


This Saturday, October 9, is the feast of the Christian Brother Martyrs of Turon, canonized by Saint Pope John Paul II: Saint Brothers Cirilo Bertrán, Marciano José, Julián Alfredo, Victoriano Pío, Benito de Jesus, Benjamin Julián, Augusto Andrés, Aniceto Adolfo and Saint Father Inocencio. From the Christian Brothers' website:

In 1934, Turón was the center of anticlerical hostility. The Brothers' school was an irritant to radicals in charge because of the religious influence it exerted. The Brothers defied the ban on teaching religion & openly escorted students to Mass. On the First Fri of Oct, authorities broke into the Brothers' house on the pretext that arms were hidden there. They and their chaplain were arrested and marched to the cemetery where they were shot. Brother Cirilo, the Director, was 46 and Brother Marciano was 39. Brother Julián was 32 and all the rest were in their twenties. They were arrested, detained, and executed as a community. Victims of the hatred and violence against the Church, they witnessed by their death to the faith they so courageously professed and so effectively communicated to their students.

I pray that I have such faith and courage! Saintly Brother Martyrs of Turon! Help us live the Gospel!

Mon, Oct 4 (C D E F – Wolf Packs meet this morning)

- Today we celebrate the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, one of the most venerated religious figures in history and founder of the Franciscan Order. It's most appropriate that we remember this iconic saint by reciting the prayer attributed to him (but probably not composed by him): Lord, make me an instrument of thy peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; Where there is injury, pardon; Where there is doubt, faith; Where there is despair, hope; Where there is darkness, light; Where there is sadness, joy. O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek To be consoled as to console, To be understood as to understand, To be loved as to love; For it is in giving that we receive; It is in pardoning that we are pardoned; It is in dying to self that we are born to eternal life.

Oldest known portrait in of St. Francis, dating to his retreat to Subiaco (1223–1224)


• Taco Day: Enjoy! From the NTD web site: The history of the taco is unknown. According to some taco experts [a job I wouldn't mind having!], the word originates from the 18th C. silver mines in Mexico, when taco referred to little explosives that workers used to extract ore. These were pieces of paper wrapped around gunpowder and placed in holes carved in rock. "A chicken taquito with a good hot sauce is really a lot like a stick of dynamite," says taco expert Jeffrey Pilcher [and I thought I had the best job!] "The first references [to the taco] come from the end of the 19th C. One of the first tacos described is called tacos de minero—miner's tacos. Others claim tacos predate the arrival of the Spanish in Mexico in the 16th century. Anthropologists say there is evidence suggesting inhabitants of the lake region of the Valley of Mexico ate tacos filled with small fish. The fish were replaced by small live insects and ants in the states of Morelos and Guerrero, while locusts and snails were favorite fillings in Puebla and Oaxaca. Taco Bell is believed to have pushed widespread popularity of Mexican food in the U.S.... The hard-shell taco was invented long before Taco Bell. The U-shaped version is first noted in 1949 in a cookbook. And now you know....

Tue, Oct 5 (G A B C – Seniors take ACT today)

- Memorial of Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos: Father Seelos is a favorite in the New Orleans area. He was assigned in 1866 to the Redemptorist community in New Orleans. Here also, as pastor of the Church of St. Mary of the Assumption, he was known as a pastor who was joyously available to his faithful and singularly concerned for the poorest and the most abandoned. In God's plan, however, his ministry in New Orleans was destined to be brief. In the month of September, exhausted from visiting and caring for the victims of yellow fever, he contracted the dreaded disease. After several weeks of patiently enduring his illness, he passed on to eternal life on October 4, 1867, at the age of 48 years and 9 months. He was beatified by St Pope John Paul II in 2000. Father Seelos, pray for us!
- **TDIH:** In 1892, The Dalton gang attempts to rob two banks simultaneously in Coffeyville, Kansas, but meets resistance from townspeople, who wind up killing four of the five bandits. Emmett
 - Dalton, the sole survivor, returned to the site of the crime nearly 40 years later and offered a caution to would-be thieves: "The biggest fool on earth is the one who thinks he can beat the law, that crime can be made to pay. It never paid and it never will and that was the one big lesson of the Coffeyville raid."
- **TDIH:** In 1947, President Harry Truman (1884-1972) makes the first-ever televised presidential address from the White House, asking Americans to cut back on their use of grain in order to help starving Europeans. At the time of Truman's food-conservation speech, Europe was still recovering from WW II.
- **Do Something Nice Day:** Go ahead, do something nice anything. It won't hurt; I promise!

