



American College Testing

The ACT is a standardized test for high school achievement and college admissions in the United States. The ACT has four sections: English, Reading, Math and Science, as well as an optional 40-minute writing test. The test is scored from 1 to 36, with 36 being perfect, on each test and a composite ACT score, which is an average of these four tests.

Aqua Wolves

The Saint Paul's Aqua Wolves finished the 2020 season with a strong showing. For the second straight year, the Wolves placed 3rd in the State Meet, held in Shreveport, LA on Saturday, November 21. They placed 2nd in the New Orleans Metro Championship and 1st in the Northlake Regional Championship (District) for the fifth straight year.

At the Northlake Regional Championship, the Aqua Wolves won three of the eleven events. Top Individual winner, senior Austin Peak, with a total of 40 points, was named the Metro Champion. Austin also finished first in the 100-yard Freestyle and 200-yard Freestyle races. Cameron Smith placed first in the 200-yard Individual Medley with a time of 2:07.56. The team of Bradford Day, Scott Messa, Austin Peak, and Cameron Smith placed first in the 200-yard Freestyle Relay and the 400-yard Freestyle Relay team of Jack McNamara, Austin Peak, Jack Rodgers, and Cameron Smith were first place finishers.

For the State Championship competition, team Captain Austin Peak was the runner-up in both the 200 Individual Medley and 100 Backstroke. The 200-yard Freestyle Relay team of Bradford Day, Scott Messa, Austin Peak, and Cameron Smith placed 3rd. The 400-yard Freestyle Relay team of Jack McNamara, Austin Peak, Jack Rodgers, and Cameron Smith also placed 3rd in a very close race. Junior Cameron Smith placed 4th in both the 100-yard and 200-yard Freestyle races and junior Evan Abraham placed 6th in the 100-yard Breaststroke Also scoring points for the team were Evan Abraham (200IM), Scott Messa (50 Free), Jack McNamara (500 Free), and Connor Dobie (100 Breast). State qualifiers Bradford Day, Roman Fouchi, and Jack Rodgers all swam best times in their individual events.
