
Welcome to the second week of the second quarter! Time marches on; all we can do is make the most of it.

As we begin the second quarter, and re-commit ourselves to the Lasallian Mission, I offered the following words of St. John Baptist de La Salle to our faculty this week and encouraged them to use these words of to inspire their work. I offer them to you, too, with slight adaptation, as you, as parent, are the primary teacher of your children:

- It is God who has called you to [parenting];
- Every day God calls you to the needs these children have;
 - It is God's own work that he entrusts to you;
- Your presence among your children brings salvation to them;
- Be satisfied with what you can do, since God is satisfied with it, but do not spare yourself in what you can do with grace; and believe that, if you want it, you can do more with God's grace than you think.
- In you, and through your parental ministry, these children encounter God, who knows each of them by name, who loves them, and who goes out searching endlessly for those who have gone astray.

He spent most of his career thinking and writing about education. He said that schools were useless unless they taught students how to live as members of a community; that they wouldn't succeed in teaching children anything unless they were receptive to what children were ready to learn; and that they wouldn't get anywhere unless they treated children as individuals. He once gave a speech at Michigan in which he said there was so much knowledge at universities because the freshmen brought everything they knew to college with them, and the seniors never took anything away.

Sun, Oct 23 – Even though it is a Sunday, the Lasallian world celebrates today the memorial feast of Blessed Brother Arnold Reche, a Christian Brother (1838-1890) who was beatified by Pope John Paul II. From the Brothers' web site: Arnold was born into a poor family and left school early to work as a stable boy, coachman, and for local construction. He met the Brothers while attending evening classes at their school and joined. He taught for 14 years at a boarding school in Reims. Despite a full teaching schedule, he privately studied math, theology, science & agriculture. During Franco-Prussian War of 1870, he cared for medical & spiritual needs of the wounded on both sides; he was awarded the Bronze Cross. His work won the hearts of his students by his care for their spiritual and professional development. He died at 52 with a reputation for sanctity. Work and pray so that people will say the same about our reputations! Blessed Brother Arnold— watch over and inspire us!


Rise Up, O Men of God

ACT – SAD NEWS: From various news sources last week: Scores on the ACT college admissions test by Class of 2022 hit their lowest point in more than 30 years — the latest evidence of the enormity of learning disruption during the pandemic: an average ACT composite score was 19.8 out of 36, marking the first time since 1991 that the average national score was below 20.

Louisiana's composite score on a test of college readiness called the ACT fell for the fifth consecutive year. The score is 18.1 for the Class of 2022, down from 18.4 for Class of 2021. The results mean that Louisiana students fared better than those in only four other states: AL, MS, NV and OK.


ASSEMBLY ON OCT 11: I hope the students enjoyed our assembly last week. Here's some of what we did:

- Students entered the new gym to the strains of "Hail Holy Queen Enthroned Above", from a CD made several years ago by the Mary Queen of Peace Music Ministry. I explained that the Catholic Church dedicates October to Mary and that this song is one of the oldest and most beloved of Marian hymns. I further explained that October is the month of the Rosary and that once again, the Simpson Family, in memory of our beloved teacher and alum Robert, donated hundreds of rosaries for the students as they do each year. I encouraged the students to get one of these rosaries from their religion teachers, keep it in their pockets, and pray the rosary whenever they have the time. They don't need to say the whole thing if they don't have time, but just a decade or even one Hail Mary as they wait at a traffic signal or walk from building to building. As junior **Joey Mire** lit the prayer candle, we prayed....
- Welcomed our special guests: 32 shadow day students; a large group of their parents; and about 30 alumni who were on campus for a meeting.

- Reminded all that our Mission Statement calls us to offer strong academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs in a safe and disciplined environment and to live the Gospel values of Jesus.
- Reminded students that their first quarter report cards would be emailed that week. I informed that that quarter grades do not go on their transcripts only semester grades do, so if they have a low grade, there is still time to raise it. I projected the following policy on the screen:
 - Semester grades are derived by the following formula:
 First Quarter Grade = 40% of semester grade
 Second Quarter Grade = 40% of semester grade
 Semester Exam = 20% of semester grade
- Recognized and congratulated the Student Council for an excellent Homecoming Week. I project a bunch of slides from the week, reminding all of the good time we had and stressing the work that STUCO did. I projected a number of slides of the event, showing grandparents happy to be spending time with their grandsons. Gave special recognition to **Evan Leaber and Drew Bode** for their wonderful reflections about the grandparents!
- Recognized and congratulated the ten students who represented SPS at the Young Lasallian Assembly in California over the summer. Almost 200 students from Lasallian schools participated. Our guys



represented SPS in an exemplary manner. I projected slides of the event and two participants, Peter Verges and Sam Gold, gave short reflections on what they gained from the experience. 



BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH: As an all-boys school, we must not overlook the teachable moments concerning issues pertaining primarily to women, and our boys need to know about this insidious disease, which can strike their grandmothers, mothers, sisters, and future wives and daughters. And we have current parents and friends battling this disease. I encourage enlightened, appropriate discussion of this important health issue with our students when possible. We reach out in prayerful support to any family struggling with this issue. I invite you to pray the following:

May they be moved to act with justice and compassion and find the courage to overcome fear and hatred!

O God, Source of Life, guide them and bless us all!

CAR LINES: There is no absolute designated drop off spot. Safety is paramount, so if you use Founder's Circle as a departure point, **cars must drop off students in Founders Circle in the LEFT lane onl**y – you may not block traffic in the right lane to discharge the occupants. Dropping off at La Salle Hall or by the BAC is OK. Traffic will be heavy heading into Covington this week as schools open. Please plan accordingly.

CELL PHONES:

- State Law: Motorists are prohibited from using a hand-held wireless communications device while traveling through school zones during posted hours. The law includes use of a cellular/wireless device for engaging in a voice call, accessing, reading, or posting to a social networking site, and/or writing, sending, or reading a text-based communication. The school zone cell phone ban does not apply if the device is being used to report an emergency, is being used in a hands-free manner, or while the vehicle is lawfully parked.
- SPS Law: students may use their phones during lunch but only outside. If you need to call or text your son, do so during lunch. Disciplinary action and fines will continue for violation of this policy. With our campus wide wi- fi, he can use his phone to surf the internet if needed. And, yes, our security firewalls are in effect.

DRESS CODE: Students must comply with the dress code. "Note: We have clean, pre-owned uniform shirts in good condition. If the family budget is tight, ask for some of these clothes. Nothing is done to embarrass a student; no one will know. Thanks to those who supply us with their outgrown uniforms.

DRIVER'S LICENSE PROOF OF ATTENDANCE: Your son needs proof of attendance in order to get a learner's permit **and another one** when he gets his permanent license. The forms are in the counseling department or the administration building. I feel terrible when a parent waits two hours at the DMV only to be turned away b/c the son doesn't have his proof of attendance. This is a legislative act; don't blame me!

DRUG TESTING: Please speak with your son. We have resumed drug testing. We had suspended testing due to COVID but are comfortable in resuming the tests. We use a Random Plus approach: some students will be chosen randomly and some for "cause" (e.g. drop in grades, behavioral problems, etc.) If a student tests positive, he is allowed 100 days before a re-test is given. A second positive results may well jeopardize his enrollment at SPS. We pray that our program serves as a deterrent and is not viewed as punitive. We remain convinced that drug usage is detrimental to adolescent development. BTW, legit medication (for ADD, etc.) is screened by the test. Your son will not be embarrassed in any way if he is selected to be testing. **Results are confidential to counselor and administrators.** And, yes, you may refer your son to us for testing. We pray....

EMERGENCY CLOSINGS: With a number of systems churning in the Atlantic, allow me to comment on emergency or weather-related closings. Ordinarily, our procedure is to follow the civil parish. Thus, Saint Paul's School would follow the same decision of closure as the public-school system of St. Tammany Parish. The announcement concerning emergency closures would be broadcast on local television stations in the metropolitan area of NO when possible. School messaging will be activated with updated information and situations unique to SPS. For multi-day closings, Saint Paul's reserves the right to re-open when our situation warrants. In the meantime, we pray: **Our Lady of Prompt Succor! Hasten to help us!**

FOOTBALL GAME CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS:

