I hope your three-day weekend is a pleasant one. Here's my annual Martin Luther King message:

In thinking about Dr. Martin Luther King, I annually remember one of his statements that has become a favorite of mine: If a man is called to be a street sweeper, he should sweep streets even as Michelangelo painted, or Beethoven composed or Shakespeare wrote. He should sweep streets so well that all the hosts of heaven and earth will pause to say, here lived a great street sweeper who did his job well.

Saint John Baptist de La Salle wrote a similar thought to the first Brothers -- and thus to us today. In his last *Meditation for the Time of Retreat*, Saint La Salle tells the brothers: *Oh! What glory there will be for those persons who have instructed youth, when their zeal and devotion to procure the salvation of children will be made public before all people!* All heaven will resound with thanksgiving! Act, then, in such a way by your good and wise guidance of those who are entrusted to you, that you will procure all these blessings and all this glory for yourself!



- TDIH: The Eighteenth Amendment, the Volstead Act, took effect on this date in 1920, a year after it was ratified, making manufacture, sale, and transportation of liquor illegal. The temperance movement had fought this fight for almost 80 years. Its activists wanted to protect families and communities from the horrors of alcohol abuse. They saw the 18th Amendment as a major victory for morality—but in reality, it made criminals out of a lot of ordinary American citizens, and made liquor even more desirable than it had been before. In the end, the Depression led to the demise of Prohibition. A wealthy Republican named Pauline Sabin led the repeal movement. She said that making liquor legal again would create jobs, weaken organized crime, and generate tax revenue. It took almost 14 years before the 21st Amendment reversed Prohibition. It's the first and only time an Amendment to the U.S. Constitution has been repealed.
- Today is the birthday of Benjamin Franklin, who was born in Boston in 1706. He was a printer, a scientist, an inventor, a writer, the founder of America's first lending library, and one of the Founding Fathers of America itself. He recalled in his *Autobiography* (1794) that writing well became "of great Use to me in the Course of my Life, and was a principal Means of my Advancement."
- **Kid Inventors Day:** We celebrate the youthful spirit of invention every year on January 17th,

• TDIH: In 1937, Brother Jaime Hilario was martyred by Spanish revolutionaries in the Spanish Civil War. From the Christian Brothers Website: Born in 1898 in northern Spain, Jaime was only 12 years old when, with the blessing of his parents, he entered the minor seminary. He soon developed hearing problems and was advised to return home. Convinced that God was calling him, he was overjoyed in 1917 to learn that the Institute of the Brothers would accept him. After sixteen years in various teaching assignments, his hearing problems forced him to abandon the classroom to work in the garden at one of the schools. In July of 1936 he was on his way to visit his family when the civil war broke out. Recognized as a Brother, he was arrested and jailed. In December he was transferred to Tarragona and confined in a prison ship with several other brothers. On 15 January 1937 he was given a summary trial. Though he could have been freed by claiming to be only a gardener, he insisted on his identity as a religious and thereby

sealed his doom. He was brought to the cemetery known as the Mount of Olives on 18 January to face execution. His last words to his assailants were "To die for

Christ, my young friends, is to live." When two volleys failed to meet their mark, the soldiers dropped their rifles and fled in panic. The commander, shouting a gross insult, fired five shots at close range and the victim fell at his feet. He was canonized in 1999 by Pope John Paul II.

Wade, it's most appropriate to remember the Church social teaching on the Life and Dignity of the Human Person. From the US Catholic Bishops Web Site: In a world warped by materialism and declining respect for human life, the Catholic Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. Our belief in the sanctity of human life and the inherent dignity of the human person is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching. In our society, human life is under direct attack from abortion and assisted suicide. The value of human life is being threatened by increasing use of the death penalty. The dignity of life is undermined when the creation of human life is reduced to the manufacture of a product, as in human cloning or proposals for genetic engineering to create "perfect" human beings. We believe that every person is precious, that people are more important than things, and that the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the life and dignity of the human person.
- TDIH II: On this day in 2013, Justin Dakota Addison, a wonderful Saint Paul's Junior, died from injuries sustained in a biking accident on Tammany Trace. Today we remember Justin and all the good he represented. We continue to miss him. We pray for his still grieving family and friends. AFTER SCHOOL: The Library remains open to students until 4 pm. If your son is looking for a comfortable place to wait for his ride and get a jump on his homework, this is a good option for him.

