

What is your favorite memory at Saint Paul's? I was a boarding student for 4 years until my senior year. During my eighth grade year, I often stayed on campus over the weekends. One weekend the LA National Guard was having drills at the old practice field. During this day they were practicing riot control and the "make-believe" rioters were tossing actual smoke bombs to simulate a real event. Well, one of the bombs did not go off so I picked the smoke bomb up and brought it to my dorm room. After Church the next day I was showing another classmate the smoke bomb in the foyer of La Salle hall and illustrating how the trigger should have worked, the only problem was the device ignited and went off in La Salle hall. Frightened, I hid in my dorm room. Of course someone "narked" on me and military personnel came into the dorm dressed in full gas masks to "arrest" me; really they just wanted an explanation of how I acquired the device. Needless to say, that was the last year the National Guard did drills on Saint Paul's Campus! Also late school night pizza parties and sneaking up to Brother Ken's residence with some of the other guys from the Junior / Senior dorm. Bro. Ken was always great for a few laughs and still is even today!

What do you value most about your Saint Paul's education and experience?

I value the lifelong relationships I still enjoy today, particularly since I was a boarder. These were formidable years growing up. Sharing rooms with other classmates (and unfortunately sharing bathrooms) helped shaped these relationships. Some of the guys we lived with are truly my best friends even today!

Do you have any other family members currently attending or who have attended Saint Paul's? All three of my boys, Zac '11, Connor '13 and Parker '15 attended and graduated from Saint Paul's. I hope that this legacy continues with my grandson Maddox in the future.


Who was your favorite or most impactful teacher? I was very close with Brother Mifrando Obach. He was from the Philippines and was my 8th grade dorm prefect (head master of the dorm wing we lived in) and a Math teacher. He is no longer in the Brother hood but was an impact full mentor to me as a young man.

What advice would you give to current students or young alumni? The best advice I would give current students and even parents of students is to encourage your kids to get involved with activities at Saint Paul's; sports, leadership groups, service groups, clubs, etc. The more involved you are the more opportunity you have to create long lasting relationships and memories for life!

Why do you continue to support the Saint Paul's mission? I know what a lasting impact it had on my life and my three boys. Each of my boys had a unique experience but I believe all have fond memories from their time at Saint Paul's. Tribute to Brother Alfred Baltz, FSC



Brother Alfred Baltz, FSC of the San Francisco New Orleans District of the De La Salle Christian Brothers passed away on September 9, 2020, at the Saint Paul's Christian Brothers Retirement Home in Covington, LA. He was 97 years of age, just two weeks shy of his 98th birthday. Bro. Alfred entered the Junior Novitiate at the age of 14 in Lafayette, LA. He received his final vows during the summer of 1947 and taught in several different schools for many years. Bro. Alfred arrived at Saint Paul's in 1955 and taught for three years until being transferred to New Mexico. He returned to Saint Paul's in 1969 for another three years and was again transferred, this time to Lafayette. He returned to Saint Paul's School in 1978 and never left.


As many will attest, Bro. Alfred was a fixture here at Saint Paul's School. Principal Trevor Watkins '79 states, "To countless students, Bro. Alfred was a teacher, coach, athletic director, handyman, builder, and friend. His worm box behind the Brothers Residence was a source of bait for countless neighborhood children. Innumerable trees around campus were literally germinated in his greenhouse, planted and nurtured to maturity under his care. The campus would look very different today if it were not for Bro. Alfred. What most don't know about him was his prayerfulness. He prayed for us all the time. In the last few years of his life, when his strength had left his body, he continued to devote his time to prayer for others." Bro. Alfred will be missed by many. [View Bro. 



Since 2014, the Office of Alumni and Development has occupied the hallowed building formerly known as the infirmary building, Applehaus and the Guidance Office. This ideal campus location has afforded our department a better opportunity to foster and cultivate a relationship with future alumni while they are still students.

