to handle a large volume of calls. Also, our phone system goes dark in a power failure.
- **Consult** Plus Portals and our web site.
- **Pray** to Our Lady of Prompt Succor, Patroness of Louisiana.

**EXAMS:** Semester exam schedules begin on Dec 13. Remember that exams are SEMESTER exams that will cover the entire semester. The **semester grade** (the only grade that counts in GPA and the only grade on the transcript) will be averaged in the following manner: 40% for Quarter 1; 40% for Quarter 2; 20 % for the semester exam. Encourage your son, therefore, to take his exams seriously. **It's time to start reviewing**. A good review lasts several weeks and avoids last minute cramming. Learning how to study for semester exams will aid your son considerably in college. The complete exam schedule is printed at the end of this newsletter and is posted on Plus Portals.

**HELPING SAINT PAUL'S:** Don't forget – here are painless ways to help:

- If you shop at Office Depot, please give the SPS school code (70041640) and SPS receives 5% of your purchase!
- Box Tops for Education these are redeemable for cash. Have your son bring them to his math teacher.

**HOLIDAYS:** The school offices will close during Christmas holidays. Anticipate needs, especially the pesky driver's license form, transcripts, etc. I will be around, if needed, most of the holidays so feel free to call on me but I don't always know how to help.

**ID CARDS:** Students must wear their ID cards on their lanyard DAILY. **Please check your son before he leaves the house to make sure he is wearing the ID**. If he forgets, he must purchase a temporary ID from Sgt. Pressley. If he loses his ID, he must purchase a replacement for \$10.

**REPORT CARDS AND SEMESTER GRADES:** Remember that the first quarter accounts for 40% of the semester grade, with the second quarter accounting for 40% and the semester exam accounting for 20%. Remember that the only grade that really counts is the SEMESTER grade – that's the one that goes on transcripts and is used to calculate grade point average.

**ROSARY:** A group of students recites one decade of the rosary each morning, beginning at 7:50 on M, T, Th, and F and following mass on W. They would love to have you join them. And since Oct is the month of the rosary – what a great witness! **And on Thursday, we have ten minutes of Eucharistic Adoration before the rosary. This begins at 7:40** 

**RE-REGISTRATION OF CURRENT STUDENTS FOR 2020 – 21:** For those of you who plan, here's the process:

- Current 8<sup>th</sup> graders will be asked to register during the last two weeks of January. We need to know if any current 8<sup>th</sup> graders do not plan on returning next year in order for us to know how many new 9<sup>th</sup> graders we can accept.
- Current  $9^{th} 11^{th}$  grade students will be asked to register during the first two weeks of February.
- Current 12<sup>th</sup> graders well, they don't have to worry about registering for SPS next year!
- In all re-registration for 2020 21, a \$300 registration fee will be due.
- Also, if your son does not plan to return for the second semester of this year, please let me know ASAP. We are getting inquiries about January admissions.

**SAFE DRIVING:** Please obey the traffic laws: speed limit, no tailgating, no texting while driving, NO CELL PHONE USE DURING SCHOOL ZONE TIMES, buckle up, etc. Thank you!



**SLOW YOUR ROLL** is Mayor Mark Johnson's initiative to improve driving within Covington. Did you know:

- Two of the most often repeated complaints to the Mayor are speeding and the running of stop signs.
- On any given weekday, over 15,000 people drive into and out of Covington.
- Many of our streets were laid out PRIOR to the invention of the automobile, thus not designed for traffic.

Mayor Mark's goal is "to change driving habits in our city...to have each of us understand that speeds over 25 MPH are not safe on most of our streets" The Mayor is asking everyone to "relax, take a deep breath and slow down. In October, we will be stating more firmly the need to slow down. In November, there will likely be consequences." I applaud the Mayor's initiative and pledge to him our support. Reinforce this with students whenever possible. I will do so with parents. And please set a good example yourself, as in the words of Saint La Salle: "Preach by example, and practice before the eyes of the young what you wish them to accept."

**SOCIAL HOSTING:** With the holiday season upon us, the temptations for alcohol use by students increases. One issue facing parents is hosting parties where teen are exposed to or even given alcohol. This is known as "social hosting." **STUDY HALL AFTER SCHOOL:** Ben's Den (aka the library) opens every afternoon (Monday-Thursday) until 4:30. Students are free to come and go by signing in and out. You are encouraged to mention this service to your sons who are on campus after school with nothing to do or who may be waiting for a late ride or a practice to begin. All we ask is that they treat the facility with respect and that they are quiet. Faculty will supervise the space. We will offer this service as long as there is a demand.

