So weak was his condition and so intense the pain, that any such idea seemed out of the question. However, on the eve of the feast, he felt that pain was subsiding and his strength had returned. In the morning he was well enough to celebrate mass for the Brothers. They were overjoyed. But immediately thereafter, he relapsed. The end was near and that it was in honor of St. Joseph that he had celebrated Mass for the last time. De La Salle died less than a month later, on Apr 7th.




Drum Majors Walker and Zac present Krewe of Rex Best Marching Band trophy to Mr. Watkins.

ASSEMBLY ON MAR 09: I hope the students enjoyed last week's assembly. Here's some of what we did:

- Students entered the gym to the strains of Antonio Vivaldi's "Spring" from his famous "Four Seasons Suite." I explained that Vivaldi is a famous Baroque era Italian composer who lived from 1678 1741. I reminded them that Baroque music is dramatic and powerful and that Vivaldi musically interpreted the difference seasons with amazing precision. And why was I emphasizing the season of spring? In addition to signs of spring springing up all over, we are in the season of Lent and the word "lent" comes from an Old English word meaning "spring." It's a time for our relationship with God to "bloom" just like the spring flowers. It's a time for us to bask in the warmth of God's love, just like we bask in the warmth of spring following the cold of winter. And as the days lengthen, it's a time for us to lengthen our commitment to "put off the things of night" and walk in the daylight. While the music played, junior Collin Simon lit the prayer candle now purple for Lent.





COGNIA STEM CERTIFICATION: Following the successful COGNIA accreditation of our entire academic program in the fall, Joe and Trevor decided to seek COGNIA's unique and separate STEM certification – which evaluates our commitment to and implementation of science, technology, engineering, and math at SPS. Few schools earn this prestigious certification. After rigorous evaluation (and lots of paperwork and ZOOM meetings), COGNIA happily granted full accreditation in the areas of STEM. I am most grateful to Joe and Trevor for pursuing this additional layer of validity to our academic program! To quote the lead COGNIA evaluator, "We found it very difficult to find any area of improvement to recommend to your school." Their suggested "improvement list" included:

- 1. Continue to do what you are doing.
- 2. Continue to collect data on the results of your programs so that five years from now you will be ready for your next certification.
- 3. Consider including girls in some of your extracurricular STEM offerings (I am not yet ready for this!)
 - 4. Celebrate your successes.
