The United States Department of Education once again has recognized Saint Paul's School as a National Blue Ribbon School Awardee. The school, now a multiple awardee, earned its first National Blue Ribbon award for excellence in teaching and learning in 2015. Saint Paul's is one of only four high schools in Louisiana and one of 23 private schools in the nation to receive the distinction this year.

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program, now in its 39th year, honors schools which have achieved high levels of academic performance. In order for a nonpublic school such as Saint Paul's to be recognized as "Exemplary High Performing," student achievement in math and English must be among the highest in the country, the top 15%, as measured by state and nationally normed tests. He has served as an educator at the following educational institutions throughout his career: St. Michael's High School in Santa Fe, the Scholasticate in Las Vegas, Landry Memorial High School in Lake Charles, the Junior Novitiate in Lafayette, De La Salle High School in New Orleans, Saint Paul's School in Covington, and Southern University in New Orleans. Occupation: Radiologist at Ochsner since 1969, What is your favorite memory at Saint Paul's? The summer after our graduation in 1957, our parents allowed us take a 6 week trip through the Western United States. We had a trailer and camping gear. We visited former Saint Paul's teachers and Brothers in New Mexico, Denver and Santa Fe. It was a wonderful bonding trip which furthered lifelong friendships. Bill Healy, Charlie Wheeler, Pete Wolfe, Emile Ibos and I had an unbelievable trip. There were no cell phones and very little communication with our families. My parents even moved while we were out of town, but I found them.

What do you value most about your Saint Paul's education and experience? I value most, the friends I made, the wonderful teachers we had, and my religious formation and experience.

Who was your favorite or most impactful teacher? I have two, Brother Camillus who taught Religion and English and Col. Al Sunseri who taught American History. Col. Sunseri made us take notes like we were in a college course which was great practice for us. He was a Civil War expert and we spent weeks discussing the Battle of Shiloh. He also taught marksmanship in the rifle range under the old chapel (currently the Alumni Theater.)

What advice would you give to current students or young alumni? Strive to make lifelong friends. Keep in touch with them and the teachers who spent so much time and love educating you and allowing you to become fine young men. Thank your parents for making the sacrifices to allow you to attend Saint Paul's.

In what ways do you continue to be involved with Saint Paul's at this phase of your life? I am actively involved in the Gray Wolves (alumni of a certain vintage). You will get much more out of staying actively involved than you give. Further, I am a perennial supporter of the Annual Fund.

What would you describe as your greatest takeaway from Saint Paul's? My greatest takeaways are: my education, my ability to succeed, and my religious values which I treasure. Always remember that our Lord is there for each of us on our good days and our bad days. He always has open arms to welcome us back and protect and encourage us.

Although not perceptible to the human eye, a significant change recently occurred in the life of Brother Javier Hansen, FSC. Brother Javier, a second-year teacher at Saint Paul's School is now "Perpetually Professed," which means that he has professed his Final Vows as a De La Salle Christian Brother. The ceremony took place on July 23, 2021, at Mont La Salle in Napa, California, during a commitment liturgy recognizing significant events in the lives of the Brothers from the San Francisco New Orleans District (SFNO).

Brother Javier's 8 year vocational journey began when he was introduced to the Christian

Brothers while attending Saint Mary's College of California for his undergraduate degree. He became impressed by the dedication of the Brothers and witnessed first hand their commitment to being both good teachers as well as good men of prayer. He shared, "My understanding of vocation is you have to find the world's greatest need and then you have to find your greatest interest and you have to combine those two. So, for me, being a Brother is the best way I can do that."

After joining the Christian Brothers, he spent one year in San Francisco at Sacred Heart Cathedral Prep. He then spent one year working at La Salle Academy in Philadelphia followed by a year of study in Chicago. He took his Annual Vows and moved to El Paso for four years and worked at Cathedral High School-El Paso while also earning his Master's Degree from the University of Texas. The next step on his journey brought him to Saint Paul's in Covington where he prepared for Final Vows while teaching religion to pre-freshmen last year.

Another special recognition occurred during the commitment liturgy in which Brother Javier took his Final Vows. The Brothers of SFNO District honored nineteen Christian Brothers for marking milestones in their years of service in district ministries and communities, including several from the Saint Paul's retired Brothers community: Bro. Bill Ray, 60 years; Bro. Duane Gregory, 60 years; and Bro. Peter Dudenheffer, 55 years.



School News





In 1911, Dixon Academy was purchased by The Benedictines of Saint Joseph Abbey and renamed to Saint Paul's College in honor of the patron of the Abbot of Saint Joseph's monastery. Father Augustine was named the first principal and on September 10th, Fathers Augustine, Adelbert, and Aemilian moved onto campus. As time went by, the Benedictines decided to concentrate their efforts at The Abbey and leased, with an agreement to purchase, Saint Paul's to the Brothers of the Christian Schools.

Nineteen French Brothers, previously living in exile, arrived in Covington during the summer of 1918. They were forced out of France due to government persecution of the Catholic Church in the early 1900's and moved to Mexico to start schools. During the Carranza Revolution in Mexico in 1914, the Brothers barely escaped with their lives and were scattered around the United States. When the Christian Brothers decided to purchase Saint Paul's College, these nineteen Brothers were sent to Covington, LA. Br. Nilammon was appointed as the first Christian Brother President.

These pioneer Brothers worked long hours, not only teaching and guiding their students, but also staffing the school as carpenters, painters, plumbers, electricians, and yardmen. Inspired by the zeal of the founding Brothers, Saint Paul's has prospered. "Help us Live the Gospel!"

The theme of the school year is an executive decision made by President Brother Ray Bulliard, Principal Trevor Watkins, and Assistant Principal Joe Dickens. It is always something based on a basic principle of Lasallian pedagogy or values. "Saintly Brothers of Turón, help us live the Gospel!" was chosen this year.

In 1934 Turón, Spain was the center of antigovernment and anticlerical hostility prior to the Spanish Civil War. The Brothers' school then was an irritant to the radicals in charge of the town because of the religious influence it exerted on the young. The Brothers were known to defy the ban on teaching religion and they openly escorted students to Mass.

On the First Friday of October, the authorities broke into the Brothers' house on the pretext that arms had been hidden. The Brothers were preparing to celebrate Mass. They and their chaplain were arrested, detained over the weekend without trial, and then in the middle of the night were marched out to the cemetery where they were summarily shot. Brother Cirilo, the Director, was 46 years old and Brother Marciano, the cook, was 39. Brother Julián was 32 and all the rest were in their twenties. They were arrested, detained, and executed as a community, victims of the hatred and violence against the Church. They witnessed by their death to the Gospel faith they so courageously professed and so effectively communicated to their students.






