



This ceremony recalls many traditions of the past: travelers wore sandals so their feet were dirty and often blistered; upon arriving at the location, a servant usually washed the feet of visitors. It was a compliment of great proportion when the master of the house came to wash the feet of his visitors. When Jesus washed the feet of his Apostles, he demonstrated that leaders served their people and gave the new commandment "to love one another as he loved us." Announcement



Saint Paul's School announces Craig Ketelsen, the school's Athletic Director, has decided to retire effective June 30, 2021.

Ketelsen has served as Athletic Director since 2002, and during his tenure has established a solid, competitive athletic program at Saint Paul's School. He successfully coordinated the transition of the athletic programs from the 4A level to 5A level overseeing 40 teams in sixteen sports at four age levels (Pre-Freshmen, Freshmen, Junior Varsity, Varsity). Under his leadership, Saint Paul's teams captured 22 state titles in 10 different sports. Currently, in addition to his duties as Athletic Director, he serves as head junior high wrestling coach and world geography instructor.

For the majority of his Saint Paul's career, nearly 30 years, Ketelsen served as head wrestling coach, and during that time he led his team to two state championships, twenty parish titles, ten district titles, and was twice named Louisiana State Coach of the Year. He has coached 20 individual state champions and five All-Americans during his career. Additionally, Ketelsen has served as an assistant coach in numerous sports while at Saint Paul's and since 2016, he has overseen the school's highly successful summer sports camp program.

Among his many accolades, Ketelsen has been selected St. Tammany Parish Coach of the Year 20 times and District Coach of the year 10 times. He also has taken on key leadership roles in the state wrestling community serving for the past six years as a representative on the Louisiana High School Coaches' Association Board of Directors and nine years as the LHSAA Weight Certification Director for the Northshore. He is currently recognized as President Emeritus of the Louisiana Wrestling Coaches' Association having served a combined five terms as president and vice president of the association.

"We can't thank Craig enough for his dedication to SPS, especially the athletic program. He has been a trusted and valued employee, upon whom I have called many times for his insight, wisdom, and dedication. We wish him only good things and are not a bit surprised that he is being courted with other offers," stated Brother Raymond Bulliard, FSC, Saint Paul's School President.

Succeeding Ketelsen in the position of Athletic Director is Sam Francis who has served at Saint Paul's as both teacher and coach for the past 14 years. He currently teaches world geography, serves as an assistant head coach in football, and moderates the bowling team. He has taught in the Archdiocese of New Orleans since 2005 and has coached for nearly 20 years. Prior to arriving at Saint Paul's, Francis was on the faculty at Pope John Paul II High School and taught history, health and physical education, and coached in the football and track programs.

Francis earned his bachelor degree from the University of New Orleans and completed a Masters of Arts in Lasallian Leadership from Saint Mary's University in Minnesota. Brother Ray noted, "Sam is an enthusiastic, positive leader who motivates young people to perform beyond what they may think is their best -- all within the context of the Mission of Saint Paul's School. He will continue the great work done by Craig Ketelsen and insure that Saint Paul's athletics remains one of the premier programs in the state. I look forward to even greater athletic accomplishments under Sam's leadership."

Senior Retreat & Life Skills

The senior retreat has long stood as a testament to the brotherhood, connections, and history of Saint Paul's School. Marian Players – The Glass Menagerie

The Marian Players of Saint Paul's Theater presented Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" from April 14-24, 2021. This deeply personal and moving drama is the play that launched the career of the southern-born Williams, marking his first hit on Broadway, in a career that also produced "A Streetcar Named Desire" and "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof". Tom Wingfield, based on Williams, lives in a small St. Louis apartment with his mother, Amanda, and his sister, Laura, responsible for them both, but dreaming of a life of adventure. Williams based the characters on his own family.

Marian Players Director Gordon Carmadelle said of the play "It truly is a beautiful show- it's touching and heartfelt, but it also has several very funny moments in it. It has some of the most beautiful and poetic language of any play, and it ultimately presents a message that we are all responsible for each other in some way. I think that's a great message for our students and for everyone right now."

In efforts to navigate the realities of Covid-19, two rotating casts took the stage, each on specific show dates. "We wanted to protect our students, but also give them the best possible chance to finish the show the right way, because they truly do work very hard on shows. This one in particular surprised a lot of people in how good the quality of acting was, considering the depth and power of the material and the relative youth of our actors. We're very proud of them and we feel like we gave audiences not just a good high school show, but a good show period."