Wed, Oct 6 (D E F G)

- **TIDH:** in 2015, SPS students entered the new gym for the first time, to the resounding strains of George Fredrick Handel's Halleluiah Chorus! Magnificent! We thank all who made this campus jewel possible!
- **TDIH:** In 1927, the first "talkie" opened in New York. *The Jazz Singer* starring Al Jolson was the first full-length feature film using spoken dialogue.
- TDIH: In 1979, President Jimmy Carter receives Pope John Paul II, the first Pope to visit the White House.
- **Mad Hatter Day:** Today refers to the character from <u>Alice's Adventures in Wonderland</u>, where the Mad Hatter is always seen wearing a hat bearing a slip of paper with the notation "In this style 10/6" an invitation



to behave in the style of the Mad Hatter on 10/6. Mad Hatter Day began in Boulder, CO, in 1986, among computer folk who had nothing better to do. In 1988, it was recognized as an official holiday by an area business, and also received its first national press coverage by news services. What do people do on Mad Hatter Day? In general, people celebrate silliness – but not during school!

Fri, Oct 8 – (Half Day due to End of Quarter; E F)

• Alvin C. York Day: Sgt. York is the most decorated American soldier in World War I. From the Sgt. York website: On Oct 8, 1918, after being pinned down, York took his fateful walk into history. He and 16 other soldiers... were given the unenviable task of silencing the machine guns that halted the advance. It was a cold, wet morning. Rain mixed with sleet added to the gloom of the fog that draped the landscape. As the soldiers worked their way around the hill, the men on the left flank stood exposed in the creek bottom. German machine gunners opened fire, wounding or killing nine Americans, including York's best friend. York was on the right flank beneath the crest of the hill in a natural depression, which he used to kill nine of the men who operated the guns. In the meantime, his comrades opened fire on the Germans, and in a few minutes 25 were dead. The

Germans surrendered to what they thought was a superior force, and York and the American survivors escorted 132 prisoners to American forces some 10 miles away. Sergeant York was awarded his nation's highest decoration, the Medal of Honor, for his actions [that day.]



AFTER SCHOOL: The Library will remain open to students until 4 pm. If your son is looking for a comfortable place to wait for his ride and get a jump on his homework, this is a good option for him.

ASSEMBLY ON SEP 28: I hope the students enjoyed my assembly on Sep 28. Here is some of what we did:

• In honor of Homecoming Week, the students entered the gym listening to a song called "I Feel Home" by O.A.R. This song was sung at an assembly in our gym eighteen years ago by then student council president **Kramer Johnson**, brother of SPS alums **Nick and Evan and son of alumnus and Covington Mayor Mark Johnson**, to express how he felt about Saint Paul's. It's become a ritual ever since at homecoming as alums return to the "SPS Home" to reconnect with the brotherhood of SPS. Six years ago, magically, Kramer appeared in the gym complete with his guitar. Unbeknownst to me, he had arranged to come in from Georgia to sing the song again for the then current student body – which he did to the obvious delight of everyone present. At the conclusion of the song, the student body burst into a rousing, spontaneous, standing ovation! It was a magical moment! BTW, Kramer graduated from the University of Georgia with a degree in marketing and works for the marketing department of Chick-fil-A. He is married with two children. He's a fantastic young man!

