This is Homecoming Week, 2020! And while COVID-19 has forced cancellation or re-direction of many of our traditional homecoming activities, I don't want us to forget the importance of this event – or a seventeen-year tradition that I have kept going, which many of you remember well and one which even the students enjoy.

In Homecoming Week of 2003, then Student Council President Kramer Johnson '04 asked if he could address the student body at my assembly that week. Of course, I said "sure." When it came time for Kramer to speak, he strode confidently to the mic, but instead of speaking, he grabbed his guitar and started singing – "I Feel Home" by OAR. After he sang (he was a pretty decent musician!), he explained how Saint Paul's had become a second home to him – and he wanted all of the students to feel the same way.

Since that magical musical moment in 2003, I have annually played "I Feel Home" at my Homecoming Week assemblies – and recounted the story of Kramer. Seniors regularly tell me that the song is indeed meaningful for them and many have it in their playlists.



- TDIH: In 2016, Pope Francis canonized Brother Solomon Leclercq, FSC, making him an official saint of the Church. I hope all remember the story of St Solomon, but here is a summary from "Seven De La Salle Brothers": Once the monarchy was overthrown early in the French Revolution, the next target was the Church. In 1790 the Civil Constitution of the Clergy gave the state complete control over the Church in France. In order to continue to function, priests and religious were forced to take an oath to support the constitution. Most of the Brothers refused and so were forced gradually to abandon their schools and communities. Eventually the Christian Brothers were deprived altogether of legal status in France. On 15 August 1792, Brother Solomon sat alone in his Paris school. He had been asked to mind the house while other Brothers left the turbulent city for the safety of the suburb. A loud knock on the door was the first sound of



warning. Soldiers demanded to search the house. It was a thorough search for incriminating documents, and, though they found nothing, Brother Solomon was ordered to collect his belongings and follow them. Under escort, he walked a short distance to where a sort of tribunal had been set up, and where his arrival seemed to be expected. The interrogation was formal, ending with the question: 'have you taken the oath?' The answer was: 'No'. That was all.... It was all pre-arranged. A massacre gang was assembled at the Champ de Mars 'to give effect to the will of the people'. They had been commissioned to do the deed in return for money and the clothes of the victims.

Brother Solomon was martyred on September 2, 1792, the first Brother of the Christian Schools to be martyred, and the first to be beatified. Brother Solomon chose his religious vocation and Catholic faith over obedience to the anti-clerical French government. Let us pray: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, we thank you for the gift of St. Brother Solomon to our Institute. We pray that his example of humble service and fidelity inspire us to live our own commitments in the same manner. Show us the ones who are in need of our talents and presence. Grant us the generosity, wisdom, and courage to respond accordingly. This we ask, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

# Sat, Oct 17 (Feast of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque)

# **ASSEMBLY ON OCT 7:** I hope students enjoyed our assembly last week. Here's what we did:

I explained that the Catholic Church dedicates October to Mary and that this song is one of the oldest and most beloved of Marian hymns. **ATHLETICS:** The LHSAA released rules last week for attending athletic events. Here are the main ones:

- *Indoor and outdoor sport events shall be limited to25% of the established seating capacity.*
- Face coverings are required for all attendees and spectators.
- *Social Distancing and Safety Rules:* 
  - Spectator seating shall be provided and shall be arranged so that a minimum of 6 feet of distance between individuals and small household groups is maintained.
  - o Seating should not be allowed within 6 feet of aisles or above pedestrian entrance and exits
  - Group seating shall not exceed 10 people and should be limited to persons who are members of the same household.
  - o Do not allow physical contact between coaches and players, or between staff and spectators.
  - o Eliminate gatherings in the areas while entering, exiting, or moving about

These rules will seriously alter our traditional game day experience (no tailgating, reduced attendance, etc.), but we have no choice if we want high school athletics. AD Craig Ketelsen has taken the lead in tailoring these rules to SPS. Stay tuned. We know we will not please everyone but the rules are clear.

In accordance with the LHSAA and the Governor's mandates, attendance at Saint Paul's sporting events is currently limited to 25% of capacity. We are unable to offer tickets to the general public until these restrictions are lifted. A limited number of tickets will be made available for purchase to the family of each player (9th/JV/V), Marching Wolf, Golden Blue, and cheerleader from Mon-Thurs NOON during the week of each home game. Each team's coaches will send details for purchasing tickets to their players and parents. As all district schools are under the same restrictions, fans must have a pre-purchased ticket before attending away games, as well. Saint Paul's home games are available via live stream at <a href="www.wpbn.live">www.wpbn.live</a>, SPS Radio Network – Cat Country 98.9 FM and the SPS Radio Network app. Go Wolves!

**ATTENDANCE:** Please comply with our attendance rules as printed in the handbook which is posted on Plus Portals. This is especially true when a student is absent or needs to check out during the day.



**BAND BUILDING:** Last week I signed a contract with DonahueFavret Contractors for our new band building. The total cost of construction, architectural services, and furnishings will approach \$2.3 million. Work will begin this week, and the contract calls for the building to be finished by the opening of school next August. We pray for the success of our fundraising efforts – and the faith that is being placed in us. It's been a long time coming!

Grant clarity of vision and strength of purpose to the leaders of our institutions and our government.


May they be moved to act with justice and compassion and find the courage to overcome fear and hatred!

This year the STPL Teen Department's TEENtober will highlight teens and YA horror/mystery/thriller books with socially connected, physically distant







Blessed Brother Scubilion Rousseau, FSC was a French Brother who spent 34 years of his religious life ministering to the enslaved people on the island of Reunion in the Indian Ocean. Pope Saint John Paul II beatified him in 1989. From the Christian Brothers Website (<a href="www.lasalle.org">www.lasalle.org</a>): As a devout young man in his native village in Burgundy, Jean Bernard Rousseau was serving as a catechist when he was introduced to the Brothers, who had just opened a school in a nearby town. He entered the Paris novitiate in 1822.

After ten years in elementary schools throughout France, Brother Scubilion left France in 1833 to dedicate the remaining thirty-four years of his life to the enslaved natives on the island of Reunion in the Indian Ocean. Remembered as the "catechist of the slaves," he inaugurated evening classes for them, which were well attended, even after a long day of exhausting labor. He devised special programs and techniques, suited to their needs and abilities, in order to teach the essentials of Christian doctrine and morality, and prepare them to receive the sacraments. He won them over by his kindly manner and his respect for them. After the emancipation of the slaves in 1848, he continued to care

for them and to help them adapt to their new life of freedom and

responsibility. In the last years of his life, despite failing health, he assisted the local pastor in visiting the sick, winning over sinners, encouraging vocations, and even effecting what seemed to be miraculous cures. At his death he was venerated everywhere on the island as a saint.
