

- This Day in History: In 2014, Malaysia Airlines Flight 370, carrying 227 passengers and 12 crew members, loses contact with air traffic control less than an hour after taking off from Kuala Lumpur then veers off course and disappears. Despite a massive air-and-sea search effort for the Beijing-bound Boeing 777, investigators have failed to find any trace of the aircraft or determine why it vanished.
- **Did You Know:** On July 16, 1916, Louisiana State Legislature granted Saint Paul's official recognition as a College, with the authority to confer degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Sciences, and Master of Arts. No degrees, however, were ever conferred, but the Act remains on the books today and has never been revoked.

• **TDIH:** In 1916, Poncho Villa raids United States. This matters to SPS. What I've printed here is a repeat, but it's a foundational story – in our history and God's plan -- and needs to be read yearly.



From the History Channel's "This Day in History": Poncho Villa Raids U.S.

On March 9, 1916, several hundred Mexican guerrillas commanded by Francisco "Poncho" Villa cross the U.S.-Mexican border and attack the small border town of Columbus, New Mexico.... President Woodrow Wilson orders the U.S. Army into Mexico to capture the rebel leader dead or alive.

Why should we at SPS care about this anniversary? Because in an unwitting and unintentional way, Poncho Villa (left) helped found Saint Paul's School.

According to historical records of the Christian Brothers of the former New Orleans - Santa Fe Province, Mexican revolutionaries besieged the city of Zacatecas in 1914, where the Brothers had conducted a school for six years. Two Brothers were killed

and 14 were imprisoned. On July 6, the sister of the finance minister to the First Chief of the Revolutionaries hosted Poncho Villa for dinner. During this meal she interceded for the Brothers. Her son had attended the Brothers' school at Monterey. Villa consented and the Brothers were conveyed by rail coach under guard to El Paso. The Jesuit priests took them in, gave them necessities and advised them to travel to Santa Fe. The French consul arranged for train tickets, and the Brothers arrived at Santa Fe on July 13. Some of these Brothers later returned to France. Others were sent to different American communities, while some remained and helped establish the new District of New Orleans-Santa Fe. The unknown Brother who wrote the Historical Sketch, awed by the courage and dedication of these Brothers, remarked, "... for a more exemplary or edifying body of religious men, it would be very difficult to find."

Some of those same brothers, exiled from France in 1904 due to religious persecution and who went to Mexico only to be driven out in 1914, would eventually settle in Covington to assume ownership of Saint Paul's School. The rest, as they say, is history. Had Poncho Villa not released the Brothers from prison, they may never have found their way here.


Scripture tells us that God's ways are not our ways. Could there be a more relevant example of how God brings good out of evil, strength out of weakness, salvation out of despair? Could the Hand of God be any more obvious in our school's existence? Could we have any doubt that our work today is God's work -- a continuation of that miraculous journey to Covington, those incredible stories of heroic men giving their lives for the sake of the Lasallian Mission?

Today, we are the ones entrusted with that Mission. Today, we must be faithful. Today, we are the cooperators with God in His plan of salvation. Today, we must honor our ancestors and, yes, thank Poncho Villa for granting the Brothers a release from prison and a safe journey from Mexico. Who knows what good will come from our work today -- even when times are tough and the future blurry? May our Lenten journey give us eyes of faith and merciful hearts!




Rise Up, O Men of God

BAND HALL HISTORY: In the summer of 1966, the school constructed a "recreation center" for the recreational needs of the students living in La Salle Hall dorm. At a cost of \$15,000, a building was constructed to provide ping pong, pool, games and TV for boarders. Eventually, arcade-type games and a snack bar were added. In addition, a nine-hole miniature golf (putt-putt) course was built in front of the building, complete with lighting for nighttime use.

The facility, known simply as "the rec hall", served the recreational needs of the boarding students until the summer of 1995, when, once again, the needs of the school dictated change. The overall population of the school was growing, but the population of the boarding program was shrinking. Accordingly, the decision was made to move the "rec hall" into La Salle Hall itself and to move the band hall (which was located on the third floor of Benilde Hall) into the rec hall building, thus allowing us to construct five more classrooms in Benilde Hall. The miniature golf course had also deteriorated and was removed.

The building has served the Marching Wolves well since that time, but, again, needs dictate change. In addition to overall building deterioration, our band programs have been expanding of late and now include concert, jazz, and drum corps components in addition to the renowned Marching Wolves, now almost one hundred members strong! They are deserving of a better facility. This new facility will provide expanded space, restrooms, acoustics, and aesthetics to our music program. Construction has begun and this \$2.3 million project will be completed in the summer of 2021. Interested in supporting the renovation, whose overall cost will approach \$2.3 million? OLPH is the only Catholic school in Plaquemines Parish and has been in operation for the past 60 years. OLPH joins the growing number (over 100 this past year) of Catholic schools across the country that have closed. At times like these, I re-read English poet John Donne's immortal poem: For Whom the Bell Tolls. I re-print it here: "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were: any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bells tolls; it tolls for thee."

LENTEN PRACTICES: The guidelines for Catholics: Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to each one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years or older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and on all Fridays of Lent. The determination of certain days as obligatory days of penance should not be understood as limiting the occasions for Christian penance.

• St. Tammany Parish's unemployment rate is at its lowest since February 2020 according to the St. Tammany Corporation in its February edition of Snapshot: Impacts of COVID-19 on St. Tammany released last week.

- At 4.7%, this is the third consecutive month that St. Tammany's unemployment rate has trended downward, continuing to make it consistently lower than the state, regional and national average.
- St. Tammany has recorded more than 23,000 confirmed and probable COVID-19 cases and 474 COVID-related deaths. As the nationwide effort to vaccinate eligible individuals continues, 13.1% of adults have received vaccinations, and around 55% of adults report that they plan to get the vaccine once it is available.
- Consumer spending in St. Tammany has recovered compared to the same time last year, while small businesses revenues show a much rockier improvement and remain down more than half.
- Nationwide, more than a third of adults have struggled to pay for basic living expenses, and another third project that they will experience housing insecurity in the next two months as Americans await a second federal stimulus package.
- As gas prices rise nationwide, Greater New Orleans prices continue lower than the state, region and nation.

STUDY HALL AFTER SCHOOL: Ben's Den (aka the library) opens every afternoon (Monday-Friday) until 4:00. You are encouraged to mention this service to your sons who are on campus after school with nothing to do or who may be waiting for a late ride or a practice to begin. SUPERINTENDENT DR. RAENELL HOUSTON: From Dr. Houston to all Catholic schools: *I respectfully* request that you use prudent judgement and follow all civil parish guidelines for... events that take place outside of the regular school day and outside of typical school operations. If compliance with local civil guidance cannot be guaranteed and/or an event is likely to lead to a high risk of transmission of the COVID-19 virus, the event should be rescheduled for a later date when it is safer to do so.

In view of recent events, however, the counseling department has arranged for portions of the program to be delivered to our current eighth graders during the month of March. 8th grade parents and students have been notified via an email from Gina Hall. This is being proactive, and I commend the counselors for taking this step. Know that we take ANY hint of self-harm by a student very seriously, with protocols in place for handling the matter. 
