First and foremost, I hope and pray that this newsletter finds you and your family safe and well, protected from any debilitating effects of COVID-19. And I hope you are rejoicing with me that Saint Paul's has received permission from both the Louisiana Department of Education and the Office of Catholic Schools of the Archdiocese of New Orleans to return to campus for in-person instruction beginning August 6!



The email you received from Principal Trevor Watkins a few days ago outlined the many steps we are taking with our facilities, procedures and curriculum to insure, to the maximum extent possible, the safety of our students and staff.

New Offects

One of our main resources in this endeavor is our official

partnership with Children's Hospital of New Orleans. As we
prepare for an exciting and joyous return to campus, the health and safety of our entire community
remains our number one priority. Our partnership with CHNOLA through their "Return to School
Support" program is just one of many ways St. Paul's commits to providing a healthy and safe campus
for our students, parents, faculty, and staff.

#### The following represent just a few of the steps we are taking this year:

- **Face Masks:** All will wear face masks. The Mothers' Club Bookstore has official SPS face masks, but solid color blue, grey, white and black are acceptable. The only exceptions are:
  - o Anyone who has a medical condition that prevents wearing a face covering (Doctor's note required)
  - o Anyone who is consuming a drink or food
  - o Anyone who is trying to communicate with a person who is hearing impaired
  - o Anyone who is giving a speech for broadcast or to an audience
  - o Anyone temporarily removing his or her face covering for identification purposes
- **Temperature Checks:** Each student will be issued a temperature bracelet, which flashes red if a student has a temperature of over 100 degrees F. NO DATA IS COLLECTED ON THE STUDENTS. THE TEMPS ARE NOT RECORDED OR SENT ANYWHERE!
- **Hand Sanitizer:** Each student will be required to sanitize his hands upon entry to each class.
- **Surface Sanitizing:** Each desk and high touch area (e.g. door handles, light switches, etc.) will be sanitized between classes. Bathrooms will be sanitized several times a day.
- Hallway Movement: Hallways will be designated "one way" zones to facilitate social distance movement. Class dismissals will be staggered in facilitate social distancing.
- **Social Distancing:** Student classroom desks will be socially distant to the extent possible. We removed any non-essential classroom furniture in order to maximize social distancing.

- All school buildings have been professionally sanitized and will continue to be on a regular basis.

- Today is the memorial of **St. John Vianney** (1786-1859), whose most remarkable accomplishment was his work as a confessor. In winter months, he spent 11 to 12 hours daily hearing confessions. In summer, time increased to 16 hours. As his fame spread, more hours were spent serving God's people. Even the few hours he allowed himself for sleep were disturbed frequently by the devil. Here are wonderful words from St. John: We do not have to talk very much in order to pray well. We know that God is there... Let us open our hearts to him. Let us rejoice in his presence. This is the best prayer.
- **TDIH:** In 1944, acting on a Dutch informer tip, Nazi Gestapo captures 15-year-old Jewish diarist Anne Frank and her family in a sealed-off area of an Amsterdam warehouse. - **TDIH:** In 1974, President Richard M. Nixon resigned at noon as the 37th president of the United States. He is the only president ever to resign. Vice-President Gerald Ford became the 38<sup>th</sup> president. Ford, the first president who came to the office through appointment rather than election, had replaced Spiro Agnew as vice president only eight months before. In a political scandal independent of the Nixon administration's wrongdoings in the Watergate affair, Agnew had been forced to resign in disgrace after he was charged with income tax evasion and political corruption.

I draw the following to your attention (in alphabetical order, not order of importance):

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: Help your son develop proper attitudes and habits for success. Show confidence in his ability; work with him to set realistic academic goals. Help him develop an orderly study environment. Teens enjoy chaos, so the trick is to help your son create enough order in his chaos for proper study to occur. Designate a place and time to study. Require 1-2 hours of study per night. Do not accept the "I have no homework" excuse. He always has homework -- review, study, and advanced preparation. At the end of his study session, have him organize books, assignments, PE clothes, etc. for the next day. Students who do not arrive to class with their homework are sent to assignment hall.

**ATTENDANCE:** Please follow SPS attendance rules as found in Student-Parent Handbook. Thank you. The State of LA limits days a student may miss and still receive credit. Saint Paul's adheres to these regulations. **Do not allow your son to miss school for less than very serious reasons.** 

**BENILDE HALL:** Two years ago, we began occupying the newly renovated Benilde Hall. It was a challenging project, but the benefits outweighed the challenges. More classrooms, better restrooms, an elevator, improved lighting and HVAC, additional ingress and egress, student services, and more. In case you don't know its history, Benilde Hall was built in 1959 under the principalship / presidency of the late Brother Cassian Lange. The second and third floors were open dormitories for 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grades. The bottom floor contained study halls and recreation rooms. When SPS dropped 6<sup>th</sup> grade, the first two floors were converted into classrooms. Interesting trivia:



Trevor had one of those non-air-conditioned classrooms and bought a window unit – making it one of the few air-conditioned classrooms on campus. It was cool but that unit was loud! The third floor remained a dormitory for 7<sup>th</sup> grade. When we dropped 7<sup>th</sup> grade, the third floor became the band room! (Imagine lugging all those instruments up three flights of stairs!) The current band room was a rec hall for the boarders. When the number of boarders started dropping, we moved the rec hall into La Salle Hall and converted the third floor to classrooms. And now we have the latest (and last – at least for me!) incarnation of that storied (pun) building! Saint Benilde! Thank you for helping us turn that ordinary building into an extraordinary one! #### **CAFETERIA PROGRAMS:**