ANNUAL APPEAL: Many thanks to those who have responded. For clarity, I offer the following:

COGNIA STEM CERTIFICATION: Following the successful COGNIA accreditation of our academic



program in the fall, Joe and Trevor decided to seek COGNIA's unique and separate STEM certification – which evaluates our commitment to and implementation of science, technology, engineering, and math at SPS. Few schools earn this prestigious certification. After rigorous evaluation (and lots of paperwork and ZOOM meetings), COGNIA happily granted full accreditation in the areas of STEM. I am most grateful to Joe and Trevor for pursuing this additional layer of validity to our academic program! To quote the lead COGNIA evaluator, "We found it very difficult to find any area of improvement to recommend to your school." Their suggested "improvement list" included:


- 1. Continue to do what you are doing.
- 2. Continue to collect data on the results of your programs so that five years from now you will be ready for your next certification.
- 3. Consider including girls in some of your extracurricular STEM offerings (I am not yet ready for this one!)
 - 4. Celebrate your successes.

And so we will continue to celebrate! Again, SPS takes the lead! Your sons are getting an outstanding education! Spread the word!

COLD WEATHER CLOTHING: Only Saint Paul's outwear is permissible in cool/cold weather. If your son needs an SPS sweatshirt and money is tight right now, just have him come see me. This will be handled confidentially and appropriately. ONLY SPS cool weather clothing is allowed.

COMMITMENT DAY ON JAN 8: If you know of any prospective student considering SPS for 8th or 9th grade next year who missed testing on Jan 8, have them contact us. Due to a few COVID-related absences, we are offering a makeup test on Jan 22. This is not a commitment on anyone's part, but merely keeps the option open. Thanks for spreading the good word about SPS.

COVID: The Governor's address on Dec 30 concerning schools were followed up by recommendations from the Louisiana Department of Health and the Department of Catholic Education of the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Trevor Watkins sent a letter on Jan 2 explaining SPS's response to these recommendations. As of now, these are recommendations and not mandates, but we encourage all to comply, lest they become mandates. And we continue to pray as we see more students diagnosed with COVID and more quarantines.



DRIVING: I call the following to your attention:

- **Driver's License Requirement:** You need TWO of these: one when your son applies for his learner's permit and ANOTHER when he goes for his permanent license. Several parents have been turned away, not knowing they needed another form. Don't blame me! This is a legislative action.
- **SAFE DRIVING:** Parents –let's start 2022 with a resolution for safe driving! Set an example for the students! Students the neighbors are watching (and filming!) and we will take action! This applies at all times: after school, after practice, on weekends, at games, etc. Please obey the traffic laws: speed limit, no tailgating, no texting while driving, no cell phone use during school zone hours, buckle up, etc. Thank you!
- School Zone Cell Phone Ban: It is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone while driving. I see some students and parents driving in the morning and using a cell phone. This sets a bad example and is illegal. Please do not drive on campus during school zone hours while using a cell phone.

GRADES, EXAMS, & REPORT CARDS:

- Report Cards were mailed on Jan 5. Let me know if you did not receive a report card. There are no parent-teacher conferences until Feb, so email any concerns to teachers.
- **Semester Exams** DID NOT lower most student averages. The overwhelming number of students earned the same grade on exams that they had going into exams. There were a few exceptions on BOTH ends of the spectrum (students who did worse and students who did better.) **What the semester exams did** accomplish is give your son college preparatory experience.

- Many of our streets were laid out PRIOR to the invention of the automobile, thus not designed for cars?


