**This Day in History:** And just in case you were missing the important events in history that occurred this week, Brother Javier has compiled the list. I've kept them separate for those of you who already knew these facts (not me) or who just wanted the school information for this week. If so, just skip past the list. Thanks Brother Javier.

#### April 24th

TDIH: Pope Benedict XVI officially assumes his rule as Pope and successor to Pope John Paul II after celebrating Mass in St. Peter's Square in 2005.

TDIH: In 1898 Spain declared war on the United States.

TDIH: US President John Adams approves funds for the founding of the Library of Congress in 1800 which eventually became the largest library in the world.

#### April 25th

TDIH: The Hubble Telescope, an optical observatory, was placed into orbit by the United States in 1990.

TDIH: In an attempt to save money, the water supply of Flint, Michigan was switched from the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department to the Flint River in 2014. This caused many people to be exposed to dangerously high levels of lead and a national crisis.

TDIH: In 1901, New York became the first state to mandate license plates on motor vehicles.

TDIH: Construction began on the Suez Canal in 1859. It lasted ten years and eventually connected the Red Sea and the Mediterranean Sea.

#### April 26th

TDIH: In 1986, a devastating explosion and fire at the nuclear power plant Chernobyl in Ukraine resulted in large amounts of radioactive material being released into the atmosphere.

TDIH: The Condor Legion of the German Air Force, supporting the Nationalists during the Spanish Civil War, bombed the city of Guernica in 1937. This event inspired the famous painting by the same name by Pablo Picaso.

TDIH: Hermann Goring formed the Gestapo in 1933 which was the political police of the Nazi Party and responsible for rounding up Jews.

TDIH: Two days after assassinating President Abraham Lincoln, John Wilkes Booth is killed at a farm in Virginia.

TDIH: John James Audubon, who became a famous ornithologist for his sketches of birds, was born in 1785 in Haiti. The park on St. Charles Ave in New Orleans is named after him.

TDIH: The first permanent English settlement is established in the New World in what is now known as Jamestown, Virginia.

#### April 27th

TDIH: Pope John Paul II is canonized a saint by Pope Francis in 2014.

TDIH: Ulysses S. Grant, who commanded the Union Forces late in the American Civil War, was born in 1822. He would go on to serve two terms as President from 1869-1877.

TDIH: Portuguese navigator Ferdinand Magellan who was attempting to circumnavigate the globe was killed when fighting erupted in the Philippines in 1521.

#### April 28th

TDIH: Benito Musolini, dictator of Italy during World War II, was captured when trying to flee Italy and killed in 1945.

TDIH: American author Harper Lee, who wrote *To Kill a Mockingbird*, was born on this day in 1926.

TDIH: Billy the Kid, American Outlaw, escaped from prison in Mesilla, New Mexico where he had been found guilty and sentenced to death in 1861. He was killed a few months later by Sheriff Pat Garrett.

TDIH: James Monroe, the fifth president of the United States, was born on this day in 1758. He is famous for his Monroe Doctrine which limited European intervention in the Americas.

#### April 29th

TDIH: In 2011 Prince William of Great Britain married his longtime girlfriend Catherine Middleton in a lavish ceremony broadcast to millions of viewers.

TDIH: Hirohito, who was emperor of Japan during World War II, was born on this day in 1901.

TDIH: The US Seventh Army liberated a Nazi Concentration Camp in Dachau, Germany in 1945.

#### April 30th

TDIH: George Washington the first President of the United States was inaugurated at Federal Hall in New York City in 1789.

TDIH: John Baptist de La Salle was born in Reims, France in 1651. He is the founder of the Brothers of the Christian Schools and is the Patron Saint of Teachers.

TDIH: The South Vietnamese capital Saigon was captured by the North Vietnamese troops during the Vietnam War in 1975. Its name was changed to Ho Chi Minh City.

TDIH: Adolf Hitler and his wife Eva Braun committed suicide in their German bunker as Allied forces closed in on Berlin in 1945.

TDIH: American Country Star Willie Nelson was born on this day in 1933.

TDIH: US President William McKinley signed an act making Hawaii an official US territory in 1900.

**LUNCH DROP-OFF** (there is no such thing): For the safety of everyone on campus we insist that you do not pull onto campus to drop off lunch for your son. This is against school policy. We do not allow ANYTHING at ANYTIME to be dropped off without checking into the office first. If your son forgets his lunch and needs to purchase a cafeteria meal, have him see me if he needs to borrow a few bucks for a meal.

**SPEAKING OF LUNCH**: Please note the following from the Archdiocesan School Food Service. They have asked us to:

- 1. Assist managers in making parents and faculty aware of the need to pay for meals in advance.
  - Support the School Food Service recommendation that no cash will be accepted for payment. Reasons 1.) no audit trail and 2.) safety of our employees with bank deposits.
  - Encourage parents to take advantage of our on-line payment option at www.schoolcafe.org.
  - Notify parents in the school newsletter or web page of the need to pay in advance.
  - Provide a prominent place (e.g. book days/orientation) for the cafeteria manager to collect funds.
  - Support the School Food Service recommendation of paying 10 or 20 days in advance (minimum of 10 days).
- 2. Encourage new students to apply for free or reduced price meals before school begins, but after July 15, 2023.
  - The 2023-2024 free/reduced meal application will be available online at www.schoolcafe.org.
  - Parents may call or email Donna David at (504)596-3452 or ddavid@schoolcafe.org if they have any questions.

