In the beginning of December 2022, Saint Paul's President Brother Ray Bulliard, FSC was diagnosed with cancer. Since that time, Bro. Ray has been on leave while undergoing treatment. Mr. Trevor Watkins, AFSC '79 has been acting as President of Saint Paul's in accordance with the succession plan previously established by Bro. Ray.

Bro. Ray Bulliard, FSC

Bro. Ray came to Saint Paul's in 1977 to become a guidance counselor and dorm prefect. He was appointed the seventeenth principal/president in the middle of the 1986-1987 school year. He has been the longest standing principal/president of Saint Paul's School since the school's establishment in 1911.

In early February of this year, Brother Nick Gonzalez, FSC, the Brother Visitor of the De La Salle Christian Brothers of the District of San Francisco New Orleans (SFNO), informed Saint Paul's Board of Trustees that he would like to withdraw Bro. Ray from his duties as President so that Bro. Ray could better focus on his health. Bro. Nick states, "It is impossible to overstate what Brother Ray has done for Saint Paul's and how important he has been to the school since the 1970's. After taking over leadership of Saint Paul's in 1987, he truly brought about a renaissance at the school. We look forward to the day when he will be able to return to serve the Saint Paul's community in another capacity."

The Board of Trustees with the help and assistance of the Office of Education of the De La Salle Institute, begins the process of initiating a focused search to identify a permanent replacement. 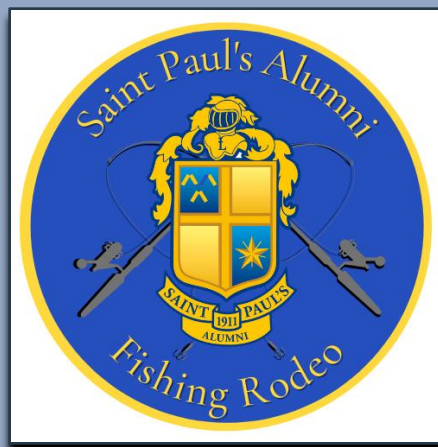

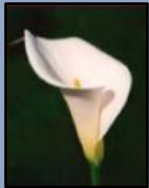

All seven of Saint Paul's National Merit Semifinalists have been named Finalists in the scholarship program and will advance in the competition for scholarship awards. Saint Paul's Finalists are Nicholas Achee, son of Bryan and Emily Achee of Covington; Keegan Burrell, son of Curt and Zarafet Burrell of Mandeville; Sam Gold, son of David and Tracy Gold of Covington; John 'Jack' Keller, son of John and Midge Keller of Mandeville; John Palmer, son of John and Tara Palmer of Mandeville; Sean 'Matthew' Roberts, son of Sean and Shelley Roberts of Covington; and Peter Verges, son of Louis and Amy Verges of Mandeville.

These academically talented high school seniors will continue in the competition for scholarships worth more than \$28 million. Beginning in March and continuing to mid-June, the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) notifies approximately 7,250 Finalists that they have been selected to receive one of three types of awards: National Merit® \$2,500 Scholarships, Corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards, and College-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards.

Over 1.5 million students entered the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program sponsored by the NMSC. Sixteen thousand were named Semifinalists and only 15,000 have met all requirements to advance to Finalist standing in the competition. The mission of the NMSC is to recognize and honor outstanding student scholars throughout the United States.

Respect for all Persons - Black History Month



Students at Saint Paul's School recently had a definitive history lesson on Black American contributions to celebrate Black History Month. Senior Cavin Taylor collaborated with media students to create a video series to present to the school community which focused on significant historical figures, such as Rosa Parks, B.B. King and Dr. Martin Luther King. Taylor highlighted the achievements of these icons and how they positively changed our culture with their dedication and hard work to present to the school community.

This is the third year Cavin Taylor is at the helm of the Black History Month event at Saint Paul's School. When asked what prompted this project, Taylor replied, "When I first stepped on Saint Paul's campus, I saw that there was much to do with clubs, sports, and many different events. But when February came around, there was one thing I didn't hear much about at school, Black History Month. I knew there had to be someone to step up and be willing to educate and celebrate this worthwhile message with the Saint Paul's community. Why not me? So I started a conversation about Black History Month when I was in 10th grade." Taylor did more than start a conversation, he embraced the teaching spirit at Saint Paul's School and created a history lesson for the entire school.

