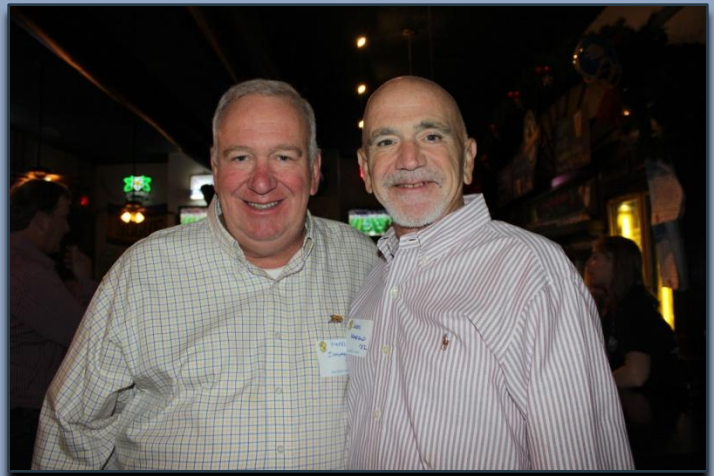
Christmas on Columbia

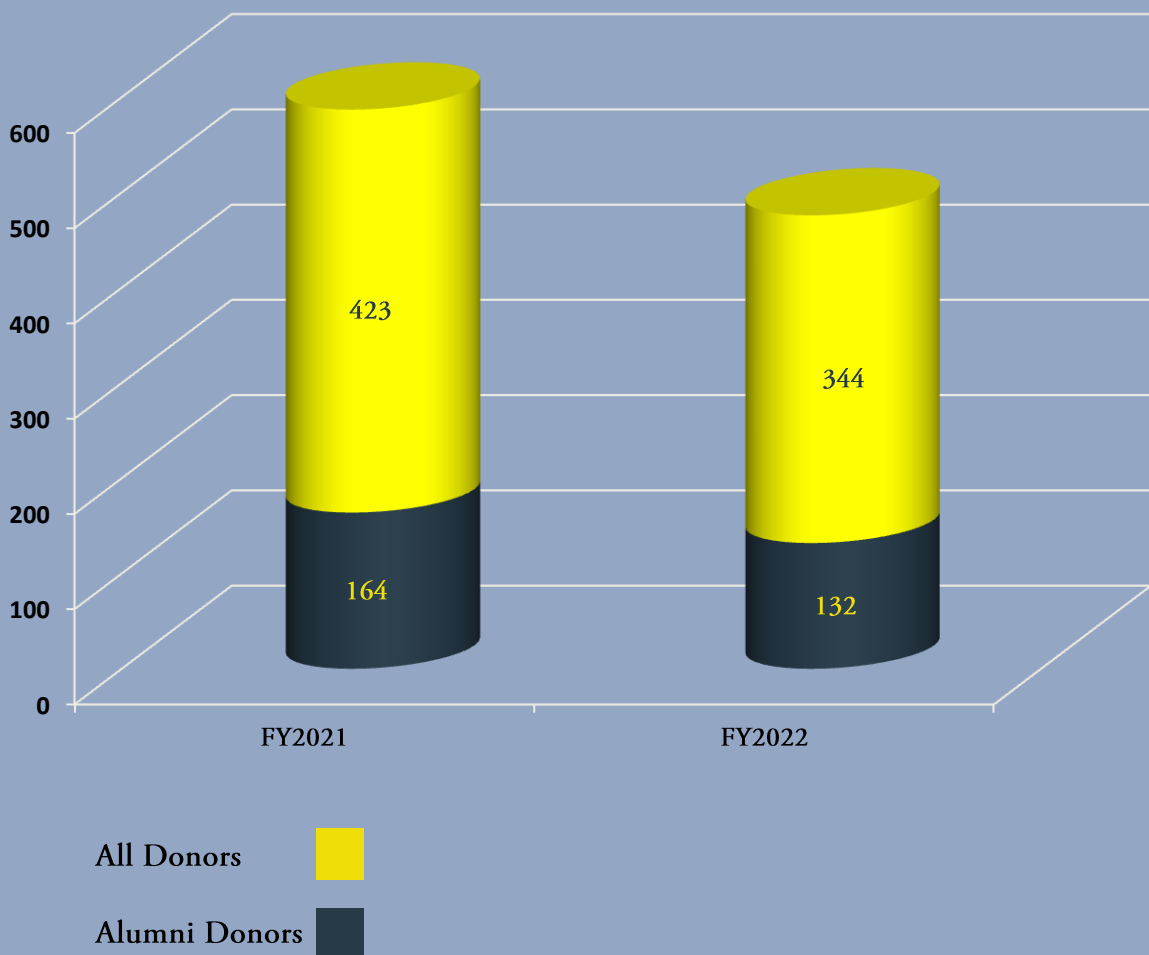

Presidential Scholars

Congratulations to Saint Paul's School seniors, William Ditta, James Walker Dubreuil, and Daniel Whalen on being chosen as candidates in the prestigious U.S. Presidential Scholars Program for 2022, one of the nation's highest honors for high school students.

