

Ryan was also recently recognized by Southeastern Louisiana University as a member of SLU's Baseball 2000's All-Decade team. During his time at SLU, Ryan was a three-year letter winner and earned Southland All-Conference and LSWA All-Louisiana honors in 2005. He hit .310 with 11 doubles, 12 home runs and 62 RBIs that season. His RBI total was the sixth-highest by a Lion at the time and he led the team in home runs twice and RBIs once. Ryan finished his career ranked sixth in RBIs (111), seventh in hits (164) and 12th in home runs (22) and currently ranks 15th in home runs, 17th in RBIs and 20th in hits.

National Merit Finalist

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT)—which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.6 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry and participation requirements. Of the 1.6 million entrants, some 50,000 with the highest PSAT/NMSQT Selection Index scores (calculated by doubling the sum of the Reading, Writing and Language, and Math Test scores) qualify for recognition in the National Merit Scholarship Program. In September, these high scorers are notified through their schools that they have qualified as either a Commended Student or Semifinalist.

In early September, about 16,000 students, or approximately one-third of the 50,000 high scorers, are notified that they have qualified as Semifinalists. Nine of our students were recognized as Semifinalists. Several weeks ago, Saint Paul's School was notified that ALL of our Semifinalists had advanced to be Finalists. Beginning in March and continuing to mid-June, NMSC notifies approximately 7,500 Finalists that they have been selected to receive a Merit Scholarship award. Merit Scholarship awards are of three types: National Merit \$2500 Scholarships, Corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards or College-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards.

Sudden Impact



"One bad decision changes many lives" is the motto that concisely explains the motivation for the mission of the Sudden Impact program. The powerful message of the program is delivered by people on the frontline who see firsthand the devastation of bad decisions. Sharing a common goal of making Louisiana

roadways safer, troopers from Louisiana State Police and trauma prevention specialists from Lakeview Medical Center and St. Tammany Parish Hospital work together to educate youth throughout the Northshore community.

Sudden Impact is an interactive program that teaches students about the dangers of driving impaired, driving without a seat belt, and distracted driving. For the past ten years, Saint Paul's sophomores have been educated by this award-winning community outreach program. Due to the pandemic, students this year are unable to experience the Sudden Impact program in its typical setting, our local hospitals; however, our students have been fortunate to have the troopers and medical personnel come to our campus to teach this valuable program.

The importance of Sudden Impact for our students cannot be overstated as statistics reveal that the majority of fatal crashes investigated across the state in past years have involved impaired drivers and unrestrained occupants. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, motor vehicle crashes accounted for 43% of unintentional deaths in Louisiana alone. In addition, over the last seven years, Louisiana was ranked above the national average for alcohol-related fatalities.

The Saint Paul's community appreciates the state troopers from Troop L and the trauma specialists from our local hospitals for their continued dedication to educating the young men of Saint Paul's.








Saint Paul's Story - Great Graduation Gift!