For the last three years, Taylor has worked closely with media teacher Josh Pereira '09 and media students to create a video series featuring fellow students and teachers sharing stories of Black American activists. Taylor is assuredly creating his own legacy at Saint Paul's School as he incorporates two Lasallian Core Principles, *Inclusive Community* and *Respect for All Persons*, in his passion to educate and enlighten the school community. "I just knew I had to do my part, not just for me but for every future young Black man who will step onto Saint Paul's campus. I want those young men to feel at home when they attend Saint Paul's School. I want them to know and understand that they can achieve anything with hard work and dedication. I want them to know that they are seen. Most of all, I want them to understand that they are a part of a brotherhood that not only sees them but will also love, support, and protect them."

In 1976, U.S. President Gerald Ford officially declared February as Black History Month because it contains the birthdays of both abolitionist Frederick Douglass and President Abraham Lincoln and is intended to celebrate the achievements and history of African Americans in every area of endeavor in our country.

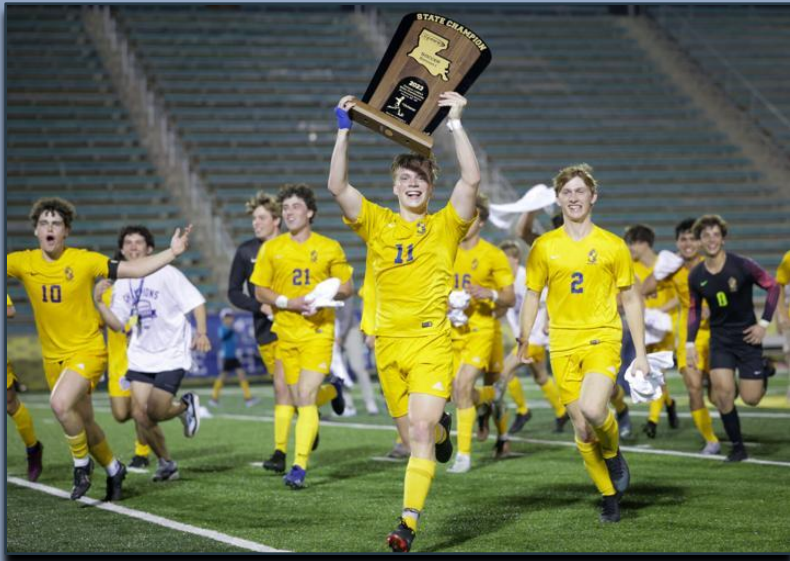
School Resource Officer

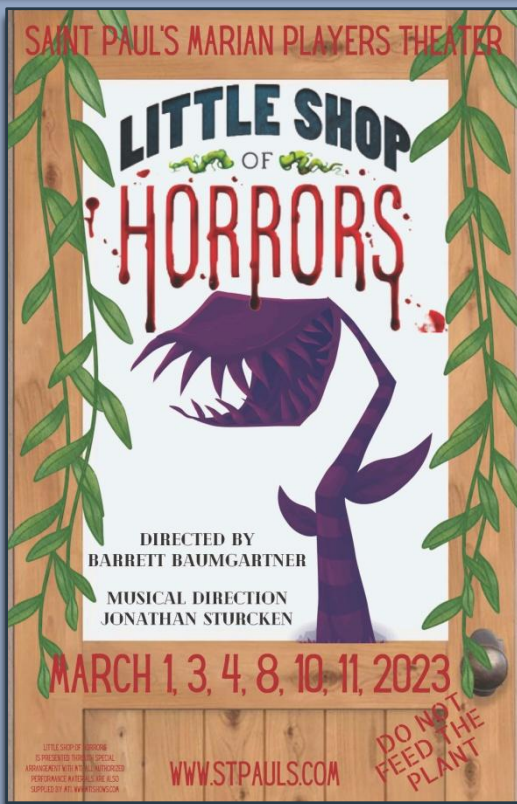