- Welcomed everyone to the 8th week of the first quarter and reminded them that the first quarter (25% of the school year) is almost over and asked them to reflect how their year has been so far. Have they "polished that Baroque pearl" that each of them were metaphorically given on the first day of school? Are they closer to God? To their families? To their friends? To humanity in general?
- Prayed in a special way, as junior Nathan Vincens lit the prayer candle for all of our intentions, especially for those who have entered God's Kingdom since our last assembly: Mr. Kelvin Adams, grandfather of Ralph Wynne '24; Mrs. Dolores Wilson grandmother of Ethan Wilson '23; Mrs. Terri Marengo, grandmother of Conner Dazet '23 & Evan Showalter '25
- Reminded the students that our Mission Statement calls us to offer strong academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs in a safe and disciplined environment and to live the Gospel values of Jesus
- Recognized and congratulated the Student Council for their work during Homecoming Week. While OAR played robustly in the background, I showed a slide show montage of all the various events that took place during Homecoming Week and gave a special shout out to our stalwart Student Council: president Walker Dubreuil, vice-president Marco Vargas, Secretary Ben Barousse, treasurer Ethan Wilson, and Parliamentarian Isaiah Ayo, along with the various class presidents and vice-presidents. And, of course, moderators Joanna Case and Shannon d'Hemecourt were recognized, too!
- Recognized and congratulated the 9th Grade, JV, and Varsity Football Teams for great district wins over Slidell. Congratulated the 8th grade football team for its win over Franklinton.

- Played "Venus Bringing of Peace" from Gustave Holst's "The Planets" as I recognized more students who went above and beyond in helping others with Hurricane Ida recovery: **Cooper Estrade**, who traveled to Lafitte to help work on St. Anthony's Catholic Church and junior **Cameron Mary** who waded into chest high flood water in order to rescue his neighbor's cat!
- As I was running out of time, I told the boys that I had much more but they would roll over to the next assembly but wanted to do a special recognition to end the assembly. I began by showing students slides of Lasallian schools throughout the world and gradually ended up with our Province Headquarters, Mont La Salle in Napa, CA. In July, our own Brother Javier was in Napa to take his final vows as a Christian Brothers vows which are for life. I then showed the students a video of Brother reading his vows before the Brothers gathered in Napa. We then gave him a standing ovation while Student Council President Dubreuil presented Brother with a small token of our esteem for him. It was a moving moment.
- We ended the assembly by standing and singing Joyful, Joyful We Adore You set to the music of the final movement of Beethoven's 9th, commonly known as Ode to Joy. It was GREAT.
- As junior **Christian Schaumberg** extinguished the prayer candle, I reminded the students that they must be the Light of God to all whom they meet. We ended the assembly to the strains of O.A.R.'s "I Feel Home"
- It was a great assembly at least I thought so!

BAND HALL HISTORY: The work nears completion! Some band hall history: In the summer of 1966, the school constructed a "recreation center" for the needs of the students living in La Salle Hall dorm. At a cost of \$15,000, a building was constructed to provide ping pong, pool, games and TV for boarders. Eventually, arcade-type games and a snack bar were added. In addition, a nine-hole miniature golf (putt-putt) course was built in front of the building, complete with lighting.

The facility, known simply as "the rec hall", served the recreational needs of the boarding students until the summer of 1995, when, once again, the needs of the school dictated change. The overall population of the school was growing, but the population of the boarding program was shrinking. Accordingly, the decision was made to move the "rec hall" into La Salle Hall itself and to move the band hall (which was located on the third floor of Benilde Hall) into the rec hall building, thus allowing us to construct five more classrooms in Benilde Hall. The miniature golf course had also deteriorated and was removed.

