ARCHBISHOP AYMOND'S MESSAGE TO YOUNG PEOPLE OF THE ARCHDIOCESE: In the past, Archbishop Aymond issued the following letter at the end of the school year. While he didn't issue it again this year, it's worth reading again. I encourage our students to heed these words of the Archbishop:

- I pray in a special way for each of the young people in the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Know that you are important to all of our ministries, in parishes, schools and other programs.
- I am aware of the educational experience you have received in regard to the use of electronic media. You know very well how to use the tools and you know intellectually the consequences when social media is not used respectfully.
- I want to reach out to you at the moral level and beg you to remember that it isn't how much you know that is crucial, but rather, the respect that you show for God, yourself, and others when you communicate through cell phones, computers, and other technology.
- Always treat other people in a manner that shows your awareness of their reflecting the image of God. In all ways let your friends, classmates, and acquaintances know that they are respected. Speak out if you know someone is being abused or bullied. Share the information with a parent, priest, or teacher who can step in and help. The Archdiocese of New Orleans has the staff available to help you in abusive or bullying situations.
- One of your many responsibilities at this time is to make choices which will allow you the opportunity to make decisions about your future education or career choices. Choose wisely. Choose only those

opportunities and interactions which will give you a greater chance to achieve all of the goals you set for yourself and those which God has in store for you.

• If you need help, please let a member of the clergy, a Catholic School Administrator, a Director of Religious Education, or your youth minister know.

- Band is a GREAT way to become involved, become part of a wonderful SPS tradition, and have fun, too.


The Band boosters will be sending out a separate invitation to new students in the next few day. Be on the lookout for that mailing.

DID YOU KNOW?: Brother Charles Crouzet, a member of Saint Paul's founding community of Brothers in 1918, is memorialized in Founders Circle with the plaque pictured below. He was one of 19 French Brothers who had to leave France during the persecution of the Church at the turn of the last century. Fleeing France to Mexico, they were assigned the difficult task of opening schools for the rural poor there. The French Brothers had to learn Spanish and adapt to a new culture.

No sooner had their newly opened schools begun to flourish when they were again uprooted during the Mexican Revolution of 1917. Barely escaping with their lives from the notorious Pancho Villa, they were scattered throughout the United States in various religious communities who housed these refugee Brothers.

At some point their superior in exile became aware of a school, Saint Paul's College, for sale in Covington, Louisiana. Thinking that French was likely spoken in a town so close to New Orleans, they were reunited from all over the United States and assumed the ownership of the school from the Benedictine monks who had founded the school in 1911. Little did they know that this part of Louisiana was not welcoming of the French, much less in a school that had been run by much admired Benedictine Monks of German descent.



Once again, they had to quickly learn a new language and a new culture, all while trying to establish themselves in a skeptical community. World War II was raging and the New Orleans area was suffering a yellow fever

epidemic when the Brothers reopened the school in 1918. Within days of opening, most students left and went home, upset at the change from the respected Benedictines to this unknown group of Frenchmen.

But Brother Charles and his confreres did not give up. Believing that His work must be done here, they set out to convince families to give them a chance and send their sons back to school. Within a short few months the local community began to accept the Brothers. From these very inauspicious beginnings, the founding Brothers would lay the foundation for what we know today as Saint Paul's School. If you are ever in the Founders Circle area of campus, please say a prayer of thanksgiving for the Benedictine Monks and Lasallian Brother Founders of Saint Paul's. We all owe them a great deal. I ask that in a special way you remember Brother Charles Crouzet who spent most of his teaching life here. In fact, he taught me typing (does anybody know what that is?) when I was a student here and he was well into his 80s!

BOOK STORE is now THE WOLF DEN: The Mothers' Club Bookstore has a new name, THE WOLF DEN. This name was chosen by students after a ballot initiative to rename the Bookstore. The many volunteers of the Mothers' Club will still be handling the purchasing of merchandise and all day to day operations.

The Wolf Den will be closed for the summer in order to prepare for the upcoming school year. The Wolf Den will reopen for Back to School Week on Friday, August 4 thru Tuesday, August 8 excluding Sunday, August 6.



DRESS CODE – **VERY IMPORTANT:** Due in part to the challenges of COVID the past two years, the boys became a bit lax in complying with our dress code, particularly in the areas of grooming and pants/shorts. As our first priority was keeping the school open (which we did) and providing quality education (which we also did), and as the boys were challenged with ever-changing safety protocols (which they were), we eased up a bit on enforcement of dress/grooming. That will change in August, as we envision a much more normal school year ahead.