In an effort to further expound on the role of our office and what it means to be an alumnus of Saint Paul's School, a program was implemented last year whereby visits were made to each and every Religion class to meet the following objectives and goals: for each student to be able to easily and accurately identify the location of the Alumni and Development office, to give students a better understanding of how to stay connected to Saint Paul's after graduation and the most effective ways to keep us up to date with their contact information, and lastly, to foster a culture of awareness, responsibility, invitation and expectation of future alumni to support one another and their alma mater in posterity.

On September 23 and 24, a total of 39 classes were once again visited for 5 to 10 min each.. Rather than a large assembly format, the smaller addresses were conducive to a more intimate and effective means of communication, and the message and mechanics were tailored to each grade level. Based on feedback received, last year's message was well understood and we are optimistic that the principle of learning through repetition will facilitate an optimal level of awareness and appreciation moving forward.

The talks began with a review of the definition of the terms alumni(us) and introduction to the Alumni Office including detailed description of the physical location as well as putting a name to the face. Further introduction was made to the services provided by the Alumni Office to current students of all grade levels and upon the associated transition to alumni. Examples of the impact of alumni support on campus improvements were illustrated, which coincidentally was not too difficult, given the plethora of alumni name plates located on the classroom doors.

Finally, the significance of staying connected both to one another and to Saint Paul's School was emphasized in regard to the sustainability of our alma mater

Many thanks to the administration, the Religion department and the students for allowing this opportunity which will be reinforced once annually.

Veterans Plaque



In 1912, at the bequest and generosity of the estate of Mr. Harry G. Friedman, Class of 1933, a memorial plaque was designed and hung in the Eastern hallway in the lobby of LaSalle Hall. It was dedicated to the Memory of Mr. Harry Friedman and that of his brother, USA Lt. Col. Joseph Bernard Friedman, Saint Paul's College 1935. Additional language on the plaque is as follows: *"Honoring the memory of all the Saint Paul's Alumni who practiced the values learned at Saint Paul's by their patriotic service in the United States Military."*

Over 200 Alumni are presently represented on the plaque which resides in the hallway of La Salle Hall adjacent to our former ROTC classroom. As Veterans Day approaches, we would like to once again petition our alumni base to identify any additional veterans and give proper recognition to all who have served our country.



Saint Paul's turns 109 years old!

On Saturday, September 14, Saint Paul's turned 109 years old. In 1911, Saint Paul's College, previously Dixon Academy, was opened by the Benedictine priests of Saint Joseph Abbey. On that day, forty-eight students, five Benedictine priests (Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, Aemillion, Martin, and Placid) and four lay teachers (Messrs. Edgar Barre, Oliver Lyons, Bernard Mutter, and Leopoldo Teller) walked through the arch for the first time. By year's end, seventy boarders and thirty day students had enrolled. Today, with over 850 men of

God, Saint Paul's strives to be the number one choice for parents and young men on the Northshore. View this [website](#) for a brief pictorial of the past 100 years.

Due to the closure of school because of the approach of Hurricane Sally, the student body was unable to celebrate the birthday as has been done in the past. However, Brother Ray took a moment during the following week's President's Assembly to remind us of all the amazing things that have happened in the history of Saint Paul's: a killing flu epidemic, World War I, the brothers providing education, room and board during the depression to those in need, students leaving to serve their country in World War II, the oil issue in the '80's, and the current pandemic. All or any of those could have been a final act for Saint Paul's, but the brothers prevailed on this sacred ground. Today we are here, we are stronger for those times, and we are grateful for the Brothers and Partners, who provided leadership and prayer to help the school continue.

National Merit Scholarship Program

Nine Saint Paul's School seniors have been recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation for their outstanding academic achievements. Saint Paul's Semifinalists are Benjamin Broussard, Lucca Ferrante, Gabriel Gros, Axel Henderson, Jake Holincheck, Hunter Kergosien, Davis Lagarde, Arthur 'Trey' Paine, and Brady Talley. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$31 million that will be offered next spring. The mission of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) is to recognize and honor outstanding student scholars throughout the United States. Over 1.5 million students entered the 2020 National Merit Scholarship Program and 16,000 have been recognized as Semifinalists. Additionally, four students have been recognized as Commended Scholars. These students are Vageli Liokis, Cole Piazza, Aiden Plauché, and Scott Woodard.


Louisiana Golf Tour