- SPS students are admitted free but MUST enter through the South Gate (by Brothers' Residence). Only CURRENT SPS students are allowed in free by showing THIS YEAR's ID card. Do NOT try to come in with a friend who may have gone to Saint Paul's in the past and expect that person to get in free.
- SSA students do not get in free.
- We expect students (and adults) to remain fully clothed during the game. Fans with no shirts, even with body paint will not be allowed into the stadium. Students must not wear any offensive clothing, including clothes which advertise alcohol or have obscene words written on them.
- Once students enter the game, they must stay through halftime. They may not leave and reenter for any reason -- to go back to their car, etc. We expect all students to remain until the 3^{rd} quarter and then, if they leave, they must leave campus.
- During the national anthem and the prayer, ALL are to be ABSOLUTELY QUIET. Students should stand respectfully and remove hats.
- When a student does leave, he MAY NOT REMAIN AND LOITER ON CAMPUS (e.g. under the Wolf Dome, around the pond.) He must leave campus if he leaves the game.
- Students should only cheer in positive ways. They are there to support the Wolves, not tear down the opponents. Obscene language is NEVER permitted.
- We cannot be responsible if your son tells you he is going to the game and ends up going somewhere else or leaves after the third quarter without telling you.
 - Ultimately, football is a game meant to teach positive values. I pray that we can unite around our successful program by showing class, respect, support, courtesy, and good sportsmanship.
 - The LHSAA has threatened fines and suspensions for schools that do not promote good sportsmanship.

FOOTBALL GAME CONDUCT FOR ADULTS (who we expect to set good example for the students):

- Alcoholic beverages are not permitted in the stadium or on campus. Tobacco usage is not permitted in the stadium or on campus.
- During national anthem and prayer, ALL are to be quiet. Feel free to politely ask students to be quiet. If they don't comply, please get their names and send them to me.
- Adults should never openly criticize coaches and especially players.
- Use appropriate language and never shout obscenities at anyone, including referees.

- Ultimately, football is a game meant to teach positive values. I pray that we unite around our successful program in the state by showing class, respect, support, courtesy, and good sportsmanship.
- Those who do not follow these rules may be subject to removal from the premise
- LHSAA has threatened fines and suspensions for schools that do not promote good sportsmanship.

The month-long observance encourages study, reflection, prayer, and action. PHYSICALS: No student may participate in our athletic program or our band program without the necessary paperwork having been completed, including an LHSAA official physical form.

REPORT CARDS, SEMESTER GRADES, & HONOR ROLL BREAKFASTS: We emailed a report card on Thu, Oct 14. Let me know if you don't receive it, but check your spam folder first. Remember that the first quarter accounts for 40% of the semester grade, with the second quarter accounting for 40% and the semester exam accounting for 20%. Remember that the only grade that really counts is the SEMESTER grade – that's the one that goes on transcripts and is used to calculate grade point average.

And HONOR ROLL BREAKFAST invitations for parents and students will be emailed soon. To earn honor roll, students must have no grade lower than a B. A C grade is allowed if it's an honors course. Dates for the level breakfasts are printed below in the Look Ahead calendar but here are the dates:

- Breakfasts last from 7:45 until 8:30. The student and his parents are invited.

SAFE ENVIRONMENT: all individuals planning to volunteer with St. Paul's must complete safe environment training as mandated by Archdiocese.

SCHOOL SAFETY: School safety remains paramount for all of us. Promote safety with your son. The media has reported as least four arrests of students in St. Tammany b/c of inappropriate threats. Sheriff Randy Smith: "We will continue to take threats like this very seriously. Parents, please talk to your children and explain the seriousness of making comments like this, even in a joking manner." Take every appropriate opportunity to do the same with your sons. Safety is our priority – and it is EVERYONE'S JOB. Report ANY rumor or threat to safety about which you hear. Encourage your sons to report, too. All visitors to campus must sign in and receive a Visitor's Pass. You may not just wander the campus. Thanks for understanding this procedure. Our prayers rise to heaven for a safe school year and the elimination of violence of all kinds in our schools – and in all of society.

SENIOR PARENTS: March through the Arch pictures are in! These are provided you at no charge, courtesy of Expressions Photography. I avoid giving them directly to the seniors as in the past, many never made it home and were discovered at bottom of book bags or back of cars. You may pick up the pic yourself in the Admin Building during business hours or give your son a note authorizing him to obtain the pic. BTW, they are GREAT and are a perfect memento of that memorable morning.

