

Sat, Aug 13 – Feast of Saint Brother Benilde, FSC

•Today we celebrate the feast of Saint Brother Benilde (1805-1862) -- the very person after whom Benilde Hall is named. His story should inspire us all. Doing the common things in an uncommon way led to Benilde's sainthood. This was our theme four years ago, and I don't want us to forget it. When you pass Benilde Hall, ask this wonderful Christian Brother saint to assist you in doing the common things in an uncommonly good way! But what else do you really know about St. Benilde? We ask him in prayer several times a day to help us to do ordinary things extraordinarily well. But, what do you really know about him?

•Did you know he was born a hunchback and unable to straighten out his right leg?

•Did you know that he was bullied in school because of his appearance?

•DYK that that once the boys in found out how intelligent he was they called on him to help with their studies?

•DYK that he was only 4'9" tall?

- DYK that in his early 30's he was already school principal?
- DYK that he inspired over 200 men to become Brothers?
- DYK he learned sign language to help deaf students?
- DYK he buried the dead, fed the hungry, visited the sick, and conducted adult night classes ?

The many things St. Benilde did for the young to give them a human and Christian education seem quite extraordinary, but he had a very humble beginning. Although he was quite intelligent, initially the Brothers did not allow him to teach because of his appearance. For two years, following the Novitiate, he served in the community of Aurillac as a domestic Brother. He was given the assignment of cleaning the house, taking care of the vegetable garden, doing dishes and preparing meals. He did all of these very ordinary things very well. Eventually, he was allowed to teach and in a very short time he became a great leader and good example to all the Brothers. He was a man of extraordinary

charity. He died at only 57, his reputation for holiness spread rapidly and he was the first teaching Brother canonized in 1967.



I draw the following to your attention (in alphabetical order, not order of importance):

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: Help your son develop proper attitudes and habits for success. Show confidence in his ability; work with him to set realistic academic goals. Help him develop an orderly study environment. Teens enjoy chaos, so the trick is to help your son create enough order in his chaos for proper study to occur. Designate a place and time to study. **Require 1-2 hours of study per night. Do not accept the ''I have no homework''** excuse. He always has homework -- review, study, and advanced preparation. At the end of his study session, have him organize books, assignments, PE clothes, etc. for the next day. **Students who do not have their homework in class are sent to assignment hall.**

ATTENDANCE: Please follow all SPS attendance regulations in the Student-Parent Handbook and make Mrs. Suzy's job as easy as possible. Thank you for your cooperation. The State of Louisiana limits the number of days a student may miss and still receive credit. Saint Paul's adheres to these regulations. **Please do not allow your sons to miss school for less than very serious reasons.**

BOOK STORE: The Mothers' Club Bookstore will be open 7:30 am to 8:15 am & 11:00 am to 12:30 pm each school day. **PLEASE patronize the MC's Bookstore when possible.** Proceeds not only help fund wonderful activities throughout the year, but the proceeds also help with campus needs.

CAFETERIA:

- SPS participates in the federal school lunch/breakfast program managed by the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Saint Paul's does not directly manage the food service program; we follow the directives of the Archdiocese and the cafeteria workers are employed by the Archdiocese, not Saint Paul's.
- Breakfast and lunch are no longer free. Breakfast will be \$2.75 and lunch \$3.75. Plus, if a student wants "seconds", he must pay for the additional lunch along with any "extras".
- Students may not "order out", e.g., pizza, or have lunches delivered. WE CANNOT DELIVER LUNCHES TO STUDENTS. Please do not ask us to do so.
- Students participating in the cafeteria program must have money in their accounts. You can do this on line at https://schoolcafe.org/
- Students MUST use their ID cards for check out in the cafeteria. A temporary ID was issued them on their first day of school.

In case of emergency closings, make-up days will be taken from scheduled holidays. Do not schedule vacations during school. Thank you for recognizing the need to make the most use of our academic time.

Note that public schools schedule 175 instructional days while Catholic schools schedule 177.

In case of closings, we will make up days from holidays. School begins with all students on Thu, Aug 4th for a full instructional day (8 - 3). Also, check the calendar for vacation dates and do not schedule vacations in conflict with school. Thank you for recognizing the need to make the most use of our academic time.

CAR LINES: There is no absolute designated drop off spot. Be patient the first few days of school as traffic patterns form. Safety is paramount, so if you use Founder's Circle as a departure point, **cars must drop off students in Founders Circle in the LEFT lane onl**y – do not block traffic in the right lane to discharge the occupants. Dropping off at La Salle Hall or by the BAC is OK. Traffic will be heavy heading into Covington as schools open. In the afternoons, it is OK to come a few minutes after 3, which allows the line to dwindle. Your son is safe, waiting in Founders' Circle.

