Over the summer, you will read and respond to ONE of the following books:

- *The Old Man and the Sea* by Ernest Hemingway ("This short novel, already a modern classic, is the superbly told, tragic story of a Cuban fisherman in the Gulf Stream and the giant Marlin he kills and loses—specifically referred to in the citation accompanying the author's Nobel Prize for literature in 1954." 84 pages, ISBN: 978-0684801223)
- *The Alchemist* by Paulo Coelho ("Combining magic, mysticism, wisdom, and wonder into an inspiring tale of self-discovery... Paulo Coelho's masterpiece tells the mystical story of Santiago, an Andalusian shepherd boy who yearns to travel in search of a worldly treasure. His quest will lead him to riches far different—and far more satisfying—than he ever imagined. Santiago's journey teaches us about the essential wisdom of listening to our hearts, recognizing opportunity and learning to read the omens strewn along life's path, and, most importantly, following our dreams." 208 pages, ISBN: 978-0062315007)

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time by Mark Haddon ("Christopher John Francis

Additionally, make some predictions you may have about the book before you read based on the title and the cover of the book.

2. **JOURNAL ENTRIES**: Your book will be divided into five sections (listed below).

After reading each section, you will complete a journal assignment **about that specific section of the book**.

For each journal assignment, you will **choose ONE** of the prompts listed below to answer. For whichever prompt you choose for each section, you are required to do the following:

- type or copy/paste your chosen prompt onto your Doc
- respond to the whole prompt in a paragraph of at least 250 words
- include **QUOTED** evidence from the book and a **PARENTHETICAL CITATION** for the quote in every response

*NOTE: Your quoted evidence DOES NOT count toward your 250 words.

PROMPTS: Throughout the book, **you may only respond to each prompt** <u>once</u> (so you will be choosing a new prompt for each journal assignment).

- What is the most interesting thing you know about the protagonist/main "character" of your book? Explain why you find that thing so interesting.
- What is your opinion of the book? Explain.
- Think about a supporting character/person in the book. How would the book be different if that character/person were not in the book?
- Insert a table into your document with three rows and two columns (Insert→ Table). Choose three quotes from the section that you read. Type the quotes into the left column of the table. Then, write your analysis of the quotes you selected in the other. Your analysis can focus on the thoughts, comments, ideas, and understandings about the significance of those chosen parts of the text.
- What questions does this book raise for you? What issues are addressed AND ignored in the text?
- What connections can you make from the book to movies,/news events/other texts in your own life?
- Write about something from the text that intrigues, impresses, amuses, shocks, puzzles, disturbs, repulses, or aggravates you.

FINAL PROJECT: When we return from the break, you will choose from a list of assignments that will serve as your final assessment for the book.