- SPS participates in the federal school lunch/breakfast program managed by the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Saint Paul's does not directly manage the food service program; we follow the directives of the Archdiocese and the cafeteria workers are employed by the Archdiocese, not Saint Paul's.
- Breakfast (\$2.25) is served from 7:15-7:45 am.
- Students may buy a basic lunch (\$3.25) but will be charged for extra servings so make sure your son is aware of this and knows how much he can spend. On most days, there is a choice of hot lunch or sandwich lunch. DUE TO COVID-19, CHOICES WILL BE LIMITED AND FEW EXTRAS, IF ANY, WILL BE AVAILABLE. LUNCHES WILL BE BOXED FOR SAFETY REASONS AND TO EXPEDITE SERVING.
- Students may not "order out", e.g. pizza, or have lunches delivered. WE CANNOT DELIVER LUNCHES TO STUDENTS. Please do not ask us to do so.
- Students participating in the cafeteria program must make an initial payment before school opens. This may be done on Aug 3 5 Between 7 and 2:30. A separate check will be needed. Students may NOT "charge" a meal if no money is on account.
- Students use their ID cards for check out in the cafeteria. A temp ID will be issued on their first day.
- Parents may sign up for ON-LINE payments that will also allow them to see a complete record of everything their son is buying. Go to http://www.schoolcafe.org/ and follow directions.
- FREE or REDUCED LUNCH/BREAKFAST: There is no stigma to apply for free / reduced lunch. NO ONE knows but the cafe manager. Request forms from the cafeteria manager or me. NEW: You may also apply online for free / reduced lunch by following these steps:
  - ✓ Go to www.schoolcafe.org
  - ✓ Click on "Apply for Reduced/Free Lunch" on the home page.
  - ✓ Enter the following data:
    - o Names & incomes of all members of the household
    - Name of school, grade, & birthdate for every student in household
    - Your social security number and electronic signature
    - A valid email address and phone number
  - ✓ Call School Food and Nutrition Services at (504) 596-3434 with questions.

It is NOT embarrassing for a family to request free or reduced cafeteria meals if you have financial need. Nothing is done to identify which students are on free or reduced lunch.

In case of emergency closings, student make-up days will be taken from scheduled holidays. **Note that school begins on Thursday, August 6 for a full instructional day.** Also, please check the calendar for vacation dates and do not schedule vacations in conflict with school. Thank you for recognizing the need to make the most use of our academic time.

**CAR LINES**: There is no absolute designated drop off spot. Be patient the first few days of school as traffic patterns form. Safety is paramount, so if you use Founder's Circle as a departure point, **cars must drop off students in Founders Circle in the LEFT lane onl**y – do not block traffic in the right lane to discharge the occupants. Dropping off at La Salle Hall or by the BAC is OK. Traffic will be heavy heading into Covington as schools open. Please plan accordingly.

- As Trevor wrote: It goes without saying that dads were an immense service to the school at a very busy and critical time, just before we welcome our students back to campus. Their help is a huge boost to all of us at St. Paul's and an encouraging sign of your faith in our common mission of educating their sons.

**DRESS CODE:** Students must be in compliance with the dress code beginning Aug 6 – including face masks. WE INTEND TO INCREASE OUR ENFORCEMENT OF THE DRESS CODE THIS YEAR. Refer to previous newsletters or the student handbook on our website for particulars if you are still unsure. **Note: We have a number of clean, pre-owned SPS uniform shirts in good condition. If the family budget is tight, feel free to ask for some of these clothes. Nothing is done to embarrass a student and no one will know. Thanks to those families who supply us with their outgrown uniforms.** 

**DRIVING POLICY:** The driving habits of some students (speeding, horn blowing; engine revving, tire screeching, etc.) cause grief for the neighbors. I have spoken at length with some neighbors and also with the Covington Police. As our handbook states, driving to school and parking on our campus is a privilege, not a right. Accordingly:

- Covington Police will increase their presence and issue tickets;
- Neighbors have been instructed to take pictures or get license plates of speeding or unsafe drivers and send the information to us:
- SPS has increased the number of faculty street supervisors after school;
- SPS has a series of monetary fines (beginning at \$50 for a first offense) against students shown to be violating traffic laws around school;

- SPS reserves the right to revoke the driving to school privilege which we did with one student who enraged the neighborhood on the last day of school a year ago.
- And remember: it's against Louisiana law to use a cell phone (except hands free) during school zone times. Please don't drop your son off while using a cell phone it's against the law and sets a bad example for him.
- Parents of students who drive to school please safe driving with your sons.

**EMAIL ADDRESSES:** An SPS email address (printed on the schedules) is issued to all students. The format is Firstname.Lastname.gradyr@stpauls.com, e.g. <u>John.Smith.2021@stpauls.com</u>. This will allow us to better communicate with students. The student may keep this email forever, thus allowing us to continue contact with him as an alumnus. Naturally, we will delete the email upon graduation at the student's request. #### STUDENT-PARENT HANDBOOK


Handbook is posted on the Student Life page of our website. All students and parents must be familiar with our policies and agree to follow them. As evidence of that agreement, students and parents must sign a form attesting that they have read the Handbook, understand the rules contained within the document, and intend to follow them. Print out the signature card (posted on the website under "recent news" and which is also the last page of the

handbook) and bring it on their first day of school. The COVID-19 Release form must also be signed and returned on first day of school.

#### **UNIFORMS:** Reminders:

- Uniform shirts, ties, and socks are sold by Bayou Uniform (13488 Seymour Myers Blvd) in Covington. Only white SPS socks are allowed.
- Sweatshirts, fleeces, PE uniforms, etc. are sold by the Mothers Club bookstore.
- Khaki pants/shorts may come from any vendor as long as they are NOT cargo pants and are standard tan khaki color, not green or brown.
