110 Years of Existence! Over 100 years of Lasallian Education The Brothers of the Christian Schools

In 1911, Dixon Academy was purchased by The Benedictines of Saint Joseph Abbey and renamed to Saint Paul's College in honor of the patron of the Abbot of Saint Joseph's monastery. Father Augustine was named the first principal and on September 10th, Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, and Aemilian moved onto campus. As time went by, the Benedictines decided to concentrate their efforts at The Abbey and leased, with an agreement to purchase, Saint Paul's to the Brothers of the Christian Schools.

Nineteen French Brothers, previously living in exile, arrived in Covington during the summer of 1918. They were forced out of France due to government persecution of the Catholic Church in the early 1900's and moved to Mexico to start schools. During the Carranza Revolution in Mexico in 1914, the Brothers barely escaped with their lives and were scattered around the United States. When the Christian Brothers decided to purchase Saint Paul's College, these nineteen Brothers were sent to Covington, LA. Br. Nilammon was appointed as the first Christian Brother President.


These pioneer Brothers worked long hours, not only teaching and guiding their students, but also staffing the school as carpenters, painters, plumbers, electricians, and yardmen. Inspired by the zeal of the founding Brothers, Saint Paul's has prospered. 
School Opens!



"Help us Respect All People!"

The theme of the school year is an executive decision made by President Brother Ray Bulliard, Principal Trevor Watkins, and Assistant Principal Joe Dickens. It is always something based on a basic principle of Lasallian pedagogy or values. "Blessed Brother Scubilion, help us respect all people!" was chosen this year. Pope Saint John Paul II beatified Bro. Scubilion in 1989.

After ten years in elementary schools throughout France, Brother Scubilion left France in 1833 to dedicate the remaining thirty-four years of his life to the enslaved natives on the island of Reunion in the Indian Ocean. Remembered as the "catechist of the slaves," he inaugurated evening classes for them, which were



well attended, even after a long day of exhausting labor. He devised special programs and techniques, suited to their needs and abilities, in order to teach the essentials of Christian doctrine and morality, and prepare them to receive the sacraments. He won them over by his kindly manner and his respect for them.

After the emancipation of the slaves in 1848, he continued to care for them and to help them adapt to their new life of freedom and responsibility. In the last years of his life, despite failing health, he assisted the local pastor in visiting the sick, winning over sinners, encouraging vocations, and even effecting what seemed to be miraculous cures. At his death he was venerated everywhere on the island as a saint.

First Day of School

In preparation for the opening of school on August 6th, Saint Paul's has sought the advice of members of the local medical community, partnered with Children's Hospital in New Orleans, and closely monitored the directives of the Louisiana Department of Health, the Louisiana Department of Education, and the Archdiocese Office of Catholic Schools in establishing a safe return to school plan. School reopened with half of the student population on Thursday, August 6th and half on Friday, August 7th.

Saint Paul's safe return to school plan focuses on three general areas: facilities, procedures, and education. The summer was spent preparing the campus, training teachers and staff in new protocols, and reviewing policies and procedures. Summer preparations also included building on the success of virtual online program instituted last school year; students and teachers will be prepared to seamlessly move from in-person learning to virtual, and then back to campus again as needed.

Saint Paul's is pleased to announce the selection of John Meibaum as the new lacrosse head coach. Meibaum has been with the lacrosse program for 12 seasons and served as head coach from 2016-2018. He led the Wolves to 43 wins including three final four appearances and a state championship in 2017, and as defensive coordinator, he helped the Wolves win a second state championship in 2019. Meibaum has been twice awarded assistant coach of the year by the Louisiana High School Lacrosse League (LHSLL). He is a level two certified coach, and he is also certified in strength and conditioning by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS). He



and his family have worked diligently on and off the field to further the sport and the team experience for Saint Paul's.

One of Meibaum's goals returning as head of the lacrosse program is to ensure there are enough coaches on staff so that all players at every level receive quality instruction. The following coaches are committed to joining the Saint Paul's lacrosse staff for the year: Gerald Ancar (faculty moderator); Drake Arnold (former Saint Paul's player, Saint Paul's Coach, and LSU Coach); Paul Stapp (former Jesuit and LSU player); Lane Sumrall (former Saint Paul's player, LSU Player, and LSU Coach); Ryan Flood (former Saint Paul's and Belmont Abbey player); and Michael Donohue (10 years experience as a youth coach in Maryland and Louisiana).

Athletic Director Craig Ketelsen states: "I am excited to see the number of Saint Paul's alumni interested in giving back to the program. I am satisfied that this lacrosse staff will uphold the core principles of Saint Paul's School as well as put a competitive team on the field."



The Saint Paul's Class of 2021 kicked off its senior year with two time-honored traditions: March through the Arch and the distribution of class rings. Unique to this class of seniors, a ceremony combining these two events took place on the evening of August 20th. Adhering to COVID-19 protocol, families lined De La Salle Drive to watch the seniors proudly take their place in Saint Paul's history as they marched through the arch, experiencing a tradition like many young men who have gone before and many who will come after them.

The ceremony began with Brother Ray highlighting the rich history of March through the Arch, explaining how the Benedictines in 1911 and subsequently the Christian Brothers in 1918, walked this same path as they opened Saint Paul's School over 100 years ago.

As Assistant Principal Joe Dickens read the names of the members of the Class of 2021, each senior proceeded underneath the arch, continued up De La Salle Drive, and stopped in Founder's Circle to receive his class ring from Principal Trevor Watkins. The event culminated in a spirit of brotherhood as the seniors gathered around the statue of St. John Baptist de La Salle to sing the fight song and other traditional Saint Paul's songs.

Uniting these two Saint Paul's traditions created an indelible reminder commemorating the seniors' first steps into their final year at Saint Paul's. Congratulations Class of 2021! Saint Paul's Forevermore! Student intern, junior Zachary Van Zandt, created a video to commemorate this occasion.



Saint Paul's "CORE" Pack



One of the Lasallian Five Core Principles advocates "Inclusive Community". Beginning in the 2017-2018 school year, this pilot program was introduced in order to include children with developmental disabilities whose parents want them to have a Catholic education. It creates a program within a Catholic high school that meets the needs of those children who would not normally qualify for admission to a college preparatory school. "CORE" is an acronym for "Catholic Opportunity for a Responsive Education," while "Pack" is a nod to Saint Paul's wolf mascot.

The school day of the CORE Pack students, whose challenges include cerebral palsy, autism, Down Syndrome, fragile X syndrome and other genetic conditions, is tailored to the unique needs and interests of each boy. Each child has his own needs, so some students spend several periods in the CORE room, where they receive individual instruction in reading and math while others spend most of their day in regular classes, and simply go to the CORE room for additional support.

A key to the program's success is the large number of Saint Paul's students who have stepped up to volunteer as peer mentors. See complete article.


