- **Awkward Moments Day:** Celebrate our common humanity – we've all made awkward mistakes




Thu, Mar 19 (Regular; B C D E)

• **Today is the Feast of Saint Joseph!** This feast was special to Saint John Baptist de La Salle. The morning and night prayers of the first Brothers included a special prayer to Joseph and in the Brothers' Rule of 1705, the Brothers were instructed to gather at 1 pm (before afternoon classes) to recite the litany of Saint Joseph, the "patron and protector of the Institute." And a holiday was given in those early days on the feast of Saint Joseph! (Oh, for the

good old days!) In his meditation for the feast of Saint Joseph, Saint La Salle says: *You have been charged, like Saint Joseph, with a holy work very similar to his and requiring that your piety and your virtue be more than ordinary. You have been made responsible for your students just as Saint Joseph was made responsible for the Savior of the world. Take Saint Joseph as your model to make yourself worthy of your ministry.*

- **TDIH:** On this day in 1719, John Baptist de La Salle was gravely ill. Brother Luke Salm writes in his book "This Work Is Yours": *As the Feast of St. Joseph drew near, de La Salle expressed a great desire to celebrate Mass in honor of this patron and protector of the Brothers. So weak was his condition and so intense the pain, that any such idea seemed out of the question. However, on the eve of the feast, he felt that the pain was subsiding and his strength had returned. In the morning, he was well enough to celebrate mass for the Brothers. They were overjoyed. But immediately thereafter, he relapsed. The end was near and that it was in honor of Saint Joseph that he had celebrated Mass for the last time.* De La Salle died less than a month later, on April 7th.
- **TDIH:** In 1918, Congress approved Daylight Saving Time. Thanks a lot, Congress!
- The **Vernal Equinox** (the arrival of spring), occurs today at 10:49 pm (CDT) when the Sun crosses directly over the equator. Easter is fixed as the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox. Day and night grow equal; more wonderfully, day grows longer than night. Winter is over. Ancient Jewish & Christian poets saw the equinox as the anniversary of creation, with spring equinox as lovelier and richer of the two as it's followed by light winning over dark, an image of paschal mystery. Our redemption is nigh!
- **Poultry Day:** Enjoy your favorite chicken, turkey, or other fowl dish today.

The original seal of the Institute created by St. La Salle shows St. Joseph and the boy Jesus: Joseph, the teacher caring for and raising the boy Jesus; the Lasallian teacher caring for and raising students entrusted to him/her.

SLOW YOUR ROLL is Mayor Mark Johnson's initiative to improve driving within Covington. Did you know:

- Two of the most often repeated complaints to the Mayor are speeding and the running of stop signs.
- On any given weekday, over 15,000 people drive into and out of Covington.
- Many of our streets were laid out PRIOR to the invention of the automobile, thus not designed for traffic.

Mayor Mark's goal is "to change driving habits in our city...to have each of us understand that speeds over 25 MPH are not safe on most of our streets" The Mayor is asking everyone to "*relax, take a deep breath and slow down. In October, we will be stating more firmly the need to slow down. In November, there will likely be consequences.*" I applaud the Mayor's initiative and pledge to him our support. Reinforce this with students whenever possible. I will do so with parents. And please set a good example yourself, as in the words of Saint La Salle: "**Preach by example, and practice before the eyes of the young what you wish them to accept.**"

During this period of cancelled in-person classes, we will continue to monitor information from the CDC, La Dept of Health, local officials, and the Archdiocese of New Orleans. While COVID19 has **NOT** been identified in our school community, please maintain good hygiene at home and do not come to campus if you are ill. Out of an abundance of caution, SPS will continue to **sanitize all buildings and surfaces** on a regular basis. We have also contracted with DIS.IN.FX to disinfect the entire school on a regular basis.