Meal Payment Policy for the 2023-2024 School Year

- 1. School Food Service does not allow charging for school lunch, breakfast or extra sale items.
- 2. Food Service Managers are not required to serve paying students (paid or reduced) who have not paid for their meal.
- 3. If a principal requires that a meal be served to a student who does not have money, the principal will be responsible for payment to the cafeteria.

#### **CAMPUS UPDATE PART I - THEATER: (updated)**

Work is now complete on the renovation of the 118-year-old Theater Building, the only remaining original structure on campus. Did you know that this building was originally a gym, built by then Dixon Academy? In those days basketball gymnasia did not have established dimensions or shapes. So, the Odeon, as it was then known, served as the first gym when Dixon Academy, purchased by the monks of St. Joseph Abby, became St. Paul's College in 1911. In 1914 St. Paul's defeated LSU in this building! The annex to the side, now a classroom, was originally an indoor pool. Brother Ray likes to say that "it was the PAC of its time".

When I was a student at St. Paul's the building was known as L5, meaning Large Classroom #5. It hosted lectures given by teachers to a whole level once a week when St. Paul's followed what was known as Modular Schedules. A whole generation of SPS graduates continue to call it by this name.

Current renovations to the building include substantial shoring work to the basement (yes, basement) and foundation, waterproofing the masonry, electrical and plumbing upgrades, a complete paint job, a new roof, added insulation for improved efficiency, and sealing openings to keep out bats. I hope the current renovations will help L5 last another 118 years!

Finally, should funding become available, we would like to replace the current aging (and squeaky) audience seating.

CAMPUS UDATE PART II – TRACK AND FIELD: On Monday work will begin on the replacement of the existing track and field at Hunter Stadium. The field will receive its third carpet of artificial turf since this work was first completed in 2009. The track will be resurfaced as well. Several improvements and upgrades to the facility are part of the replacement plan. These include the addition of an impact pad below the surface of the grass and a new infill product called BrockFILL<sup>TM</sup>. This product is a highly engineered wood particle infill specifically designed to improve traction and reduce artificial turf heat. Gone will be the little rubber particles that end up in your wash cycles.

These two upgrades will significantly improve the safety and usability of the field, especially during the heat of summer. We will also add turf in the south D-zone, giving field users additional warm up and practice space. Also, and equally important to our PE and track athletes, the track will be completely replaced as well, bringing the entire facility a major facelift and extending the life of this much used facility.

Last, during a recent inspection we discovered major termite damage to the press box at Hunter Stadium. Work was just completed to make the structure safe for use again in the upcoming football season.

**DRIVING:** I call the following to your attention:

## Please watch for Paula and other fowl as you drive through campus!

- **Driver's License Requirement:** You need TWO of these: one when your son applies for his learner's permit and ANOTHER when he goes for his permanent license. Several parents have been turned away, not knowing they needed another form. Don't blame me! This is a legislative action.
- Safe Driving: Parents —let's set an example for the students! Students the neighbors are watching (and filming!) and we will take action! This applies at all times: after school, after practice, on weekends, at games, etc. Please obey the traffic laws: speed limit, no tailgating, no texting while driving, no cell phone use during school zone hours, buckle up, etc. Thank you!
- School Zone Cell Phone Ban: It is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone while driving. I see some students and parents driving in the morning and using a cell phone. This sets a bad example and is illegal. Please do not drive on campus during school zone hours while using a cell phone.

# Third Sunday of Easter

Intention: That we may be a people of life, speaking for the dignity and needs of all people, especially the poor, the oppressed, the exploited, the misunderstood, and the forgotten.

## Today's Gospel | Luke 24:13-35

Now that very day two of them were going to a village seven miles from Jerusalem called Emmaus, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred. And it happened that while they were conversing and debating, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him. He asked them, "What are you discussing as you walk along?" They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?" And he replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place. Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive. Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them what referred to him in all the scriptures. As they approached the village to which they were going, he gave the impression that he was going on farther. But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were

opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning [within us] while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?" So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Because the joy of the just is caused by God's love deep in their hearts and because this love is directed to a good that is inalterable, immutable, and eternal, it follows that the just cannot be disturbed in the possession of that delightful satisfaction as long as charity unites their souls to God.

Does your joy come from within? Or are you not sometimes self-absorbed by vain and entirely exterior joys?

Eternal Father, you sent your Son to be our light in the midst of darkness and our sustenance in the midst of want. Open our eyes to your saving presence, especially in times of frustration and confusion. May we grow in faith, always ready to trust in your presence and follow your call to build your Kingdom.