CELL PHONES:

- State Law: Motorists are prohibited from using any type of hand-held wireless communications device while traveling through school zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked. Upon first violation of the school zone ban the fine is \$175, subsequent violations can be up to \$500, and if a crash occurs during the time of the violation, fines can be increased.
- School Cell Phone Policy: students may use their phones only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during the lunch hour NOT during CLASSTIME. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi-fi, he can use his phone to access the internet if needed. And, yes, our security firewalls are in effect.

CROSS COUNTRY: Attention all students--If you are interested in joining the Cross Country Team, there will be a brief meeting during the first half of lunch on Tuesday 8/9 in front of the Alumni Office behind Benilde Hall.

DANCES: The following dances are scheduled for the first semester:

- On **Friday**, **August 12**, SSA and SPS will hold Back to School dances for their students. Admission is \$10 per person, paid in cash at the door. Students must show a SPS or SSA ID for admission and will be breathalyzed.
- At SSA Gym: 8th grade Social 6:30; 9th graders arrive at 7; dance lasts until 9PM.
- The dance for the **10th,11th, and 12th graders** will take place in the **Briggs Assembly Center** on St. Paul's campus from **7-9 PM;** All students must arrive no later than 7:30 PM and must remain until 9:00
- Please dress for the theme: **Hop on the Magic Dove Bus (Fieldtrip!)**. Students may wear shorts, jeans, or pants along with each class's corresponding theme costume.
 - o 12th: circus: traditional toga (wear shorts underneath)
 - 11th: planetarium: NASA, aliens, black out (all black clothing)
 - o 10th: aquarium: mermaids, sailors, fishing, all things PFG
 - o 9th: insectarium: antennae and wings, butterfly, tropical, Hawaiian shirts
 - o 8th: zoo: safari, animal prints, jerseys
- The Junior High (grades 8 & 9) Homecoming Dance will be Saturday, September 24.
- The Senior High (grades 10 12) Homecoming Dance will be Saturday, October 01.

DRESS CODE: Thanks for your assistance in making sure your sons are in compliance with our dress and grooming regulations. Several students were denied picture taking due to non-compliance. Soon, disciplinary action will be taken. Contrary to the belief by some, most of these are NOT new regulations. As I wrote in July, WE INTEND TO INCREASE OUR ENFORCEMENT OF THE DRESS CODE THIS YEAR – particularly with grooming and SHORTS. Refer to previous newsletters or the student handbook on our website for particulars if you are still unsure. **Note: We have a number of clean, preowned SPS uniform shirts and shorts in good condition. If the family budget is tight, feel free to ask for some of these clothes. Nothing is done to embarrass a student and no one will know. Thanks to those families who supply us with their outgrown uniforms.**

DRIVER'S LICENSE PROOF OF ATTENDANCE: Your son needs proof of attendance in order to get a learner's permit **and another one** when he gets his permanent license. The forms are in the counseling department or the administration building. This is a legislative act; don't blame me!

DRIVING POLICY: The driving habits of some students (speeding, horn blowing; engine revving, tire screeching, etc.) cause grief for the neighbors. I have spoken at length with neighbors and with Cov PD. As our handbook states, driving and parking on our campus is a privilege, not a right. Thus:

- Covington Police will increase their presence and issue tickets;
- Neighbors have been instructed to take pictures or get license plates of speeding or unsafe drivers;
- SPS has increased the number of faculty street supervisors after school;
- SPS has a series of monetary fines (beginning at \$50 for a first offense) against students shown to be violating traffic laws around school;
- SPS reserves the right to revoke the driving to school privilege which we have done in the past.
- And remember: it's against LA law to use a cell phone (except hands free) during school zone times. Don't drop your son off using a cell phone it's against the law and sets a bad example.
- Parents of students who drive to school please practice safe driving with your sons.

EMAIL ADDRESSES: An SPS email address is issued to all students. The format is Firstname.Lastname.gradyr@stpauls.com, e.g., John.Smith.2023@stpauls.com. This will allow us to better communicate with students. The student may keep this email forever, thus allowing us to continue contact with him as an alumnus. Naturally, we will delete the email upon graduation at the student's request. Your son's email will be printed on the schedule that you receive. **Since 95% of our communication with you is via email, please let us know if you change your email address.** And check your spam filter as sometimes our emails end up there.

ENROLLMENT: We open this year with a very healthy enrollment. I am humbled and proud that so many parents are willing to entrust their sons to us and make the sacrifices necessary to do so. **Please stress with your son that he is being given a gift – a gift that others want. He must use this gift wisely and make good choices.**

EXTRACURRICULARS: New parents often ask how their sons find out about our extracurricular program. Shortly after school opens, we will introduce students to our offerings.

HANDBOOK SIGNATURE CARD: The signed cards are now overdue! Students who have not turned in the card will soon receive detention.

ID CARDS: Students must wear their ID cards on a lanyard every day. No one has to pay for an ID card unless you want an extra one. We gave one to your son on picture day. You will have to pay for a replacement if he loses the one we give him or if for some reason you want an extra one.

PE UNIFORMS: We now return to our pre-Covid policy: students in PE must wear PE uniforms, available at the bookstore.