As some of you begin your "back to school" shopping during the summer sales, **know that we will insist this** coming year on dress code compliance – especially concerning pants / shorts. We may even start sending repeat violators home (as done in other schools) if they are out of compliance with our dress code.

Accordingly, we ask that as you shop for school clothes this summer, you do so with our dress code in mind. In particular, we insist on compliance with the pants/shorts regulation as we will be vigilant in terms of enforcement, especially pants / shorts. Here is what the handbook says:

- o Cargo-style pants/shorts are not allowed.
- o No oversized or droopy pants/shorts are allowed.
- o Shorts must be conventional, British tan khaki (Catholic school khaki), walking style shorts.
- o Shorts may not extend below the knees.
- o No running shorts, PE shorts, or SWIM SUIT STYLE shorts allowed.
- o NO PFG or "FISHING" SHORTS ALLOWED.
- o Pants/shorts may be pleated or unpleated.
- o All pants/shorts must have a ZIPPER, belt loops, and pockets.
- o A plain, solid brown belt must be worn with pants or shorts.
- Acceptable pants & shorts are available at many vendors: Lands' End, JCPenney, WalMart, GAP, Old Navy, Sears, etc. You DO NOT need to spend a lot of money to comply with the regulations. Just tell your son what he's going to wear or call me and I'll tell him. Again, we have many pre-owned pants, so feel free to come to the office and look through the stock.

Here is the rest of the dress code as printed in the Student-Parent Handbook:

- <u>Hair:</u> Hair **must NOT touch the shirt collar** or extend below eyebrows. Hair must be styled neatly and conventionally. The Dean of Students is the ultimate judge as to compliance. No dyed hair colors, Mohawk or other **unconventional** haircuts, including undercuts, are allowed. **Students may NOT return from summer vacation with dyed or sun-bleached hair.** Students must be **clean shaven** at school and at school sponsored events.
- Jewelry. No earrings or facial jewelry are allowed at school or school sponsored events. No chains may be hung from clothing. We DISCOURAGE expensive watches, bracelets or neckwear.

<u>Shirts:</u>

- Only Saint Paul's BLUE uniform shirts as sold by Bayou Uniform Company are allowed. Shirts MUST fit appropriately. Shirts may not be torn or have holes in them. Bayou will be ready to sell blue uniform shirts by the end of June. Bayou is located at 13488 Seymour Myers in Covington (893-3700).
- o Shirts must be tucked in at ALL times during the school day.
- **ONLY PLAIN white, blue, gray or gold tee shirts may be worn under the uniform shirt.** In cold weather, ONLY long-sleeved tee shirts sold in book store may be worn under a uniform shirt.
- We have a supply of pre-owned shirts in fair to very good condition. If finances are tight and you would like to avail yourself of these shirts, feel free to come by the office. Your son will not be embarrassed in any way by this. And the Mothers' Club Book Store will be selling pre-owned shirts and pants in very good condition at a very low price during the first week before school. We also have a supply here in the administration building, which you are welcome to come take.
- Socks & Shoes:
 - o Shoes must be in good condition. Tennis shoes with laces meeting these criteria are allowed on regular school days.
 - o Sandals, slip on beach shoes with no laces, boots of any kind, or clogs are not allowed.
 - o On dress uniform days, dress shoes (not tennis shoes) are required.
 - o Students must wear SPS uniform socks (available at Bayou or the Mothers' Club Book Store).
- <u>Cold Weather Outerwear:</u> ONLY SPS sweatshirts / outerwear sold in our bookstore are allowed.
- <u>Caps or Hats:</u> Caps and hats are NOT allowed on campus during the school day.
- **Formal dress uniform:** A "formal" uniform is worn on special occasions (school masses, ceremonies, field trips, special programs, etc.) This uniform includes a school tie (available at Bayou Uniform or the Mothers' Club Bookstore), any white long-sleeve shirt, and long khaki pants (preferably with dark shoes), socks, and belt are also part of the uniform which are purchased anywhere by the student.
- **IDs**: As an additional level of safety, students will be REQUIRED to WEAR THEIR ID CARDS on a daily basis. We will supply them with an SPS lanyard when they receive their cards on either Aug 4 or 5. This will also help with the cafeteria, as ID cards are used to check out and also with the attendance office, as ID

cards are used to check in if a student is late. Students who do not have their ID on any day will be subject to detention. Lost ID cards must be replaced for a fee of \$10. And do not let your son use the ID card as a teething ring! Ask him to see the ID from time to time and encourage good dental hygiene!

Note: The Dean of Students is the final judge in all clothing and grooming issues. The school assumes that parents, by enrolling their son at Saint Paul's, will support us in these decisions. Thank you for supporting our efforts to have our students look as good as they are!

