Who Wrote Rise Up 'O Men of God?

If you have ever been to an all school mass, a Saint Paul's graduation ceremony, the Briggs Assembly Center, the concession stand at a soccer game or pretty much anything Saint Paul's, you are probably familiar with our fond nature for the words, Rise Up 'O Men of God. It turns out that what has become the cornerstone hymn and powerful conclusion to our graduation ceremony hails from a family member of one of our very own alumni. "Rise Up 'O Men of God" was authored by Mr. William Pierson Merrill, great-great uncle to Mr. Lee Merril '78 in one of the most significant years in our celebrated history, 1911.

As well summarized by Wikipedia, William Pierson Merrill (1867–1954) was an American Presbyterian clergyman, pacifist, author, and hymn writer who was acknowledged during his time as one of the most influential ministers in America. He is probably best remembered as the author of several well-known hymns, including the aforementioned focus of this segment.

From all accounts, Mr. Merrill was quite the scholar and renaissance man of writing having earned several degrees from Rutgers, a PHD from Yale and not only authored hymns, but an Algebra textbook.

Thank you, Lee for your time in making the connection, and for your pride in both your family and Saint Paul's School. I assure you that on July 25 as we process out the Briggs Assembly Center, we will have an even greater appreciation for this beloved hymn.

It is things like watching movies with my siblings, running, and riding bikes again that bring me hope during this time, and I plan to continue these habits as best I can after the quarantine.

Saint Paul's School is pleased to announce that they have received two awards for their outstanding Project Lead the Way Programs. The school was recognized by the national Project Lead the Way Organization which is a nonprofit group that provides a transformative learning experience for PreK-12 students and teachers across the U.S. Their mission is to create an engaging classroom environment unlike any other. PLTW empowers students to develop and apply in-demand transportable skills by exploring real-world challenges. Through the pathways in computer science, engineering, and biomedical science, students not only learn

technical skills, but also learn to solve problems, think critically and creatively, communicate, and collaborate. Classes also provide teachers with the training, resources, and support they need to engage students in real-world learning. Saint Paul's has been named a Distinguished School for the Gateway to Technology Program used with the Prefreshmen, and the Distinguished High School for the engineering, computer science and biomedical science programs. Saint Paul's was the only high school in the state awarded this achievement.
