Dear Parents,

At the end of this newsletter I have printed the first three pages of the *Historique de St. Paul's*, written by Brother Charles Crouzet. It is an account of the arrival of the first Brothers and their first year, 1918, of owning and running Saint Paul's after buying the school from the Benedictines at nearby St. Joseph Abby. It was written at the request by Brother Jeffery Calligan, who had assumed the principalship in 1978, so as to preserve the early historical accounts of the school by one of the founding Brothers.

Brother Charles was one of scores of Brothers who had fled for their lives from France in the early 1900s when the persecution of the Church and religious had reached a dangerous level. Given the choice of leaving his vocation or leaving his native France, he chose the latter. He and his confreres were sent to Mexico to found and run Lasallian schools in the rural, poor areas of Lasallian District of Northern Mexico. There they quickly learned a new language, culture, and educational system and within a few years were founding and running very successful schools.

Then, in 1916, they were forced to flee for their lives again as the religious persecution of the Mexican Revolution swept through Mexico. The notorious Pancho Villa himself forced the Brothers onto a train to the United States at gunpoint. Their community of twice-exiled Brothers were scattered throughout the United States in various religious communities while awaiting a new assignment. In this country their French and recently acquired Spanish skills were of little use so they again were forced to adapt to a new culture, language, and educational system.

In the *Historique de St. Paul's*, Brother Charles picks up the story of their community reuniting in Covington and assuming the ownership of Saint Paul's School. It is fascinating reading both for the heroic task that the Brothers assumed and for the description of Saint Paul's and Covington in 1918. I will add a few pages each week. I hope you enjoy this first installment. *Notes on the Historique:*

- The term "L5" refers to the Theater building. It was called L5 during the 1970s since it was one of five (5) classrooms that accommodated large (L) sized classes.
- Dixon Hall was the original school building built by Tulane University when the campus was Dixon Academy 1902-1911. It was destroyed by fire in 1981. It stood where Founders Circle is today.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

ANNUAL APPEAL: Several weeks ago, you received the Saint Paul's Advancement Review which contained the President's Annual Educational Fund Report. Many thanks to those who responded to the appeal. We invite you to review the listed businesses and individuals who generously supported Saint Paul's last year. Your support is essential to the continued quality of our offerings to our students and support of our faculty.

This year we invite you to continue or even increase your contributions to the Annual Appeal. If you did not contribute last year, I humbly request that you consider donating. For clarity, I offer the following:

- Almost **all private schools conduct annual campaigns**; many are high pressured; ours is not but we request your support to keep it from being high pressured.
- Your annual gift supports tactical, short term projects, e.g., technology, special programs, STEM equipment and supplies, unique one-time academic needs, teacher formation and professional development, minor campus upgrades and renovations, student activities, etc. in short, the necessary resources to ensure a superior education for our students.
- The Capital Campaign (more on this later) funds provides resources to expand and improve large infrastructure projects (the \$4 million La Salle Hall renovation, the \$4.5 million new gym, the \$4 million Benilde Hall renovation and now the \$2.5 million Music Hall.)
- You may "pledge" your gift and pay later or in installments (monthly, etc.). More and more families are using automatic credit card monthly payments of \$10, \$20, or more dollars. GREAT!
- Gifts of stock are welcome.

ANNUAL APPEAL AND GRANDPARENTS: We are blessed with many supportive grandparents. Many schools solicit donations from grandparents directly. Again, we do it differently than other schools that directly solicit grandparents. We ask that you inform your son's grandparents or, if you want, we'll be happy to send them the information directly if you wish. Just provide me with the information. We do not want to ask grandparents without your consent, but we need their support. I have already received a number of grandparent gifts. Again, no gift is too small – and, of course, no gift is too large.