LOOKING AHEAD:

- Tuition for 2023-24 is due on June 3rd; the first payment for bank-financed tuition is also due. Loans are still available at Resource Bank. Students cannot start school in August if tuition or bank loans are not current.
- If your son is registered for next year and you change your mind during the summer about his attending SPS, PLEASE let me know AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.
- BE VIGILANT during the summer there are many temptations that will face your sons this summer. Drug testing will resume in the fall!
- Wednesday, August 9, is the first day of school. It's a FULL DAY OF INSTRUCTION and attendance is expected.
- A complete 2023 24 school year calendar has been published in my newsletter for several months and is the last page of this newsletter. Be informed that the state has tightened the attendance policy and Saint Paul's is complying. PLEASE DO NOT SCHEDULE VACATIONS DURING SCHOOL TIME.

NEWS WORTH NOTING: Volunteerism boosts self-esteem. The Journal of Adolescence reported that volunteering to assist strangers yielded more long-term benefits in teens than helping family or friends. In addition to having positive psychological impacts on teens, volunteering can increase physical exercise and prevent loneliness. Helping others does not have to be done on a grand scale, a small act of kindness is a great place to start. <u>Read more on this story</u>.

SCHEDULING FOR NEXT YEAR: Students have selected their courses for next year. Only registered students were allowed to schedule classes.

REPORT CARDS will be sent tomorrow, Saturday, although final grades are visible on Plus Portals prior to that. If you do not receive your son's report card, please let us know.

SOCIAL MEDIA: Parents: please stress with your sons the consequences of inappropriate social media posting. Cyber-bulling is against the law and has legal implications. And the school will take strong measures against any inappropriate posting. Students: THINK before you post

SUMMER OFFICE HOURS: We will gradually start reducing our summer office hours. While you can pretty much count on the office being open every morning during the summer, we will soon start closing the office at 1, so please contact us in the mornings if you need us. We will resume full office hours on July 25.

SERVICE HOURS: Summer is a great time for your son to earn his mandatory ten hours of service – and to do even more, perhaps even earning the Brother Alfred Service Award or Order of St. La Salle Service Award.

SUMMER READING – VERY IMPORTANT: This is a reminder that all students have summer reading assignments for English, and students who are enrolled in an **Honors or A.P. Civics or U.S. History** course do as well (juniors and seniors only). Please take note of the following to ensure that your son completes these assignments as efficiently as possible.

All summer reading questions and titles for English and social studies (if your son is in <u>Honors or AP U.S.</u> <u>History/Civics</u>) are posted on our website. Go to the *Academics* tab on our site; then, click *Summer Reading*.

Lastly, all titles for your son's English course for the school year are posted under the *Academics* tab too. Click *English Paperback Lists.* Please obtain copies of these titles so your son is prepared throughout the year. Most of our families choose Amazon as their vendor, but please use whatever is most cost effective and convenient.

Please encourage your son to take his summer reading obligation seriously. We deliberately limit the number of books to be read in order not to make this an onerous task, and we certainly encourage more reading that just what we are requiring. Toward that end, I offer the following:

- We often see that a student's weakest ACT score is in reading. Why? Students don't like to read! Solution? Read more! PLEASE insist your son devote part of each day (30 minutes? 15? 10?) to reading. He's used to this in school with SSR (I hope you know what SSR is!) This could be a family activity – set aside time when the whole family reads. Turn off the TV, i-pad, X-Box, phone, the computer – and read.
- And speaking of ACT /SAT scores, summer provides an excellent opportunity to prepare. There are local formal courses, but both ACT and SAT offer on-line prep programs at very reasonable costs. Or just purchase one of the many test preparation books on the market and ask your son to spend 15 minutes a day preparing. Long-term preparation is the only solution. You can't "cram" for an ACT or SAT.

TAYLOR SCHOLAR AWARDS: Thanks to The Taylor Foundation, named for Mr. Patrick Taylor for whom the TOPS program is named, we presented qualified students last week with Taylor Scholar Awards. For a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher, the award grants one-year free admission for student and one parent/guardian to the Audubon Aquarium of the Americas, Audubon Butterfly Garden and Insectariums, Audubon Zoo, and the New Orleans Museum of Art.

We are grateful to the Taylor Foundation for honoring Mr. Taylor this way. As most know, Mr. Taylor was a successful oilman, philanthropist and educational reformist who wanted all students to have an opportunity to attend college based on their ability to learn and not on their ability to pay.

If your son received this award, plan a day or two this summer and take a group of his friends who also earned the award to visit these incredible educational and entertaining venues. Or maybe treat some students who didn't earn the award and use it as encouragement for them to earn the award next year.