**SUNDAY ACTIVITIES:** I remind you of the policy of Archbishop Gregory Aymond that Catholic schools are not to schedule any activity on a Sunday. Recently, Superintendent of Catholic Schools Dr. RaeNell Houston sent out the following clarification on participation of Catholic school students in events hosted or sponsored by an outside agency: Schools may participate in activities on Sundays that are hosted or sponsored by an outside entity only if certain conditions are met. The participation of students on Sunday may only be voluntary. Never is an event to be mandatory on Sunday. The voluntary status of each event must be formally communicated to students and their families. Under no circumstance may punitive action take place, including any type of sarcasm, shame, or disgrace, as a result of the decision of the family for a student not to participate in a Sunday event. Anytime our school groups participate in a Sunday activity, it is up the moderator of the group to see that the Sunday obligation of Mass is fulfilled. Naturally, we will comply with this policy of Archbishop Aymond and the Office of Catholic Schools.

**THANKSGIVING TO CHRISTMAS:** This period of the school year can be a real challenge. While it should be a time of good will and cheer, often we find ourselves handling a crisis. The best way to prevent any difficulty is through the Lasallian virtues of caring and vigilance – which will be in full force. Teachers will teach until the very end. **Parents, please remind your students to adhere to ALL procedures & policies and to think before they act.** We will show care to the students, but we will be vigilant. We dealt with a couple of serious incidents right before Thanksgiving – and I do not want a repeat before Christmas.

**TUTORING:** Our National Honor Society tutors every day at lunch in the library. All are welcome to utilize this free service. Essay proofreading services also provided. Encourage your son to take advantage of this awesome opportunity to get help from their most capable peers. It is not embarrassing to do so!

VALUE OF WAITING: During this period of Advent, a time of waiting, I remind all that the ability to "wait" is a chief characteristic for success in health, work, and life as shown by over 40 years of research at Stanford University. Beginning with the famous "marshmallow experiment" published in 1972 (children could choose to have one marshmallow now or two if they waited 15 minutes), researchers conducted follow up studies and tracked each child's progress in a number of areas. They found that the children who were willing to delay gratification and waited to receive the second marshmallow ended up having higher SAT scores, lower levels of substance abuse, lower likelihood of obesity, better responses to stress, better social skills as reported by their parents, and generally better scores in a range of other life measures. The researchers followed each child for more than 40 years and repeatedly, the group who waited patiently for the second marshmallow succeeded in whatever capacity they were measuring. In other words, this series of experiments proved that the ability to delay gratification was critical for success in life. Now if we could only get our students to buy into this! ### **PUBLIC AWARENESS NOTICE**

Pursuant to LAC 43:XIII.2716 et seq., each pipeline owner / operator is required to develop and implement a written continuing public awareness program. National Corrosion Service, Inc. in New Orleans has developed our public awareness program and inspects our natural gas pipelines regularly.

St. Paul's School owns and operates master meter natural gas distribution system on the school properties. The gas system consists of underground networks of pipelines. The purpose of the gas system is to provide a reliable and safe economical source of energy for heating purposes to the buildings adjacent to the underground gas pipelines. The pipeline system has the capacity to reliably deliver natural gas to the customers.

The hazards of natural gas are it is odorless, colorless, tasteless, lighter than air and can ignite and/or explode with tremendous force when mixed with the right amount of air.

Prevention measures taken include:

- ! adding odorant to the gas to give it that distinctive smell, similar to rotten eggs, to warn us of its presence,
- ! testing the odorant level each calendar quarter,
- ! performing annual gas leakage surveys, and
- ! conducting periodic pipeline patrols.

The following are signs that may indicate a gas leak:

- A hissing or roaring sound (caused by escaping gas),
- A patch of dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green setting along a pipeline route,
- Blowing dirt, grass or leaves near a pipeline,
- ☐ Continuous bubbling in wet, flooded areas,
- ☐ A "gas smell", similar to rotten eggs

Anyone who may smell this odor or notice any unusual conditions on or near gas mains, vents, service lines, meter sets, or especially inside of a building should call the St. Paul's School Maintenance office immediately. If you smell a strong gas odor inside a building, notify everyone in the building to leave. Do not operate any switches or use the phone. Go a safe distance away upwind of the gas smell and call the maintenance office. With any gas leak protect life first then property, then notify the St. Paul's School Maintenance office.

State and federal laws require excavators to notify LA One-Call two (2) full working days before digging. If any excavation is planned, you must notify LA One-Call which will notify the school to locate the gas lines.

To obtain additional information, report gas leaks, or report other gas related information contact the St. Paul's School Maintenance Office at 985-892-3200. The LA One-Call Center phone number is 811.