FEAST OF SAINT JOSEPH: This Tuesday we celebrate the Feast of Saint Joseph with an all-school Mass. This feast has special meaning for Saint Paul's. Saint Joseph is the Patron Saint of the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, known locally in the United States as the Lasallian Brothers. Saint LaSalle had a special devotion to Saint Joseph, whose life and unique place in the Church mirrors the mission of the Brothers in their schools. As Saint LaSalle wrote in his **Meditations**:

Because Saint Joseph was made responsible by God for the care and external guidance of Jesus Christ, it was important that he have the qualities and virtues necessary to fulfill worthily so holy and exalted a ministry. The Gospel tells us about three, all very fitting for the responsibility entrusted to him: he was just; he was very submissive to God's orders, l and he had a very special solicitude for the education and the protection of Jesus Christ.2

As Saint La Salle saw it, these three virtues were central qualities to be emulated in the life and ministry of a Brother in his schools. Hence, he designated Saint Joseph as the Patron Saint of the Institute of the Brothers.



BROTHER RAY MEMORIAL: Many ask what has become of the donations to the Brother Ray Memorial Fund. The short answer is that nothing has happened yet but it continues to grow as people continue to donate. I humbly suggest that a portion of the fund should be dedicated to the purchase and proper placement of a statue of Saint Joseph somewhere on the Saint Paul's campus. And, that this statue of Saint Joseph be dedicated to Brother Ray, both to honor the Institute of the Brothers and Brother Ray in particular. I will soon be forming a Brother Ray Memorial Committee to help with the design, placement, and dedication for this statue. If you agree and would like to help with this project, please contact me.

BIOMEDICAL SCIENCES: Junior and senior PLTW Biomedical students recently experienced a day at LSU's Health and Sciences Center alongside second-year medical students. The program provided hands-on exposure to various medical skills, including performing heart ultrasounds, diagnosing heart and lung defects, excising tumors, administering CPR, managing uncontrolled bleeding, and conducting diagnostic patient interviews. The students also had the opportunity to examine human specimens, such as skeletal remains, kidneys, hearts, lungs, and spinal cords. While these skills align with our PLTW curriculum, the unique aspect of this day involved practicing on mannequins that simulated real-world conditions, complete with heartbeats, breathing sounds, speech capabilities, and eye movements. Those selected for this distinctive experience should be proud of their achievement, as the application process required a demonstration of their dedication to academic excellence.





Dear Friends of St. Paul's School,

Seventy-five years of tradition facilitates our educational ministry at St. Paul's, yet this heritage also challenges us all to continue to excel. In 1968 Brother Ephrem closed The St. Paul Story by writing:

The fine family spirit of mutual respect and cooperation which the founding French Brothers instilled into their first pupils in 1918 still persists today among the 350 resident and 250 day students. It stands a good chance of enduring at least another fifty years. [p. 129]

Today, half-way through Brother Ephrem's projection, I joyfully affirm that the spirit of community established in 1918 persists and thrives among the 100 resident and 400 day students, the faculty, the parents, and the alumni. This is part of the tradition which launches us toward the future.

Another crucial facet of the tradition which impels St. Paul's toward the year 2000 and toward its hundredth anniversary is summed up by St. John Baptist De La Salle's remarks in 1718 in the Common Rules for his Brothers. He wrote:

The Brothers of the Society shall strive by prayer, instruction, and by their vigilance and good conduct in school, to procure the salvation of the children confided to their care, bringing them up in piety and in a truly Christian spirit, that is, according to

the rules and maxims of the Gospel. [p. 6] This is the ideal we at St. Paul's continue to strive toward as we face a future filled with problems and uncertainties. With the courageous example of the first seventy-five years, we will also surmount every obstacle and continue to be faithful to our heritage.







Below are the first three pages of the Historique de St. Paul's by Brother Charles Crouzet which I referenced at the beginning of this newsletter. I will print the rest of the Historique in following newsletters.

HISTORIQUE DE St. PAUL'S

(These are my personal remembrances of St. Paul's.) It will cover: The Brothers that were here during the first summer; the property; the buildings; the Faculty; the hard times of the beginning; the regulations, etc., etc.

I was at Ocean Rest, (the place, in New Jersey, where the Brothers of the District of Baltimore spent their summers and had their retreats, on the sea shore.)