The building served the Marching Wolves well since that time, but, again, needs dictate change. In addition to overall building deterioration, our band programs have been expanding of late and now include concert, jazz, and drum corps components in addition to the renowned Marching Wolves, now almost one hundred members strong! They are deserving of a better facility. This new facility will provide expanded space, restrooms, acoustics, and aesthetics to our music program. Construction has begun and this \$2.3 million project will be completed in early fall of 2021. Interested in supporting the renovation, whose overall cost will approach \$2.3 million? BROTHERS COMMUNITIES UPDATE: As many of you know, the Christian Brothers of Saint Paul's have lived in three separate venues: the main residence on campus, a house on Jahncke Avenue not far from the school entrance, and a fourplex on S. Adams Street by the back of the baseball field. This last venue housed a separate community, the Brother Charles Crouzet Community. Unfortunately, Ida caused significant damage to this residence. A structural engineer hired by our insurance company concluded that "a complete demolition down to the slab would be more economically feasible" than rebuilding – a recommendation which has been accepted by our Board of Trustees. In addition, Brother Donald, our Provincial, has officially closed the Crouzet Community and re-assigned the three Brothers involved: Brother Terrence and Brother Ken have been re-assigned to the main St. Paul's Community. Terrence has moved into the main residence and Ken will move into Jahncke Street when repairs are complete on that house. We certainly are sensitive to the disruption to the lives of these Brothers that these changes have caused. The Brothers of the Crouzet Community have been extremely important to SPS over the years, and we offer support as they adjust to the realities caused by Ida.

CALENDAR EDITS: We are adjusting our calendar to eliminate the Fall Break Day on Oct 2, the Archdiocesan Formation Day on Nov 8, and the start of Christmas holidays on Dec 17. These are now school days, which Christmas holidays beginning after exams on Dec. 17th.

CAR LINES: There is no absolute designated drop off spot. Be patient the first few days of school as traffic patterns form. Safety is paramount, so if you use Founder's Circle as a departure point, **cars must drop off students in Founders Circle in the LEFT lane onl**y – you may not block traffic in the right lane to discharge the occupants. Dropping off at La Salle Hall or by the BAC is OK. Traffic will be heavy heading into Covington this week as schools open. Please plan accordingly.

CELL PHONES:

• State Law: Motorists are prohibited from using any type of hand-held wireless communications device while traveling through school zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.

• **School Cell Phone Policy:** students may use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed.

COVID PROTOCOLS UPDATE: We are awaiting directives from Superintendent of Catholic Schools RaeNell Houston concerning State Superintendent of Education Cade Brumley's recent pronouncement on quarantine protocols. Until Dr. Houston issues her directive, we have been told to continue with our current policy. And the indoor mask mandate has been extended by Governor John Bel Edwards until October 27. Please make sure your son comes to school with this mask, prepared to wear it inside any building. We have no choice in these matters if we wish to continue in-person learning.

DRESS CODE: Students must be in compliance with the dress code — and this includes wearing masks. We are not granting exceptions to the mask requirement so please don't ask. Refer to previous newsletters or the student handbook on our website for particulars if you are still unsure about dress code. Note: We have a number of clean, pre-owned SPS uniform shirts and khaki shorts in good condition. Feel free to ask for some of these clothes. Nothing is done to embarrass a student and no one will know. Thanks to those families who supply us with their outgrown uniforms. Just call Andrea in the Admin Bldg.


DRIVER'S LICENSE PROOF OF ATTENDANCE: Your son needs proof of attendance in order to get a learner's permit **and another one** when he gets his permanent license. The forms are in the counseling department or the administration building. This is a legislative act; don't blame me!

EMERGENCY CLOSINGS: As with Ida, I remind all of our emergency or weather-related closing policy — which is to follow both the civil parish and / or the directives of the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Thus, if needed (and we hope it's not), Saint Paul's School will follow the same decision of closure as the public school system of St. Tammany Parish. School messaging will also be activated with updated information and situations unique to SPS. For multi-day closings, Saint Paul's reserves the right to re-open when our situation warrants, even if the public school remain closed, as was the case in Hurricane Katrina. In the meantime, we pray.

ENROLLMENT: We opened this year with a very healthy enrollment – in spite of COVID-19 and after having graduated a very large class. I am humbled and proud that so many parents are willing to entrust their sons to us and make the sacrifices necessary to do so. **Please stress with your son that he is being given a gift – a gift that others want. He must use this gift wisely and make good choices**.

GET INVOLVED DAY: We held our annual Get Involved Day on Aug 23, when our numerous clubs, sports, and activities recruited new members. Our plethora of activities hold something for all. Encourage your son to explore

new horizons and take a chance on a new activity.

It's very annoying when we get a Plus Portals email with a question but your setting won't accept our response.

