This Day in History: And just in case you were missing the important events in history that occurred this week, Brother Javier has compiled the list. I've kept them separate for those of you who already knew these facts (not me) or who just wanted the school information for this week. If so, just skip past the list. Thanks Brother Javier.

April 17th

TDIH: The Canada Act took effect allowing Canada to become a fully sovereign state in 1982.

TDIH: In 2018, Barbara Bush, the wife of former President George H.W. Bush and mother of former President George W. Bush died at the age of 92.

TDIH: The hugely popular TV Show *Game of Thrones* debuted on HBO in 2011. It was based on George R.R. Martin's fantasy book series *A Song of Ice and Fire*.

TDIH: The Apollo 13 mission safely ended with the command module landing in the Pacific Ocean in 1970. An oxygen tank had exploded threatening the lives of the three astronauts on board.

TDIH: Cuban leader Fidel Castro's forces repel the Bay of Pigs invasion which was financed by the US Government in 1961. It is one of most well known debacles of the CIA.

TDIH: American printer, publisher, inventor, and diplomat Benjamin Franklin died on this day in 1790. He was 84 years old.

April 18th

TDIH: Paul Revere, a renowned Silversmith, makes his famous Midnight Ride in 1775 warning residents near Boston, MA that the British were coming.

TDIH: Abandoning her Hollywood career, American actress Grace Kelly married Rainier II, prince of Monaco.

TDIH: US Lieutenant Colonel James Doolittle led 16 B-25 bombers on a daring surprise attack of Tokyo a few months after Pearl Harbor in 1942. This event boosted Allied morale.

TDIH: The famous 1906 Earthquakes rocks San Francisco. There were 3,000 casualties.

TDIH: Pope Julius II laid the cornerstone of the new St. Peter's Basilica in 1506.

April 19th

TDIH: The American Revolution begins with the Battles of Lexington and Concord in 1775.

TDIH: German Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was elected Pope in 2005 succeeding Pope John Paul II who had died some two weeks earlier. Ratzinger took the name Benedict XVI.

TDIH: Considered the worst act of terrorism in US history up to that point, a truck bomb nearly destroyed the Federal Building in Oklahoma City killing 168 people in 1995.

TDIH: Charles Darwin, British naturalist, died on this day in 1882 at the age of 73.

April 20th

TDIH: Adolf Hitler, leader of the Nazi party and Fuhrer/Chancellor of Germany, was born on this day in 1889.

TDIH: Two disgruntled and heavily armed students entered Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado and murdered 13 people before killing themselves in 1999.

April 21st

TDIH: Elizabeth II was born on this day in 1926. This is her first birthday since passing away last October in 2022 at the age of 96.

TDIH: American naturalist John Muir was born on this day in 1838 in Scotland. He would be responsible for the establishment of both Yosemite and Sequoia National Parks.

TDIH: General Sam Houston led 800 Texans to victory over the Mexican forces commanded by General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna in the battle of San Jacinto in 1836. This ensured Texas independence from Mexico.

April 22nd

TDIH: Spanish author Miguel de Cervantes died on this day in 1616. He is the creator of *Don Quixote*, one of the most influential novels. It is sometimes referred to as the first novel.

TDIH: Richard Nixon who was the first US President to resign from office died in 1994.

TDIH: During World War I, German forces introduced chemical warfare in a systematized way releasing chlorine gas on a 4 mile front in 1915.


TDIH: J. Robert Oppenheimer who served as director of the Los Alamos Laboratory during the development of the first Atomic bombs was born in 1904.

TDIH: William Shakespeare, British author, died on this day in 1616. Some believe he might even have been born on this day in 1564. He is considered the greatest author of the English language.

TDIH: The first video was uploaded to YouTube by one of its co-founders in 2005. It was a video of his trip to the San Diego Zoo. YouTube now has close to 100 million uploaded videos.





PLTW: Did you know that St. Paul's uses the Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Gateway curriculum as our 8th Grade Science class? Units include Automation and Robotics, Science of Technology (where students learn about how science principles fit into technology, labs like oil spill, ice cream lab, making glue, and nanotechnology), Medical Detectives and Flight and Space. Mr. Orphys and Mrs. Beck each teach two units, one per quarter.

Beginning in the ninth grade our students can choose between three PLTW multi-year programs offered at St. Paul's. All three programs, Computer Science, Engineering, and Biomedical Sciences have been designated as Distinguished Programs by PLTW.

CAMPUS UDATE: Work is almost complete on the renovation of the 118-year-old Theater Building, the only remaining original structure on campus. Did you know that this building was originally a gym, built by then Dixon Academy? In those days basketball gymnasia did not have established dimensions or shapes. So, the Odeon, as it was then known, served as the first gym when Dixon Academy, purchased by the monks of St. Joseph Abby, became St. Paul's College in 1911. In 1914 St. Paul's defeated LSU in this building! The annex to the side, now a classroom, was originally an indoor pool. Brother Ray likes to say that "it was the PAC of its time".