I had begun to teach a Mechanical Drawing course to some Brothers, at the request of Bro. Visitor, Aban Philip. Early in July 1918, Brother Visitor called me and showed me a letter from our Visitor, Niceas—Bertin, requesting him to send me to St. Paul's College, in Covington, La., where I was to teach typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, etc. Due to textbooks entirely new to me I was to reach the new school without delay in order to get acquainted with them.

A train ticket was given to me, covering from Ocean Rest to New Orleans, and instructions on where to go from there. I arrived at New Orleans in the morning of July 12. Since the New Orleans station was close to Canal Street and the Mississippi, I followed Canal Street until I reached the Southern station, on the same street, where I learned that there was only one train going to Covington, at 4:00 p.m. Most of my spare time was spent looking around. I discovered the very large St. Joseph's church, a few blocks away, and spent quite a bit of time in it. The train was a small one of two passenter cars. The crossing of Lake Pontchartrain impressed me for I could not see the bridge on either side of the car.

Brother Nilammon was waiting for me at the Covington depot with a horse and buggy. Jahncke Avenue was a narrow shell road with few houses along the way, but venerable old liveoaks with their long beards boardered it on each side from begining to end.

The entrance to the school grounds was the same as now, but the road was narrow and on each side the grounds were low and marshy up to the entrance to the cinder track. Before reaching the liveoak the road turned to the left, in a wide S curve, passing in front of the dormitory building, 1 skirting the kitchen and ending on the west side of same.

The trafic that had to do with school business turned around the oak tree and returned back out to Jahncke Avenue. Of course, the road, as now, passed in front of Dixon Hall and turned towards the northeast corner of the property, passing between L5 and the present gym, to reach the intersection of So. Jefferson St. and East 14th Ave. where a "farm gate" was. As far as I know, that stretch of road, from L5 out, was never used by vehicles. Practically the whole property was surrounded by a barb wire fence, except east of the football field that had a solid board fence over 6 ft. high and extending along east 14th Ave. up to the beginning of the track.

About where the Administration building is was a path used by the seniors to go to the football field, that was their playground also. From that path, all the way to E. 14th Ave. was a wooden grand standstand². A few years after 1918 that stand was considered unsafe, for part of the lumber was rotten. It was torn down and, with the lumber still usable, another stand was erected, but barely half the length of the original one. In order to make it last longer, a tin roof was built over it.³

There were five buildings on the property. The Dixon Hall, minus the two end starways, had a pretty main entrance on the east side, corresponding to the present first floor. A large terrace 4 about 12 by 30 ft. was just one step below the double doors.

Two side concrete stair ways were leading, from the level road to the terrace. On the opposite side of the building, were two small doors, giving access to two narrow stairways going from ground level to the third floor. These were used by the Brothers who had their sleeping quarters on the third floor, and by the students to reach their classes (first and second floors) or to the labs, located in the half basement at both ends of the building. On 1918 that side of the building was completely covered, from sidewalk to roof, by a creeping vine. There sparrows and, mostly roaches had their empire!) In the middle part was a large furnace for hotair heating; a barber shop and storage room. That part was on ground level and so, was barely 6 ft. high.

The present L5 was the seniors basketball court, and auditorium when plays were given.³ It had 3 very large windows and two double door entrances between the windows. Where the Reading Lab is was the swimming pool, with a narrow walk on three sides of same while a fairly large concrete slap was on the stage side. Except during the middle of the summer the water was "ice cold!" That swimming pool was dirt filled and a floor built over it. A door was open on the west side (the present entrance to the reading lab.)

The infirmary building (a frame construction, two stories high) was facing the oak tree, but about 40 ft. from the sidewalk.⁴ It had a small porch at each side of the center part, which extended about 8 ft. to the front.

Alongside of an open ditch (that is now replaced by a large concrete pipe) was the juniors gym. It was transformed into a chapel a few days after I arrived at St. Paul's.⁵ When the Benedictine Fathers were operating St. Paul's they had a chapel on the third floor of the Dixon Hall. Because all of them were priests they could have their Mass at different hours, and a moderate number of students could