Application for this award is by invitation only. The seniors were selected on the basis of their academic achievements primarily determined by SAT and ACT scores. Test scores are used to select candidates from each state, approximately 4,000 candidates in all.

These three Saint Paul's seniors will now advance to the next level of the award program. A review committee will evaluate their academic achievement, personal characteristics, leadership and service activities, and an analysis of their essays. Nearly 650 candidates will be named semifinalists.

In April, a further review of semifinalists' applications by the Commission on Presidential Scholars will result in the designation of approximately 160 U.S Presidential Scholars.

The United States Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, and for over 57 years, this program has honored almost 8,000 U.S. Presidential Scholars, who have demonstrated leadership, scholarship, and contribution to school and community. The work of the Commission on Presidential Scholars reaffirms, on behalf of the President, the nation's commitment to education. [About the program.](#)

Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul

Saint Paul's School celebrated a school mass on the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul, the patron saint of our school, on Tuesday, January 25. Fr. Matthew Clark, OSB, school chaplain, presided over the live-streamed mass from Our Lady of Peace Chapel. Because of the uptick of Covid cases, Saint Paul's opted for a virtual liturgy that was broadcast to the school community. When the time came for the distribution of communion, the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion were each assigned a set of classrooms to administer the Blessed Sacrament to the student body.

Saint Paul was a zealous Jewish scholar, who had persecuted countless Christians. After his encounter with Christ, he became an unstoppable force for the kingdom of God. Paul would go on to significantly mold the Mediterranean's early Christian communities, traveling and writing countless letters of spiritual guidance and insight. Paul's ministry is set apart from other apostles because of his message that the gospel is for Gentiles and Jews alike.

After the liturgy, students and faculty were renewed and felt a peace in themselves.

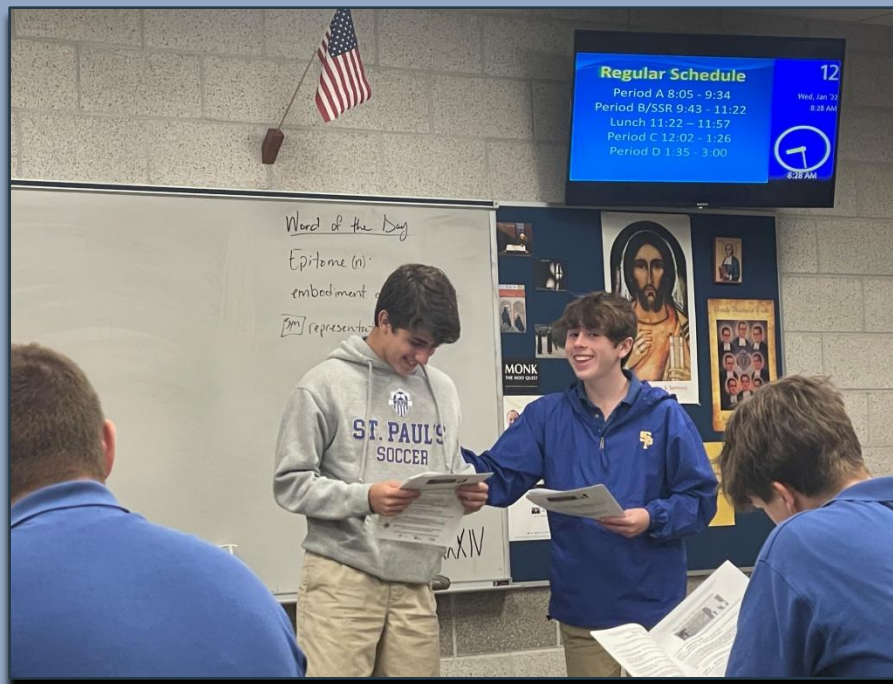
Teen Life Counts

Saint Paul's sophomores have been fortunate to participate in Teen Life Counts (TLC), a suicide prevention program offered by the Jewish Family Service (JFS) and arranged by the Saint Paul's School counseling center.