PHYSICALS: No student may participate in our athletic program or our band program without the necessary paperwork having been completed, including an LHSAA official physical form.

SAFE ENVIRONMENT: all individuals planning to volunteer with St. Paul's must complete safe environment training as mandated by Archdiocese.

SENIOR PARENTS: Note the following upcoming senior events in Senior Week, Aug 15 - 19.

- Senior Class BBQ, Tue, Aug 16, 5 7 pm. Appropriate casual attire. This is for seniors only.
- March through the Arch, Thu, Aug 18, at 8 a.m. Senior parents are invited to attend this traditional "rite of passage" ceremony for our seniors. SPS dress uniform required of seniors.
- Senior-Parent Continental Breakfast following the March. The breakfast will be in the cafeteria and "al fresco" (from the Italian meaning "in the fresh" -- in this case, fresh air! We will have some outdoor seating.) Following breakfast, seniors will participate in Senior Unity Day, followed by complimentary lunch and then Ring Ceremony practice. I will dismiss them following practice usually around 2 pm (or earlier if they cooperate!) Seniors may remain in dress uniform or change to regular school uniform after the breakfast.
- Senior Ring Ceremony at 6:30 pm in the Briggs Assembly Center. Senior parents are encouraged to attend this traditional ceremony, a highlight of the senior year. ALL seniors are required to attend the ceremony whether they are receiving a ring or not. And, yes, family rings can be used. Seniors' dress for the ceremony is ANY dress shirt, tie, slacks, shoes and socks. Note: There is NO school-sponsored "senior party" following the ring ceremony. We urge parents to investigate if their son says he is going to such an event. And, naturally, seniors are minors in the eyes of the law and, therefore, alcohol at any post-ring ceremony event is inappropriate and illegal. While we don't limit attendees, more than 4-5 guests per seniors will cause people to stand!
- Fri, Aug 19, is the Senior Ring Holiday. Seniors do not need to come to school.



SCHOOL MASS THIS WED: Our first all-school mass is this Wednesday at 9:30 in the new gym. Students must wear their DRESS Uniforms. We will commission our senior Eucharistic Ministers; their parents have been invited. We can also accommodate a number of other parents who wish to join us. Just email me and we will have a parent section.

SCHOOL SAFETY: School safety remains paramount for all. Promote safety with your son. In our meetings, faculty reviewed all safety procedures that we have – and they are many. Safety is EVERYONE'S JOB. Report ANY rumor or safety threat. Encourage your sons to report, too. All visitors to campus must sign in and receive a Visitor's Pass. You may not just wander the campus. Thanks for understanding this procedure. Our prayers rise to heaven for a safe school year and the elimination of violence of all kinds in our schools – and in all of society.

SILENT SUSTAINED READING: On Thursday, we

began daily SSR (Sustained Silent Reading) during the first 15 minutes of Block 2. During this time, everyone in the school (students, teachers, administrators, and staff) will read silently for 15 minutes. This is not a time for homework, tutoring, studying textbooks or doing assigned reading, but is designed to make reading a school-wide priority by reading for pleasure. We hope to develop a population of self-motivated readers. The program was created over 30 years ago at the University of Vermont and over the years has resulted in increased vocabulary development, reading fluency and comprehension, writing quality, improved standardized test scores, increased background knowledge on a wide range of topics, and increased reading time out of school. Students were instructed to bring their own reading material but we will have classrooms stocked with magazines, novels, short stories, etc. **Help your son prepare for this initiative and have him come prepared every day for SSR.** He should bring a PRINTED READING MATERIAL – not electronic material **You might want to consider initiating a family SSR time, too!** I'll keep you posted as to how things go.

People can use 988 if they are having thoughts of suicide, mental health or substance use crises, or any other kind of emotional distress. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support.

TRAFFIC FLOW ON CAMPUS: If you drop off or pick up your son, you will meet road congestion around our campus. We ask your help in improving the traffic flow and safety:


- Consider an alternate pick-up location for your son other than Founder's Circle. These include the drop off area by the Gene Bennett Sports Complex, the parking lot on the corner of 13th and Jefferson St. or the parking lot at LaSalle Hall on 11th Avenue. You can drive through these parking lots or wait in a parking space there without holding up traffic elsewhere.
- DO NOT pick up your son using the shoulder of 11th Avenue. This is a dangerous area with poor visibility and further backs up traffic when you stop to load or unload.

- If you use the LaSalle Drive (main entrance) car line, please wait to the left so that thru traffic can still move through our campus using the right lane.
- Coordinate with your son about where and when you will meet him in the afternoon. If he is not present when you drive through, please proceed to a parking lot and wait for him there. If you stop in the car line to wait, you are holding up all cars behind you.
- Remind your son to be on the lookout for your car as you drive up.

Our primary concern is safety, so please adhere to all speed limit and traffic rules in the school area. We are working closely with the Covington Police Department to find solutions to traffic around school. Working together, we can improve both safety and circulation around our campus.


