

## Day of the Dead

As a school centered on the core principle of faith in the presence of God, the Spanish Club, guided by moderator Mrs. Liz Brett, created a memorable eleventh annual Day of the Dead ceremony which was held in Our Lady of Peace Chapel.



# **Aqua Wolves**

The Saint Paul's Aqua Wolves finished the 2021 season with a strong showing. For the second straight year, the Wolves placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the State Meet, held in Shreveport, LA on Saturday, November 21. They placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in the New Orleans Metro Championship (for the fifth time) and 1<sup>st</sup> in the Northlake Regional Championship (District) for the sixth straight year.

At the Northlake Regional Championship, The Wolves finished with 402 points to claim the boys title with Fontainebleau and Mandeville following a distant second and third with 295 and 275 points respectively. "Seventeen boys score individually in the meet, which goes a long way to getting a total team victory" said Coach Emmett Smith. "We won two relays, and had two different swimmers win individual events." Senior Cameron Smith won the 200-yard individual medley (2:03.71) and the 100 backstroke (58.18), and he also won first-place in two relays. That performance earned him male Swimmer of the Meet honors.


For the State Championship competition, the highlight of the meet was breaking three Saint Paul's School swimming records. Cameron Smith lowered the 100 freestyle record in placing 4<sup>th</sup> overall in state. He was also instrumental in leading the way for both the 200 freestyle relay and the 400 freestyle relay. Both relays smashed the previous school records in placing 3<sup>rd</sup> in the state for both.

The relay team of Cameron Smith, Jack Rogers, Jack McNamara, and Hyland Authement finished only one tenth of a second out of first place in the 200 relay. In the meet's final event, the 400 freestyle relay team of Cameron Smith, Jack Rogers, Jack McNamara, and Roman Fouchi lowered the school record by 4 seconds!


Mu Alpha Theta is an international honors math club. Admission into the Saint Paul's chapter of Mu Alpha Theta requires that students taking regular math may not earn a grade lower than an A, and all students need at least a 3.5 overall grade point average. Members are required to participate in one math tournament each year.

Admission into the National Honor Society requires a cumulative grade point average of 3.8 or higher, as well as the following: leadership, service, and good character as demonstrated by activities and positive disciplinary standing. Each member is required to complete one individual service project per semester.

As a service requirement for both Mu Alpha Theta and the National Honor Society, members offer tutoring in math, science, and English for Saint Paul's students Monday through Thursday in the library.


