


What would you describe as your greatest takeaway from Saint Paul's? My greatest takeaway from St. Paul's would be to live a life of service and integrity.

On December 31, 2019, our oldest living alumnus, Mr. Frank Lawrence Lombardo, class of 1937, entered into eternal rest with our heavenly father just 10 days shy of reaching the 100 year milestone. Frank was always and remained an ardent Saint Paul's supporter, consistently enjoying our monthly newsletter, regularly donating to our annual fund and maintaining a frequent correspondence with us through his own efforts or that of his family.

Tuesday, October 13, 2015, marked a truly special occasion as the students and faculty of Saint Paul's were greatly enriched by an assembly held in honor of Mr. Lombardo during Founder's Week. The audience was treated to a Brother Ray led PowerPoint presentation highlighting Saint Paul's in the 1930's including photos of the many sports teams in which Mr. Lombardo participated, his actual report card, and wonderful comments from the Brothers during his time here. Further, Mr. Lombardo addressed the students while beaming with appreciation and respect for Saint Paul's, and he encouraged them to "get all of the education they can."

He then experienced a campus tour most notably remarking on the turf field, La Salle Hall, and the original gymnasium (in which he actually played) giving detail of the layout of the building during his time here. Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra

The Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra graced Saint Paul's with two joy filled concerts on Tuesday, January 21st in the Briggs Assembly Center. For the 10:30 performance a number of elementary and middle schools both public and private attended the performance geared to middle school students. At noon, the Briggs was filled with the students and faculty of Saint Paul's. The opening piece, The William Tell Overture by Rossini, was immediately recognized by everyone in the room. Brother Raymond Bulliard, FSC, President of Saint Paul's uses this music at President's Assemblies when he reports on the victories and accomplishments of the Cross Country Team. The concert continued with some basic instruction about the definition and arrangement of an orchestra, a musical group that includes a string section. The musicians demonstrated the variety of sounds, the placement and, sizes of the various types of instruments, strings, woodwinds, percussion, and brass. The program continued with Sergei Prokofiev's "Montagues and Capulets" from his work Romeo and Juliet. Another familiar musical selection was Gustav Holst's "Mars, The Bringer of War" from his work the Planets. Students learned that classical works usually have four movements and the movements can be compared to the chapters of a book. The musical adventure brightened the day of both students and faculty and increased everyone's knowledge and appreciation of classical music. March for Those Who Can't



Every year, hundreds of thousands of people gather in Washington D.C. to keep pro-life feelings alive in the U.S. and to continue fighting for all women who are reluctant about keeping their unborn child. During the week of January 20, approximately 630 high school students from the Archdiocese of New Orleans travelled by bus to Washington D.C. to participate in the March For Life 2020. Saint Paul's School was represented with thirty-six students, twenty-two travelled with Saint Paul's chaperones and another fourteen travelled with Mary Queen of Peace Catholic Church.

During the week, the students attended the Geaux Forth Louisiana Right to Life Rally held at the Warner Theater where multiple abortion survivors and victims gave speeches. Facts about abortion were introduced during the rally including how many are performed per day by state and region and the

different procedures used to end an innocent child's life. This rally was an essential part of the pilgrimage as it prepared the students to stand up for what they believe in even through controversy.

On Friday, the day of the March, United States President Donald Trump gave an address making this the first time a sitting president has made an appearance at the March for Life. In his address, the President acknowledged "the tens of thousands of high school and college students" in attendance and called them "the heart of the March for Life." Saint Paul's Varsity Soccer Coach, Sean Moser, has received the 2018-19 South Section Boys Soccer Coach of the Year award for his work. Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North and South Carolina and Tennessee compose the South district. This award is based on performance for 2018-19 school year, lifetime school and community involvement, and coaching philosophy. The Louisiana High School Athletic Association nominated Sean for this award and the award is presented by the National Federation of State High School Associations.

In addition to the recognition as the Section Coach of the Year, Moser has received national acclaim. He was awarded the 2019 Boys Winter Region Coach

of the Year Award for Parochial/Private Schools on Friday, January 17th, 2020 at the 73rd United States Soccer Coaches Convention in Baltimore, Maryland. The National Chair of the United Soccer Coaches, J. Kevin Denson, made the announcement earlier in the year.

This is Moser's eleventh season as head coach of the Wolves, and during this time the team has competed in nine state finals, beginning with an appearance in 2011. Moser has been widely recognized for his coaching acumen with a number of awards including: two Sectional Coach of the Year titles, District, Metro, and State Coach of the Year Awards. His outstanding record at Saint Paul's is 289-23-17. Under Moser's direction the Wolves have won six of the last nine state titles.