SILENT SUSTAINED READING: Daily, we do SSR (Silent Sustained Reading) during the first 15 minutes of Block 2. During this time, everyone reads silently for 15 minutes. This is not a time for homework, tutoring, studying or doing assigned reading, but is designed to make reading a school-wide priority by reading for pleasure. We hope to develop a population of self-motivated readers. The program was created over 30 years ago at the University of Vermont and has resulted in increased vocabulary development, reading fluency and comprehension, writing quality, improved test scores, increased knowledge on many topics, and increased reading out of school. Students must bring their own reading material but we will have classrooms stocked with magazines, novels, short stories, etc. Help your son prepare for this initiative and have him come prepared every day thereafter. He should bring a PRINTED READING MATERIAL – not electronic material Consider initiating a family SSR time, too! I'll keep you posted as to how things go.

SLOW YOUR ROLL. This week is the three-year anniversary of Mayor Mark Johnson's initiative to improve driving habits within Covington – one of his main campaign pledges. He sent out a reminder email this week, urging compliance. Did you know:

- Two of the most often repeated complaints to the candidates in last year's election were speeding and the running of stop signs? And SPS students/parents came in for their fair share of blame!
- On any given weekday, over 15,000 people drive into and out of Covington?
- Many of our streets were laid out PRIOR to the invention of the automobile, thus not designed for cars?

Mayor Mark's goal is "to change driving habits in our city...to have each of us understand that speeds over 25 MPH are not safe on most of our streets." The Mayor is asking everyone to "relax, take a deep breath and slow down. I applaud the Mayor's initiative and pledged to him our support. Please reinforce this with your sons. And please set a good example yourself, as in the words of Saint La Salle: "Preach by example, and practice before the eyes of the young what you wish them to accept."



TEEN DRIVER SAFETY WEEK is THIS week. Every week, parents should have conversations with their teens about rules they need to follow to stay safe behind the wheel. These rules address the greatest dangers for teen drivers: alcohol, inconsistent or no seat belt use, distracted and drowsy driving, TEXTING, speeding, and number of passengers. **Some sobering stats:**

- Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens (15-18 years old) in the United States.
- In 2017, 2,247 people died in crashes involving a teen driver, of which 755 deaths were the teen driver.
- Parents can be the biggest influencers on teens' choices behind the wheel if they take the time to talk with their teens about some of the biggest driving risks.

THEATER: In case you are wondering about the renovation of the theater, which is nearing completion of Phase I, I offer the following:

- The theater sustained damage from Ida. The structural engineer theorized that a microburst hit the building and dislodged some of the support structures. Emergency, but temporary, repairs were made to allow us to use the building for the remainder of the school year.
- Upon further review, the engineer discovered additional needs that may or may not have been caused by the storm. The building was built in 1906, and at 116 years old, it's showing its age.
- During the summer of 2020, the Board of Trustees allocated money (along with the music hall) to do cosmetic work on the building. Due to supply chain issues of COVID, that work was never done. So, we "coupled" the structural repairs from Ida and old age with the cosmetic repairs that were previously authorized. Here is what has been done and will be done so far:
 - Roof: We are still negotiating with insurance about the roof. We want a new roof; they want a repair. Regardless of outcome, we will replace whole roof with additional insulation. The roofers are waiting for backlogged materials.
 - Masons have repaired storm damaged walls and pointed up old mortar joints where needed. They
 also closed off some windows in the backstage area that were no longer needed.
 - o Painters are working on the interior and exterior and are almost finished. The plumbers have replaced the damaged drainage pipes and moved the backstage sinks to a new location.
 - o Larry Jones (structural engineer) has found subfloor issues that need repair in the basement. We have a sub already doing that work.
 - o To top it all off, we had bats in the building again. We hope that we can properly seal the building to make it bat proof as the renovation progresses.
- We hope to have occupancy of the building by November, in time for the fall production of the Marian Players fall production, "And Then There Were None" by Agatha Christie.
- Roofing still need to be done as well as flooring and some under the stage shoring, but we can have occupancy of the building while this work is done.