SCHOOL SAFETY: School safety remains paramount for all. Promote safety with your son. Safety is EVERYONE'S JOB. Report ANY rumor or safety threat. Encourage your sons to report, too. **All visitors to campus must sign in and receive a Visitor's Pass – and wear a mask. You may not just wander the campus. Thanks for understanding this procedure.** Our prayers rise to heaven for a safe school year and the elimination of violence of all kinds in our schools – and in all of society.

SILENT SUSTAINED READING: SSR occurs during the first 15 minutes of Block 2, when everyone reads silently for 15 minutes. This is not a time for homework, tutoring, studying textbooks or doing assigned reading, but is designed to make reading a school-wide priority by reading for pleasure. We hope to develop a population of self-motivated readers. The program was created over 30 years ago at the University of Vermont and over the years has resulted in increased vocabulary development, reading fluency and comprehension, writing quality, improved standardized test scores, increased background knowledge on a wide range of topics, and increased reading time out of school. Students were instructed to bring their own reading material but we will have classrooms stocked with magazines, novels, short stories, etc. Help your son prepare for this initiative and have him come prepared every day for SSR. He should bring a PRINTED READING MATERIAL – not electronic material You might want to consider initiating a family SSR time, too! I'll keep you posted as to how things go.

TIC TOC SCHOOL VANDALISM: This is tragic and embarrassing: TIC TOC (don't ask me to explain it; ask your son) is encouraging school bathroom vandalism – and it is spreading throughout the nation. And their latest is even worse: encouraging students to slap teachers! Just google it. Unfortunately, and this is the embarrassing part, it hit SPS recently, with soap dispensers being ripped off of walls – in our newly constructed buildings, no less! PLEASE speak with your son about this and have him report any vandalism about which he knows. SERIOUS disciplinary measures will be imposed when we find the perpetrators – and we will. They will be looking for other schools.

TRAFFIC FLOW ON CAMPUS: If you drop off or pick up your son, you will meet road congestion around our campus. We ask your help in improving the traffic flow and safety:

- Consider an alternate pick-up location for your son other than Founder's Circle. These include the drop off area by the Gene Bennett Sports Complex, the parking lot on the corner of 13th and Jefferson St. or the parking lot at LaSalle Hall on 11th Avenue. You can drive through these parking lots or wait in a parking space there without holding up traffic elsewhere.
- DO NOT pick up your son using the shoulder of 11th Avenue. This is a dangerous area with poor visibility and further backs up traffic when you stop to load or unload.
- If you use the LaSalle Drive (main entrance) car line, please wait to the left so that thru traffic can still move through our campus using the right lane.
- Coordinate with your son about where and when you will meet him in the afternoon. If he is not present when you drive through, please proceed to a parking lot and wait for him there. If you stop in the car line to wait, you are holding up all cars behind you.
- Remind your son to be on the lookout for your car as you drive up.
- Our primary concern is safety, so please adhere to all speed limit and traffic rules in the school area. We are working closely with the Covington Police Department to find solutions to traffic around school. Working together, we can improve both safety and circulation around our campus.

TUTORING: Our National Honor Society has begun FREE tutoring during lunch periods, Monday through Thursday in the library. Subjects offered are Science, Math, and English. Encourage your son to take advantage of this free service and to stay on top of his academic progress.

UNIFORMS: Reminders:


- Uniform shirts, ties, and socks are sold by Bayou Uniform (13488 Seymour Myers Blvd) in Covington. Only white SPS socks are allowed.
- Sweatshirts, fleeces, PE uniforms, etc. are sold by the Mothers Club bookstore.
- Khaki pants/shorts may come from any vendor as long as they are NOT cargo pants and are standard tan khaki color, not green or brown.
- There is no uniform shoe but no sandals, etc. are allowed. The more conservative the better.
- We now have a "dress uniform" which will be worn on special occasions: LONG khaki pants, dress white shirt (any brand is OK even if it has a small logo), dress socks, belt, SCHOOL TIE, and any shoe that is not a tennis/athletic shoe.
- ID cards must be worn DAILY. This is a safety measure.