When I was a student at St. Paul's the building was known as L5, meaning Large Classroom #5. It hosted lectures given by teachers to a whole level once a week when St. Paul's followed what was known as Modular Schedules. A whole generation of SPS graduates continue to call it by this name.

Current renovations to the building include substantial shoring work to the basement (yes, basement) and foundation, waterproofing the masonry, electrical and plumbing upgrades, a complete paint job, a new roof, added insulation for improved efficiency, and sealing openings to keep out bats. I hope the current renovations will help L5 last another 118 years!

ANNUAL APPEAL AND GRANDPARENTS: We are blessed with many supportive grandparents. Many schools solicit donations from grandparents directly. Again, I do it differently than other schools that directly solicit grandparents. I ask that you inform your son's grandparents or, if you want, I'll be happy to send them the information directly if you wish. Just provide me with the information. I do not want to ask grandparents without your consent but we need their support. I have already received a number of grandparent gifts. Again, no gift is too small – and, of course, no gift is too large.

DRIVING: I call the following to your attention:

Please watch for Paula and other fowl as you drive through campus!

- **Driver's License Requirement:** You need TWO of these: one when your son applies for his learner's permit and ANOTHER when he goes for his permanent license. Several parents have been turned away, not knowing they needed another form. Don't blame me! This is a legislative action.
- **Safe Driving:** Parents –let's set an example for the students! Students the neighbors are watching (and filming!) and we will take action! This applies at all times: after school, after practice, on weekends, at games, etc. Please obey the traffic laws: speed

limit, no tailgating, no texting while driving, no cell phone use during school zone hours, buckle up, etc. Thank you!

• School Zone Cell Phone Ban: It is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone while driving. I see some students and parents driving in the morning and using a cell phone. This sets a bad example – and is illegal. Please do not drive on campus during school zone hours while using a cell phone.

The Saint Paul's alumnus has garnered educational experiences that will help him move more seamlessly into adulthood. Because he understands that learning never ceases, he will continue to grow intellectually throughout his life.

The Saint Paul's alumnus understands service to his community and beyond. He willingly gives his time for the betterment of others, namely the marginalized. Furthermore, he champions social justice because he believes in the dignity of all persons.

The Saint Paul's alumnus advocates for equity and equality to encourage building a community that is unapplogetically inclusive.

The Saint Paul's alumnus looks at the world and its citizens through an unbiased lens. He is respectful of all persons and sees the unity that must exist in diversity.

The Saint Paul's alumnus has grown in his faith and models not only being a disciple of Christ but also a Lasallian who understands the neverending spiritual journey that he has just begun. He will always acknowledge and celebrate the Holy Presence of God.

All in all, the Saint Paul's alumnus is a Lasallian man of faith who embodies the Five Core Principles and continues to mature intellectually, spiritually, and morally beyond commencement and habitually exhibits integrity and dependability as he does the ordinary extraordinarily well.

THE LAST WORD:

We are not alone in this work as parents and teachers.

From the First Meditation for the Time of Retreat | Saint John Baptist de La Salle

"We cannot be instructed in the mysteries of our holy religion unless we have the good fortune to hear about them, and we cannot have this advantage unless someone preaches the word of God. For how can people believe in someone, the Apostle says, about whom they have not heard anyone speak, and how can they hear him spoken about if no one proclaims him to them?

This is what God does by diffusing the fragrance of his teaching throughout the whole world by human ministers. Just as he commanded light to shine out of darkness, so he kindles a light in the hearts of those destined to announce his word to children, so that they may be able to enlighten those children by unveiling for them the glory of God.

Because God in his mercy has given you such a ministry, do not falsify his word, but gain glory before him by unveiling his truth to those whom you are charged to instruct. Let this be your whole effort in the instructions you give them, looking upon yourselves as the ministers of God and the dispensers of his mysteries."

By these words De La Salle meant to animate and motivate the early Brothers in their work with their students. He reminded them that they were not just subject matter teachers. Rather, their work was much loftier. They were also to "enlighten those children by unveiling for them the glory of God".

As part of the Saint Paul's family we are all part of De La Salle's vision of the "someone who preaches the word of God". As members of the adult community in a Lasallian school we, teachers and parents, are expected to join in this cause. At times this effort is counter cultural and difficult. It can seem like we are swimming against the tide. But, you should know that we are not alone.

Saint Paul's is just one of over 1000 other educational ministries around the world in this noble work. Founded by St. John Baptist de La Salle in 17th century France, the Institute of the Brothers today consists of approximately 4,000 Brothers and 90,000 Partners who serve nearly 1,000,000 students and families located in 80 countries. The Brothers of the Christian Schools is the largest religious order of Brothers in the Church dedicated solely to the mission of Christian education.

Know that we are joined by millions of current and former members of the greater Lasallian family around the world who are "dispensers of His mysteries". I hope you take courage in your work as parents, as we do in our work as Lasallian teachers, knowing that you are not alone.