Teen Life Counts is offered to all sophomores during religion class and is lead by professionally trained staff and volunteers. With suicide being the second leading cause of death among 10 - 24 year olds, this valuable program has been a mainstay in the sophomore curriculum for over 20 years and was instituted in the pre-freshmen curriculum this year. Students are provided the opportunity to learn about teen suicide statistics, the stigma associated with mental illness, the warning signs of suicide, how to have a conversation with peers and adults, and where to get help.

Jewish Family Services has brought Teen Life Counts to middle and high school students in the Greater New Orleans area for over 30 years offering tools and resources upon request to public, parochial, private, and charter schools.

New Band Building

Saint Paul's music program has been enhanced with the completion of the multi million dollar band facility at the end of the year. Construction began during the summer of 2020 with the resulting building having latest acoustics, technology (including microphones, recording equipment, etc.) and appropriate lighting.

The building has three performance spaces: a large space where the 96-member band can actually march inside; a medium-size classroom for mid-sized ensemble practice and performance; and a smaller room for trios and a single pianist.

The whole building has special HVAC units that keep an ambient temperature and humidity at the levels that instruments need. All ceilings, floor and walls were acoustically treated since it's not just a practice space but a performance space. Even the lighting is special. Months were spent selecting floor and ceiling tiles and even special duct work so sound doesn't carry outside each space. [See complete article.](#)



Cognia Certification



In October, Saint Paul's academic program received an outstanding review and full accreditation by Cognia, the agency tasked by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) with evaluating and accrediting high schools in this region of the country.

In an effort to drive continued improvement of the Saint Paul's School STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) programs, the administration agreed to undergo a separate evaluation specifically focused in the areas of STEM. Few schools with STEM programs have achieved this prestigious certification.

In addition to collecting information about the school's STEM programs through numerous documents and forms, the evaluation process also included holding a series of interviews conducted by the Cognia team with Saint Paul's School stakeholders: students, teachers, administrators, parents, and community partners. Impressed with their findings, the Cognia team found it very difficult to identify an area of improvement and encouraged the school to continue the good work and celebrate the successes of the STEM programs. Full accreditation was granted.

In recognition of the efforts of the Saint Paul's STEM teachers, Mr. Watkins stated, "I am sure that our STEM faculty will receive this news as affirmation of their hard and innovative work and inspire them to even greater endeavors."

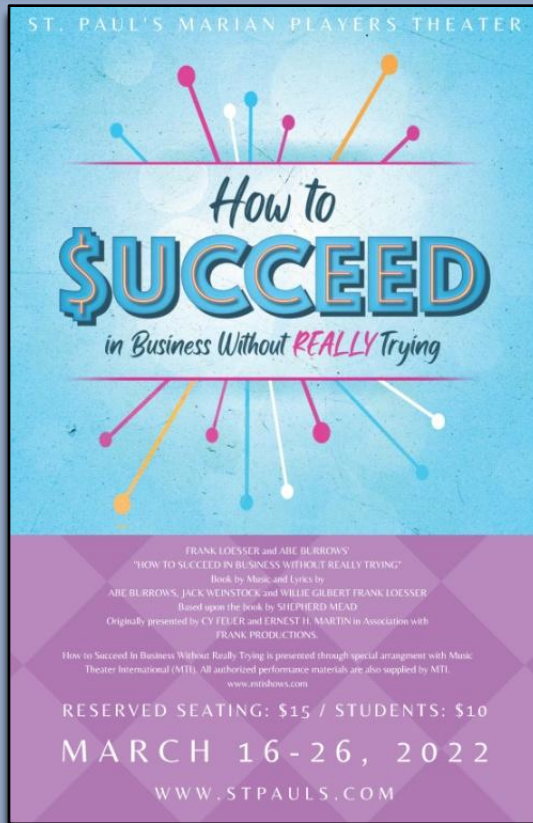


Habitat for Humanity Club

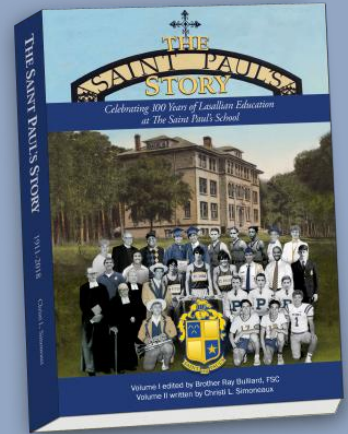
